





SAIGON (UPI)—The number of Americans killed in Vietnam has passed 30,000, U.S. military sources said today. Nearly half of them have died this year.


U.S. headquarters also announced that two more American helicopters were shot down yesterday in widely separated areas of South Vietnam. Two

Just let me be myself



The Lancers' persistent teamwork and determination on the gridiron gained them many rewarding victories and a successful overall record of 5-3-1. Perhaps the highlight of the season was the 46-10 romp over Millburn.


The Lancer offensive line contained strong blockers anchored by third team All-County center Al Tinquist, with tough and quick co-captain Paul Smitko at one side, and the effective blocking of Chris Klug on the other. The tackling positions were aptly filled by Dave Van Cott, biggest man on the line, and Jack Jacobi who showed his skill not only in blocking but also in pass protection. End positions were occupied by John Aylward, both an able blocker and pass receiver, and by Gene Thaw, third team All-County end, whose huge size and quick action made him not only the deadliest blocker on the line, but also allowed him to set a new season record of five touchdown passes received.

The Lancers' backfield, probably the most balanced in many seasons, was led by the versatile attack of John Lyons in both the exhausting offensive position of wingback and the rugged position of defensive cornerback. Co-captain Jeff Mathesius, leading ground gainer for the season, demonstrated his over-all prowess and contributed immeasurably to the Lancers' victories. Jan Bresky, the biggest man in the Lancer backfield, gained many difficult yards needed for first downs, and through determination and perseverance was the leading scorer with six touchdowns. Tom Jones, starting quarterback, often spelled victory for the Lancers with his exceptional leadership and fine passing ability.

Pete Steffen, excellent defensive back, also filled as alternate quarterback and proved to be the surest tackler on the Lancer team. Bob Coccussa was a stalwart on the kickoff team; Lenny Salemme, a rugged defensive tackler, used his tenacious efforts to make a solid Lancer line. The toughest defensive end, Frank Robina, dropped many quarterbacks during the season. And versatile Mike Duffy, who played both cornerback and fullback, was capable of filling any position with proficiency.

Head Coach Valentine is, therefore, left with an experienced and capable squad for next year that will find a challenge in equalling this year's record.


