Where Indians Roamed

Where Indians once roamed wooded hills 400 years ago, space age industries, modern stores and gracious homes are now located in suburban Metuchen.

The name Metuchen is a heritage of those Indians. The area was called "Metuchen" which means firewood in the Lenape language used by the Munsee Indians. They were a sub-tribe of the Lenape or Delaware Indians of the Algonquian nation. Students of Indian lore assume the Indians used this name because abundant dry firewood was found in the area.

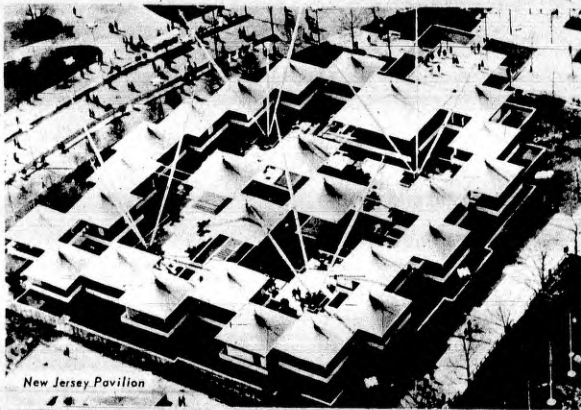
Another account of the origin of the name is that it may stem from the name of a Munsee sub chieftan, "Chief Matochsagan," who apparently ruled the "Matochshoning" area sometime between 1630 and 1700.

Metuchen, as it is known today, was a place populated by a few dozen white persons during the fear-some days of the Revolutionary War. The biggest spectacular in the town's history occurred on June 26, 1777. Led by Sir William Howe, top-ranking British general in the colonies, between 6,000 and 8,000 troops, including the hated Hessians, marched along the Woodbridge road (now Woodbridge avenue) to the Metuchen Meeting House (First Presbyterian Church) and Old Colonial Cemetery then swung north on what is now Main street.

Later that day they met, in a brief but bloody skirmish, a vastly outnumbered American force commanded by William Alexander, the self-styled "Lord Stirling". Writings of General George Washington refer to the conflict as having included "some pretty smart skirmishing".

Washington traversed Metuchen's roadways on numerous occasions in those days. A dozen years later he rode along Wood-

Talent Is Boro Attribute

Visitors to the New Jersey Pavilion at the World's Fair today will be served a "fair" sized slice of life in the borough of Metuchen.

Metuchen Day at the World's Fair will describe the New Jersey suburban community in terms of its people, interests and achievement.

Two special programs at 2 p.m. and 7 p.m. will feature the borough's student talent. Among the performers will be "Sharon's Rangerettes," a drill and twirling team that recently won the Mid-Atlantic States Drill Team Championship. Also pianist Mary-Jo Marra, who has performed in concerts throughout the Middlesex County area and a jazz combo featuring the Lincoln Center Award winning high school students, Steven Hassenberg and William Clausen.

The Metuchen Summer Music School band and orchestra under the direction of George Schultz and Jerrold Held will include a number of students who were chosen earlier this year to perform with the Middlesex County Band and Orchestra.

Metuchen's day at the fair also will include an exhibit featuring the cultural life of the borough. On exhibit will be the works of John Ciardi, poet, lecturer and editor; paintings by local artists, photographs of the borough, a Girl Scout exhibit and photographs of cultural groups active in Metuchen. There also will be a craft exhibit and a demonstration on "the art of making a doll" by Vogue Doll designer and Metuchen resident, Deet D'Andrade.

Members of the Metuchen Volunteer Fire Department and a number of high school students will be on hand to guide visitors through the exhibit and to answer questions on the borough.

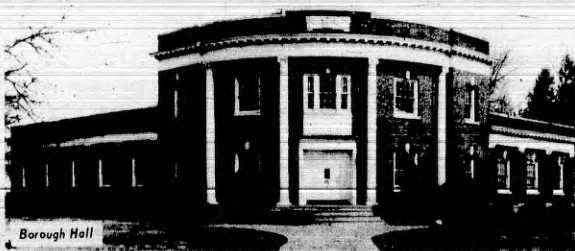
Where's Brainy Boro?

Did you ever hear of a town nicknamed "Brainy Boro?"

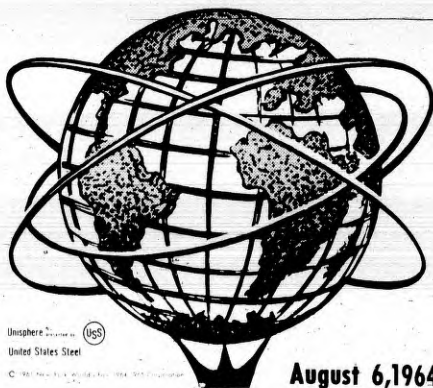

Metuchen's downtown shopping area is noted for its small specialty shops, better grade merchandise and friendly service. More than 100,000 people live within a five-mile radius of the town center.

The central business district includes a variety of retail stores, banks and general office accommodations.

The local Chamber of Commerce, which now has 165 members, maintains flower boxes along Main street, organizes a Christmas parade and arranges for the display of the American flag on appropriate occasions.

Boro Schools Aim To Give Broad and Varied Education

Metuchen is proud of its schools. Most residents feel their youngsters are getting an education that is far superior to that normally available in a public school system.

The heart of Metuchen's schools is the high school according to Robert F. Hallmann, president of the Board of Education. The high school was built in 1958 and provides a modern setting for a top flight educational program.

"I'm proud of our new high school with its broad and varied program," Hallmann said. "The high school receives good backing from a well coordinated program from kindergarten to eighth grade," he said.

"Our system is geared to give as broad an education as possible to all students whether they are headed for college or into the labor market," Hallmann remarked.

The Metuchen school system includes the high school, a junior high school and three elementary schools. The system operates on a full session basis employing the services of more than 110 classroom teachers in addition to more than two dozen special teachers and two librarians. "I am proud of our fine teaching and administrative staff," Hallmann said, "it is one of the best in the state." He also noted that much of the school system's success was due to the keen interest in good education by townspeople.

The school system employs a full-time guidance coordinator, two guidance counselors for the high school and one counselor for the elementary schools. The staff also includes a school physician and two full time and one part time nurse. Children residing in Metuchen who become five years of age in a calendar year may be enrolled in kindergarten classes.

Many extra curricular activities are offered on both an inter-scholastic and intramural basis. Two large play-field areas are provided, plus playgrounds at the three elementary schools. The borough recreation department is in charge of supervised summer programs on school grounds and borough parks.

Education in the borough extends beyond regular school offerings. A varied and interesting adult school also is run on a tuition basis. The curriculum is designed to meet the needs and interests of the community.

A summer school, which is just drawing to a close, has been instituted recently. It provides an opportunity for students to improve their scholastic records, take additional courses that couldn't be scheduled during the regular school session and for those interested in following musical pursuits.

Other schools in the borough include a Catholic parochial elementary

school and boy's high school. A non-denominational Community Nursery School also is available. The school is open to children who are four years of age or older and is licensed by the state Board of Education. The nursery meets in the First Presbyterian Church.

Rutgers, The State University, also is close by in New Brunswick. Not only do many Metuchen High School graduates go to Rutgers, but many members of the university staff and faculty live in the borough.

tion have made Metuchen a commuter town for executives and professional men. Many leaders in government, industry, education and the professions call the "Brainy Boro" their home town.

A relatively small town, Metuchen covers an area of slightly less than three square miles and is entirely surrounded by Edison Township. It is located in a triangle made by the cities of Perth Amboy, New Brunswick and Plainfield. The distance to any one of these cities is about 5 miles. Metuchen has a borough form of government with a mayor and six councilmen. Other officials include a tax collector, police magistrate, police chief, borough clerk, building and plumbing inspectors, recreation director and fire chief. The Planning Board and Zoning Board of Adjustment are responsible for long range planning for the future development of the borough and maintenance of the goals of the master plan. Other bodies include the Board of Health, Parking Authority, Shade Tree Commission, police department, fire department first aid squad and Board of Education.

Light Industry Sought For Industrial Parks

"We of the Metuchen Industrial Commission welcome businessmen to visit our town as an attractive place to locate small or medium business," says Walter Duff, chairman of the commission.

"We are looking for light industry," he says, "and have plants now under construction or in the planning stage in two industrial parks." These new facilities will come with all utilities installed.

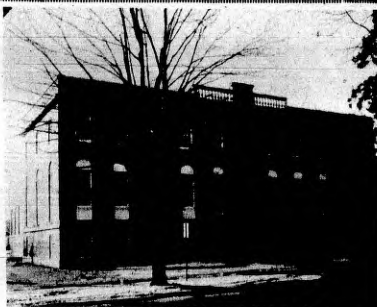
"The advantages of moving to Metuchen are three-fold," Duff explained. They are:

• A broad and diversified labor market available in the immediate area.

• A tax structure that is stable and should remain stable in the years to come.

• Close access to transportation-HIGHWAYS: Routes 287, 1 and 27; the New Jersey Turnpike and Garden State Parkway; RAILROADS: Pennsylvania Railroad, Lehigh Valley Railroad and the Port Reading Railroad; BUS: Public Service Coordinated Transit, Suburban Transit Corporation and Plainfield Transit Inc.; AIRPORTS: Newark within 20 miles and Hadley Airport for private planes within five miles.

Metuchen 'Y' Serves 2,000 Members in Borough Area

"Serving our community to the fullest extent possible is the YMCA's goal," says Harry Williams, general secretary.

"Our success in achiev-

ing this goal is measured in the nearly 2,000 members we now have," Williams says. "Our 'Y' has more members than any other YMCA in the county."



Founded in 1921 through a gift of Charles Edgar, the Metuchen-Edison YMCA has expanded several times in its history. At the present time it is looking forward to the opening this fall of its new olympic-sized pool.

For many years, Metuchen had the distinction of being the smallest town in the United States supporting a YMCA.

In addition to swimming and gym classes, the "Y" sponsors many organizations. Among them are 23 tribes of Indian Guides, a Women's Auxiliary, various youth service clubs, about a dozen hobby clubs, and an active health club. They also conduct adult education classes from fall to spring each year.

The "Y" also shares the ownership of a camp in Blairstown, N.J. Camping trips to this site are held throughout the year.

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A Center of Culture

Estelle Hasenberg, chairman of the Metuchen Day at the World's Fair exhibit is eminently qualified for her role as coordinator of displays depicting the borough's cultural achievements.

An accomplished artist in her own right, Mrs. Hasenberg is experienced in organizational work. She organized and was chairman of the Metuchen Appreciation of Arts lecture series.

Mrs. Hasenberg majored in art at Rutgers University and has studied extensively with private teachers. She has participated in a few exhibits, but won approval by critics on those occasions. First prize winner in a New Brunswick Jewish Community Center art exhibit, she also was an award winner in the Arnold Constable art show.

Reluctant to define her work, Mrs. Hasenberg explains, that she has experimented with many art forms over the years. She does feel however that she is more comfortable in the representational school. She has noticed a recent trend among artists to return to the human form for inspiration.

In planning and organizing Metuchen's art exhibit, Mrs. Hasenberg has been assisted by one of the borough's younger members of the art world, Tom Funk of 1 Grant court. Funk, a recent graduate of the Rhode Island School of Design, already has begun to make a name for himself as an artist. He recently won first prize in college competition at Brown University and has exhibited his work at the Edison Health Club.

Rangerettes Perform At World's Fair

The World's Fair performance today of "Sharon's Rangerettes" will be a fitting preview of their next appearance at the fair later in August. At that time, the girls will compete in the World Drill Team Championships.

The Metuchen drill team, organized last January by Sharon Wankle of 28 Oak avenue, also will compete on Saturday for the New Jersey title.

Named Mid-Atlantic States Drill Team Champion earlier this year, the team was runner-up in the 1964 Eastern Seaboard Twirling Team Championships.

The Rangerettes range in age from 5 to 15 and can count among them some 200 trophies and medals for individual performances. Diane Del Casale, 13-year-old leader of the group, holds 85 twirling awards including the Mid-Atlantic States Fancy Strutting Championship, the Mid-Atlantic States Juvenile Majorette Queen award, and the New Jersey Grand Champion Twirl-Off award.

Other featured performers in the group are seven-year-olds, Beverly Yatauro and Cynthia McClusky. Both girls have won more than 20 awards. Beverly is Eastern Seaboard Military Strutting Champion and Fancy Strutting Champion. She also was runner-up for the title of Miniature World's Most Beautiful Majorette.

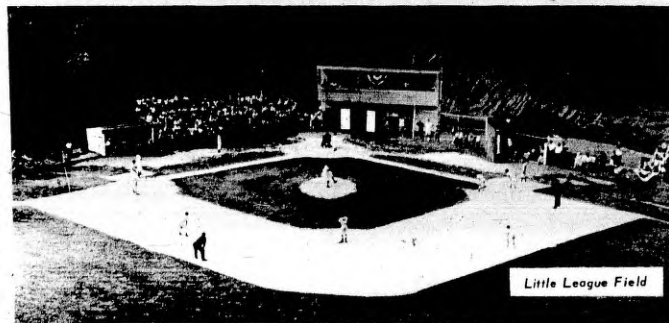

Miss Wankle organized "Sharon's Rangerettes" following her retirement from active competition. She was runner-up to World's Most Beautiful Majorette and Miss World Majorette. In 1963 she was presented trophy by the World Twirling Association for outstanding promotion and advancement of twirling in her area.

A teacher and national judge for the World Twirling Association, Miss Wankle will enter the University of Miami in the fall.

Boro Has Recreation Facilities For All

Through the years Metuchen residents have always been interested in recreation. The Borough not only has up-to-date facilities, but also boasts one of the most varied in the county. In addition to what the town offers, many county facilities can be reached within a few minutes.

The Metuchen area contains several public and private golf courses, a local YMCA, GYO, theater, playgrounds, tennis courts and parks. Bordering the borough is Roosevelt Park, which is owned by the county. It offers ice skating, fishing, tennis, picnic groves, playgrounds, summer day-camping facilities and horseback riding.

Golf enthusiasts have a choice of courses ranging from an 18-hole course at the Metuchen Country Club, to a newly opened 9-hole county course at the former Raritan Arsenal. Many swim clubs can also be found in the area.

The Metuchen Recreation Commission organizes activities throughout the year. In the winter, basketball and ice skating are sponsored. The summer program, under the direction of the Superintendent of Recreation, ranges from playground programs to Little League baseball.

The 8-week summer playground program includes weekly bus trips, arts and crafts instruction, games and sports, plus swimming and horseback riding.

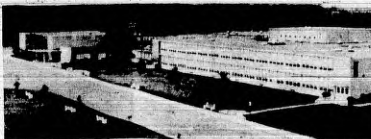

Chamber Seeks Boro Improvement

The goal of the Metuchen Area Chamber of Commerce is the improvement of the business, cultural and residential aspects of the borough, according to Dolores Wester, executive director. The chamber is in the business of selling Metuchen, she says.

In pursuit of this goal, the Chamber of Commerce has, since its incorporation in 1950, supported programs ranging from increasing recreational

facilities to supporting the passage of school budgets. It organizes the annual Christmas parade, arranges for the display of the American flag on appropriate occasions and maintains flower boxes along Main street.

The chamber also answers industrial and individual queries on the borough. It distributes industrial brochures to all companies interested in the Metuchen area.

The chamber works closely with borough officials and organizations to promote activities designed to benefit or enhance Metuchen. It currently is planning to work with the Tercentenary Committee on plans for a Tercentenary Fair in October.

Mrs. Wester is currently president of the state Association of Chambers of Commerce Executives. She is the first woman to hold that post.

'John Ciardi Lives Here' Cry Brainy Boro Defenders

Whenever a loyal Metuchense is asked to support Metuchen's claim to the title of "Brainy Boro," the first defense he's likely to offer is "John Ciardi lives here."

Ciardi, poet, lecturer and poetry editor of Saturday Review, is among the nation's outstanding men of letters.

Ciardi is a Fellow of the American Academy Arts and Sciences, the National Institute of Arts and Letters, and the American Academy in Rome. He also was a winner of the Prix de Rome awarded by the American Academy of Arts and Letters.

The author of several volumes of poetry, he has received several annual awards from "Poetry," "A Magazine of Verse" and received critical acclaim for his translation of Dante's "Inferno."

Formerly a professor at Rutgers University, Ciardi is director of the Bread Loaf Writers Conference held annually at Breadloaf, Vermont.

Ciardi, his wife and three children make their home at 31 Graham avenue, Metuchen.

bridge avenue en route to Philadelphia and his inauguration as the first President of the United States.

A boom in the construction of turnpikes along the entire eastern seaboard soon after 1800 greatly influenced the development of Metuchen. In 1810, two turnpikes were completed which intersected in the borough. One, now known as Middlesex avenue, ran from New York to Philadelphia. The other, now known as Amboy avenue, extended from Perth Amboy to Bound Brook.

In 1832 the first Post Office was established. The first newspaper, The Metuchen "Inquirer," was founded in 1880. "The Recorder" appeared in 1893 and has served the community since.

In 1839, a second event occurred to hasten the development of the borough. In that year Metuchen became a stop on the New Jersey Railroad (now the Pennsylvania Railroad) which had just been completed between Jersey City and Philadelphia. From this period on Metuchen began to experience a growth which was closely linked with the commuting service to the metropolitan centers.

Metuchen officially became a borough on March 20, 1900, by a special act of the state Assembly. One of the earliest organizations was the Borough Improvement League founded in 1901. It is a contemporary organization for women and a member of the National Federation of Women's Clubs.

With the influx of many eminent people during the turn of the century, Metuchen became known as the "Brainy Boro." Such outstanding persons as Dr. Ezra M. Hunt, Henry Dallas Thompson, Henry Mills Alden, Hester M. Poole, Mary E. Wilkins and many others have made Metuchen their home town.

In recent years, Metuchen has grown rapidly as an important regional shopping center. Retail stores have skyrocketed and many new businesses have located in the borough. In 1948, Metuchen ranked sixth among Middlesex County municipalities in total retail sales, now it ranks third in the county.

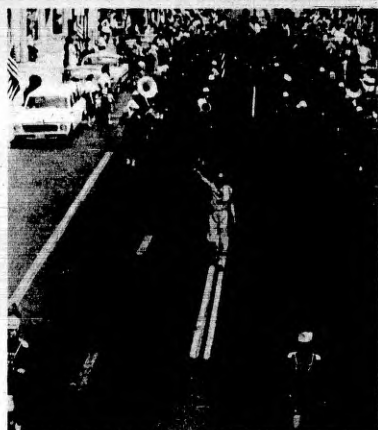

It's Always Metuchen Day At New Jersey's Pavilion

Metuchen Day at the World's Fair is today, but it also is Metuchen day every day at the New Jersey Pavilion due to the efforts and participation of borough residents.

New Jersey's commemorative stamp, on display in the information section, was designed by Douglas Allen of Metuchen. The son of Mr. and Mrs. Douglas Allen of 191 Middlesex avenue, his entry in the stamp design contest was picked from hundreds of other entries. Allen received \$700 in prizes for designing the stamp.

All displays at the state pavilion are the responsibility of another borough resident, Earl L. Hadley of 20 Oak Hills road. Hadley retired in 1962 as advertising sales promotion manager of the radio and television division of Westinghouse Corporation. In October of 1962, he took over as director of exhibits at the New Jersey Pavilion.

The more than \$150,000 in exhibits were organized and solicited by Hadley. Many of the exhibits were arranged through contacts he made while employed by Westinghouse.

"I think Metuchen is a grand little place," says Hadley. He has lived in the borough for the last ten years.

Two Fire Companies Serve Boro

Although Metuchen is a relatively small town, it has two active fire companies. The Eagle Hook and Ladder company is the oldest of the two, founded in 1889. The Washington Hose company was formed eight years later.

The two companies are now part of the borough fire department which was formed in 1928. Before that

time the two companies were independent and often competed with each other for the privilege of putting out the fire.

During the 1930's the companies organized a fire and drum corps, but in the late thirties, as jobs became more numerous, interest waned and the band disappeared.

Firm Enters Receivership; Plans Reorganization Soon

International Ultrasonics, Inc. of 18 Pearl street, Metuchen last week received preliminary approval of its application to go into voluntary receivership.

Thomas Scarpa, president of the company, said this week that the company was now in the process of drawing up plans for reorganization. Later in August, this plan along with a detailed statement of the company's financial condition will be presented to Joseph Fishberg, federal referee in bankruptcy.

Delays in research and development were cited by Scarpa as being major factors in the company's situation. He said that it wasn't until two months ago that the 4-1/2 year-old company delivered its first shipment of instruments. Scarpa indicated that with production now begun, the company should be able to get into the black.

Another factor for Scarpa's optimism is a healthy backlog of orders. The company produces industrial instrumentation and plastics sealing equipment.

Ultrasonics moved to Metuchen a year ago and employs 12 persons. Scarpa said the company plans to stay in Metuchen.

Ultrasonics' stocks are traded on the "Over-The-Counter" market.

Mrs. Manfredini, who majored in dramatic arts at the University of Dayton, Ohio, and the Marjorie Webster College in Washington, D.C., received her degree in education from the University of Houston.

During the past several summers, she has traveled extensively abroad and spent one year in Morocco with her daughter, Celeste. There she taught in the American School at the U.S. Air Force base.

Her daughter is a junior at Syracuse University where she is majoring in Fine Arts. She will join her mother in California for the Christmas holidays,

Dr. Nunan Begins Search For New MHS Principal

Dr. RENO Zinzarella last week resigned as principal of Metuchen High School. He was the third man in three years to hold that position.

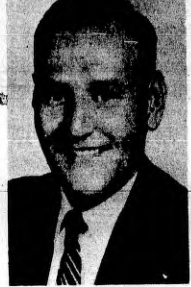
Dr. William Nunan, superintendent of schools, said he had sent out inquiries to about 18 to 20 universities last week asking for their recommendations of likely candidates for the position. He said that about eight to ten applications had been received so far.

Dr. Zinzarella's resignation comes at a particularly bad time for the school system. Not only is the vice principal at the high school gone, but many of the teaching staff and department heads are also new to the school. Dr. Nunan said that fortunately, however, many of the teachers who were hired to replace those who re-

tired this year, were experienced teachers. This was probably the only bright note sounded on the situation.

It is not anticipated that a new man would be available to step into the principal's slot by the time Dr. Zinzarella would leave at the end of September. Nunan said any new man would probably have to give notice where he is now located. That would mean a 60-day period before he would be free from his present contract obligations. The same condition will hold Dr. Zinzarella at Metuchen until the end of September.

Dr. Zinzarella has taken a position as principal of the Westwood Consolidated High School. The new school serves both Westwood and Washington Township in Bergen County. The new position brings with it a \$2,000 salary hike from \$11,000 at

Metuchen to \$13,000 in Westwood.

The new \$2.5 million Westwood High School will serve 650 students—450 fewer than in Metuchen High School.

Dr. Zinzarella, who received his PH.D. in school administration and supervision this year from Rutgers, The State University, said he hadn't been job hunting. "These job offers came to me," he said. "I received offers of high school principalships, college teaching positions and as an assistant superintendent of schools." He explained that the college had given his name to school systems seeking administrators.

Dr. Zinzarella came to Metuchen seven years ago as a history teacher in the high school. He served as vice principal for two years and was named principal last year. The Zinzarella's are expected to move to Westwood in September or October.

Dr. Nunan said that until a replacement can begin work, he along with the vice principal and members of the guidance department, would run the high school. He still plans to visit Iron Curtain countries in November providing the situation is well in hand.

Map For Sale

Laurence "Bill" Hart reports that the last 100 copies of his Metuchen-Edison map are now on sale in Seldow's in Metuchen.

Hart says he does not intend to further revise the map or index without a subsidy. He says he will sell his files and copyright for \$500. This would include a master map that has been kept up to date.

Sex Segregation

By a mistake in sex (mine) and an error in mailing (theirs) I have received an invitation to subscribe to a Reading For Men Book Club.

"Boy, are you lucky," said my eight year old who reads all the advertising material that arrives. "You can pretend to be a man and get the books."

"I don't think so," I said absently.

"Well, it says it's only a nickel for the first exciting book. Maybe I'll send a nickel and sign it A. Saul. They'll think I'm Alfred or Albert. How about that?"

"Certainly not," I said. "You bought two more of those Nancy Drew things just yesterday."

"But they're 'power packed,' full length books with lots of man appeal. What's man appeal anyway?"

"I'm not sure," I said continuing to assort the bills. "Listen to this," she continued. "These books are chosen 'by fellows who aren't just editors, but by men who have a keen understanding of the wants and desires of the adult male population.'"

"That took me away from the bills. 'Okay,' I told her. 'I'll take that now.'"

My deprived child stomped out of the room and I was about to throw the ad away when my eye hit an underlined sentence. It read: "And I mean real adult reading definitely not for children." It didn't offend me since I'm not an advocate of censorship. Quite the contrary, I'm very much in favor of adult reading. And I didn't even mind the sly suggestion that the books could be mailed to ones business address—presumably where the little woman won't see them.

That there are grown men still struggling with adolescence is no secret. Immaturity hits people of both sexes.

What really disturbed me about the letter is that I think (and hope) that the writer underestimates men. Contrary to popular belief, I think men are bright enough to read the same books women do. I'd even go so far as to say, when challenged, they can wade through books without pictures or sexual orgies. It is an injustice to them to suggest they need books written especially for them—as children do.

Now, let's assume though, that the books handled by the Reading For Men Book Club, are really great classics or at least fine interesting books. If they really are "thrill packed" volumes, why not let women have a crack at them? Why deny them the wonderful pleasure of such excellent reading material?

I don't know what's behind the Reading For Men Book Club, although I do have a suspicion. Actually, I don't care who reads what. But what does bother me is the plot to extend segregation of the sexes.

This sexual segregation seems to be a disease of the suburbs. Men have their Lions, Elks and Tigers (or is that just a commercial?). Women have The League of Women Voters and the Women's Club. Veteran organizations have women's auxiliaries. Both major political parties have women's groups. And so it goes, on and on.

And I think it's all based on some colossal misunderstandings. I remember discussing this with a friend of mine in the League of Women Voters. "Wouldn't we be stronger," I suggested, "if we were open to both sexes?"

She looked shocked. "Do you know what would happen then," she demanded. "I'll tell you what would happen—the men would take over. And before we knew what happened it would be The League of Men Voters with a women's auxiliary attached."

"But League women are sharp and competent; they'd never let that happen," I said.

"Louise Saul," she interrupted bitterly, "there are times when I think you have soap in your head. Which reminds me," she added pointedly, "if I don't get home and clean the house before Bill comes home, he won't let me come to the next meeting."

Well, I think she's wrong—just as wrong as the County school superintendent who defended the fact that there were no female county superintendents by saying: "We couldn't have a woman because there are times we just like to roll up our sleeves and relax at meetings."

In this day of topless bathing suits, you have to be pretty old fashioned to worry about rolling up your sleeves in full view of a female.

And it's this kind of thinking which stretched to its ultimate, leads to Men's Book Clubs, Dates with Dad Days at girls schools, and Father's Night at the PTA.

That people are bright and stupid, virginal and lecherous, kind and cruel, can not be doubted. But that any of these character traits hinge on one's sex is wrong as Mr. Kinsey worked so hard to prove.

In defense of this truth I think the Men's Reading Club should change its advertising. It might start with a simple statement: "If you like zippy reading, if you want a thrill on every page, if you want books that pack a wallop, you are the man or woman who should join the Spicy Book Club."

What a blow for sexual equality of opportunity—and what a market!

A Time For Re-Evaluation

The resignation of Dr. Reno Zinzarella last week seems to again point out that the present salaries for administrators in the school system is not high enough to keep these men in the borough system. Perhaps it is time to re-evaluate the administrative salaries not only in terms of competitive salaries to those paid by other school systems in the county, but to the salaries paid in surrounding counties as well.

It would seem that the Board of Education must decide either to hire men of lesser ability who will be satisfied with the salaries presently offered and will stay on, or to raise administrative salaries to a point where top caliber men will be satisfied to stay with the system. Another problem the board has yet to

come to a decision on is the question of a salary guide for administrators. This was recommended in the spring at a joint meeting of the board and the seven school principals and vice principals. Perhaps now is the time to consider this also. It is recommended by both the New Jersey School Administrators Association and the New Jersey Education Association.

We think the board should seriously consider raising the salaries of the top administrators. It would probably cost an additional \$10-15,000 a year on the budget, but the price would be right in our book if it would bring to an end the constant changeover in administrators. We can't expect the system to run efficiently with a constant change in the top men. Neither can we expect the educational level to remain high under such a situation.

New Street Minority Report

The Recorder last week published a "Minority Report" by Planning Board member C. Wallace Abel in which he defended his dissenting vote against a finding of blight in the New Street renewal area by the Metuchen Planning Board. We cannot agree with Mr. Abel or the contents of his report. Both are far off base as far as we are concerned.

We find his report in error on almost every point made, but more basically, Mr. Abel seems to have misunderstood what issues he was to consider in arriving at his decision.

In his opening statements he says, "After careful examination of the area, the evidence presented and of the majority report, I cannot concur with the findings and the recommendation by the Planning Board..." He then challenges the majority report stating, "It is my opinion that the findings presented do not represent factual evidence of blight, but are rather an interpretation of facts to justify a conclusion previously arrived at."

Mr. Abel's very next statements, however, let us know that he also had previously arrived at a conclusion. He states "I believe that the New Jersey Urban Renewal Law conflicts with those (state and municipal) zoning laws to the detriment of the community as a whole." Mr. Abel, a member of the Planning Board, was specifically charged not to consider the merits of the law, but only whether the facts in evidence indicated that the New Street area was blighted within the meaning of the state law. Mr. Abel is entitled to his views on the law, but there will be no proper time for him to fully express them. This was not his time.

Also, in those statements, Mr. Abel seems to have misinterpreted the purpose of the so-called "status quo" or non-conforming use provisions of the zoning laws. The provisions are not intended to protect the status quo as they will conform with the fifth and 14th amendments of the U.S. Constitution which prohibits confiscation of property without just compensation and the due process of law.

These provisions, however, are tightly and narrowly restricted to encourage the non-conforming uses to wither away in time. In fact, the restrictions are included in the laws specifically to get rid of these non-conforming uses.

Under the present law, non-conforming uses that predate the zoning law are

exempt from that law as long as the specific use should last. On the other hand, the Urban Renewal Law says in effect, "Why wait. If the condition of blight exists, whether it be from non-conforming use, dilapidation or other reasons, let's correct the situation now."

Mr. Abel also will probably be very distressed to learn that various amendments to the state statute covering zoning that would place a time limit to the "status quo" he speaks of, have been considered.

In addition to further swipes at the Urban Renewal law in his report, Abel also felt that the blight criteria could be applied in any section of town. He says, "Equally important is the fact that this 'evidence' is so broad that it could apply to every part of Metuchen." Mr. Abel has a good point here, for there are many areas of town that could very well be considered for redevelopment, however, the evidence presented doesn't apply to "every part of Metuchen," and, besides, the Planning Board isn't considering every part of town. It was only considering the New Street area.

Mr. Abel also questions what standards are to be used. We suggest that he read the zoning laws of the borough and its master plan for an answer.

He also suggested that if the titles to the land are faulty there is "a well established legal procedure for correcting them." It is right, but nowhere except in his minority report has there been any question of faulty titles. Mainly because none exist in this situation, nor does the term "condition of title" in the state law refer to faulty titles.

He also says this is the first time he has "seen 'diverse ownership' treated as a liability." However, "diverse ownership" is the reason for the existence of the right of eminent domain which has existed for hundreds of years.

Mr. Abel's report goes on and so could we, but the point is Mr. Abel hasn't offered the people of Metuchen a dissent which is to the point. True, he certainly has rallied against Urban Renewal, but not at the right time. And he has not backed up his original assertion that the New Street area is not blighted in terms of the state law, nor has he proved that the Planning Board made its decision before hearing the evidence. He really has not said anything at all. We think Mr. Abel owes the people of Metuchen some answers.

Plans Youth Guide

The Metuchen Youth Council has set September 1 as the target date for completion of their "Social Guide for Parents and Youth."

The guide, now being prepared by the council, will not attempt to set standards of behavior but is intended to serve as a guide to social behavior for young people at various stages of their social development.

The Philadelphia regional office of the Federal Urban Renewal Administration will recommend approval of the total \$500,000 New Street redevelopment program, if Metuchen, within the next three months, adopts a housing code and revises its plumbing code to conform with that of the state.

However, before the program can go into effect, the Borough Council must decide whether to approve a recent Planning Board finding that the area is "blighted."

New Interchange

The possibility of a new joint interchange connecting Route 287 and the New Jersey Turnpike came closer to becoming a reality this week when the General Services Administration donated 35 acres of Raritan Arsenal land to the state Highway Department. More than 100 acres are needed for a major interchange.

Edison Mayor Anthony M. Yelenicic has proclaimed a 30-day period of mourning for W. Robert Hale, former Middlesex County Freeholder, who died last week. Flags will be flown at half mast during the period.

Summer School Winds Up

Metuchen's first full Summer School program is winding up a very successful season.

Two hundred and forty students are signed up for enrichment, makeup and music offerings. More than 70 are participating in the Summer Band School which includes four bands, a string ensemble, plus private lessons.

Make up offerings include courses in General Science, Biology and French 1. Enrichment courses include a review of English, choral singing and science.

In the program offered two years ago, only 75 students enrolled. Summer School Principal William Keers and Mrs. E. Chapman Keers said a Summer program should be offered at all schools. "We have an obligation to the kids who have failed during the year," Keers said. "They need a second chance. I think the school should operate 12 months a year for maximum use of the facilities."

"Education is a year long process," he said. "It also allows some students to take courses

they couldn't schedule during the regular school year," he said.

Next year Keers hopes to add several enrichment courses to the program. He is considering art, dramatics, plus some basic courses in English and mathematics.

Dr. William Nunan, superintendent of schools, said that eventually the school may be run on a free basis for borough residents. The present tuition basis means that students taking makeup courses must take tests at the end of the program for credit. This credit can only raise the student's grade one letter grade. "Accredited courses must be given on a free basis," Nunan explained. "Ours are run on a self sustaining basis."

Keers teaches sixth grade in the Franklin school during the regular school year and directs the Adult Evening School in his "spare" time. During the Summer he coaches the swimming team of the Woodside Swim Club. In addition to running the Summer School,

Two weeks previously, you printed a brief summary of the majority affirmative decision on the same subject, and a mention of the minority report. The majority report was approved by three members, thus making the vote actually 3-1, or for all practical purposes 5-1 in favor of the "blighted" designation.

I think that on the basis of the democratic principle of allotting equal time to both sides, and in order to set the record straight, you should print the majority opinion in full or at least the half part of it that you gave the minority report.

The fallacy of Mr. Abel's diatribe is that he is arguing against "blight" as defined in the dictionary, but not as spelled out by the New Jersey Urban Renewal Law. In doing so, he is not fulfilling the obligation placed upon him when he was appointed as a member of the Planning Board.

Mr. Abel does not agree with redevelopment for

New street. That is his privilege and his prerogative when the vote comes up as to the wisdom of carrying out a New Street redevelopment program. I think that he is wrong. However, he is entitled to his opinion.

Nevertheless, when he is asked to judge "blight" according to the six specific criteria designated by the New Jersey Urban Renewal Law, he says that the area is not "blighted" and justifies his reasoning on wishful thinking. Then he is not performing his civic duty, but is rather blinding and confusing an issue that has been made clear by the courts of law.

If Mr. Abel thinks that the law is wrong, he should seek to change it by legal means. However, as long as the law is on the books and has been upheld by the courts, on numerous occasions, please Mr. Abel, let us stick to the facts.

The class, which numbers about 15 sells between 800 and 1000 pieces a year, mostly to hospital employees, thus supporting the shop and contributing to other departments in the hospital. The patients make 25 cents on the dollar. During the Fair, the pieces on exhibit are numbered and patients, visitors, doctors and nurses vote for their favorites. The top three win money prizes and all who participate get

recognition.

Last year, Miss Mary Nail, who has been a patient in the hospital since it opened 26 years ago, sold 55 of her popular painted figurines and was even taking orders in advance by the end of the year.

Another patient, Captain Marvin Lear, practices shell craft and makes fish nets and hand hooked wool rugs. Clarence Byrd and George Hodges make sculptured lamps from unusual pieces of scrap wood which they finish and wire for electricity.

Adams Garrett, director of the shop is a teacher at the Franklin School in Metuchen and at the Adult Evening School at Metuchen High School. According to him, his classes both at the hospital and in school do "outstanding work."

Congratulates Minority Report Author

TO THE EDITOR:

My congratulations to the author of the Planning Board "minority report" for his obvious courage as well as his cogent comments, and the Recorder for publishing the letter, having previously taken an opposing editorial position. I am of the opinion that the minority member of the Planning Board actually represents a majority of public opinion, and I hope that others will support this view, vociferously.

I share the feeling that the Planning Board hearing on whether the New Street area is blighted was a purely academic exercise. The tone was, "We've made up our minds, don't bother us with facts." Well, certainly no one was overburdened with facts. The blight survey report, or at least the portion which was read, seemed to presume that the area should be redeveloped, then supported this position by referring to "dilapidation" and "structural inadequacies" (terms without technical definition and without engineering certification), citing easily remediable deficiencies including painting and (Heaven help us) a dirty yard! At least one spectator was left with the feeling that he had just attended the Mad Hatter's tea party. Yet, on these grounds, the area was deemed blighted by the Board.

The Recorder editorial, "New Street Blight" made as much sense statistically as did the survey report semantically. I think that it's time to stop this stampe and get some answers to some basic questions. Certainly in this "Brainy Borough" the public should be competent to judge whether we are dealing with a desirable program for civic betterment, or with a tax-subsidized land grab, lacking answers I tend to the latter view.

I feel that the purpose of the Urban Renewal program is self evident. I do not believe that it was intended to be applied to a community such as Metuchen, and certainly not to an area such as the one under consideration. Why is this being

attempted?

Since the Planning Board would not permit discussion of prospective uses nor property valuation at the hearing, it was most cooperative of the Recorder to act as its spokesman in these matters. However, with so much concern for "fairness," why use figures comparing a principally residential area with adjoining business uses? Certainly, if the residential usage has reduced the value of the land so much, those with better potential usage for the land would, naturally, acquire and use it. In the good, old American free-enterprise, supply and demand tradition, would they not? Since they have not, is it because there are no prospects, or because those interested consider it easier to let the community underwrite the condemnation, seizure and demolition? (By playing coy, they might even get some tax concessions!) If, as has been inferred, there is not yet a program for redevelopment, then why the tremendous pressure to achieve a square block of rubble-laden vacant land in lieu of the existing dozen or so occupied and satisfied residences and businesses? Are we so anxious to emulate Newark, New Brunswick and other communities where such areas have laid stagnant for years?

Finally, how much money and from what sources will be needed to carry out even the first stages of this program? Certainly someone should have looked into this by now.

I don't profess to have any answers, I don't even know, at this point, whether I am for or against the redevelopment of New Street. I do know that the record thus far smacks of "railroading," and I am just cynical enough to ask "Why?" If the idea is so good, then why doesn't some spokesman for those favoring it tell us why, instead of challenging the opposition to show why it should not be done.

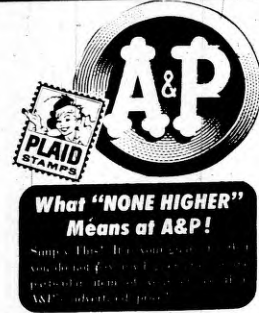

The tax cut, Berg said, not only put more money in people's pockets, but indirectly influenced real estate activity by indicating that the economy is healthy and prosperous.

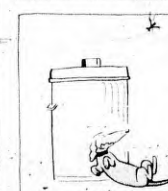
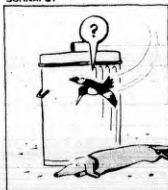

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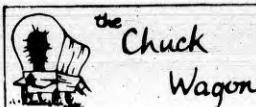

children.

He said that on the sub-
ject of supervision, both
he and Ruggieri agreed that
100 percent supervision
would be maintained in
special education classes
in Edison, Blunt said, how-
ever, that Ruggieri didn't
agree that supervision was
as much a problem as
parents had made it out
to be.

Blunt said the township
would continue to maintain
separate facilities for its
special education classes
to make use of existing
facilities, Blunt also in-
dicated that Ruggieri favored
the separation of special
classes from regular
classes.

Many educators, how-
ever, have increasingly
tended to favor integrating
educable classes with reg-
ular classes, Blunt said
this was particularly true
for educable classes at the
secondary level. He said
there would be a move
toward terminal classes to
train educable students in
a trade they could practice
after the completion of
schooling.
