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

## Spadoro, Teffenhart prepare to face off

EDISON - Incumbent Mayor George Spadoro will face Republican challenger Eileen Teffenhart this November in the township's mayoral race.

The mayor, who is completing his first term in office, beat out Donald Hansen, a public works employee and relative newcomer to Edison's political scene, in Tueday's primary. He captured support in 67 of the township's 77 voter districts.

Mr. Hansen took on the mayor, council seats up for grab. whom he campaigned for in the 1993 election, because of a decreasing faith in Edison's government system. His grassroots campaign gave him about onethird of the about 7,000 democratic votes cast in the township.

"The people of Edison have spoken; this is not over," Mr. Hansen said. "I am not going anywhere."

## **Boro budget raises taxes 1 cent**

METUCHEN — The Borough Council unanimously approved the 1997 municipal budget Monday night.

budget. totaling The \$10,387,590.33, will cost taxpayers \$5,435,034.33. Nontax revenues include \$800.000 surplus, \$3 million in general revenue and \$550,000 in collection for delinquent taxes.

Since 1977, Highland Park Senior Center members have enjoyed many new projects stemming from new recreation centers to a variety of activities

One of the major contributors to the different projects is the center's longtime director, Arlene Levy, who retired from her post May 30 after more than 21 years dedicated to the

Recognizing the need for programs

Mrs. Levy credits the success to making the program possible to then-Mayor Harold Berman and then-Councilman David Schwartz, both of whom "were really responsible for the breakfast to get off the ground."

## **Getting wired** Volunteers to link Bartle to Internet

Bartle Middle School will train volunteers June 14 to connect the school to the Internet.

The school recently signed onto the Internet and will have its own site on the World Wide Web this spring.

To train people and to help cut costs, volunteers will be instructed to connect each classroom to the system

Netday is scheduled for 8:30 a.m.-2 p.m.

"We're hoping to get enough volunteers to organize six teams of four people," said Ruth Bordo, co-president of the school's Parent Teacher Organization. "Volunteers will be trained to run cable through as many classes as possible. We have the potential to save thousands of dollars on electrician bills."

Steve Eisner, systems support specialist for the Highland Park school district, said people don't have to be technicians to run cable through classrooms and make the necessary connections. Each classroom that is wired by volunteers will save \$900."

"We need the technical infrastructure, permanent high speed access that's always on, not a dial up system that requires modems," Mr. Eisner said. "Cable will enable information sharing between students other schools and other districts.

Each team will have a project leader responsible for training them and supervising the connection o each classroom. Volunteers can also set up food, provide babysitting and direct others throughout the day.

"We're planning a fun day that will include lunch and snacks," Mr. Eisner said. "While the community is participating in the event they will get a better idea of what technology is being added to the school."

"Netday represents a great opportunity to allow the community and the school to become partners to bring our schools into the 21st century," Dr. Frank Fehn said, "and in the process contribute to the school and have some fun."

The council passed a proclamation honoring Rabbi Dr. Bernard Rosenberg for his work at the Congregation Beth-El, where he is the spiritual leader, with Edison and New Jersey police departments, and with the Human Rights Commission of Edison, of which he is chairman.

The rabbi, who is the son of Holocaust survivors, knew his calling at an early age.

"When I was young, growing up Jewish in a place where not many people were Jewish, I got into a lot of fights. It was then I realized there were a lot of people, like me, in need, and I vowed to fight for people in need," he said.

In Edison, the rabbi has been known as an outspoken individual.

"I am grateful for his outspo-

kenness. We need more of that. The rabbi is someone who knows what happens when you look the other way," resident Jane Tousman said. "But, in his controversy, rather than dividing people he tries to bring them together."

Last week's proclamation was the result of the rabbi's induction as the chief chaplain to the New Jersey chapter of the Shomrim Society, a national fraternal organization of local, state and federal law enforcement officers of the Jewish Faith, and the recognition of a life dedicated to improving the quality of life in Edison.

In his new role as chairman of the Human Rights Commission (he was selected last month), the rabbi said he hopes to reach out the children and teach them early on about why racism should be annihilated.

Most recently he put together a televised caucus of Edison High School students discussing why it is important to overcome bias. "My whole thrust is to teach

children respect for each other," he said.





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

Thankfully something is being done to solve this serious problem.



What is so amazing about this successful program is that it started with one person's simple idea. Rev. Stephen Rozzelle of St. Mark's Episcopal Church in Baskling Ridge developed the idea for the campaign a few years ago.


At first the campaign was just conducted by high school students; now the program is being implemented in counties throughout the state.

If you don't have a large faction of relatives or friends to give a hand, and can't afford the services of visiting personnel, there still is help. It is called Lifeline Systems.

This is the service that allows a client to push a button that. through a telephone/electronic devices, will summon help.

Many might be reluctant to engage such a service because of those unfortunate commercials where an elderly lady's fear is lost on an audience who only hears the screechy whine. "I've fallen and I can't get up." It's a line often used now by comedians and individuals as a joke.

If that patient were you, or a loved one, however, it would not be amusing. Instead, it would be amazing that though alone, unable to move, someone will be on hand to help within minutes not hours or days or when it is too late.

Lifeline requires only a telephone jack and an electric outlet. It costs about \$40 a month, and for additional \$10 a month you can add CommuniCall where there is a person at the other end. ready to speak with you at the touch of a button, including to simply have a conversation, talk you through a panic attack, comfort you while you are waiting for help to arrive.

A transmitting button is on a rope and can be worn around the neck or kept at a bedside. The ambulatory client can move anywhere within the house and still be in range of the monitor.

The service welcomes clients to just call, as often as they like, welcoming an ambulatory patient to say they are going for a walk and will call in when they return -agreat comfort to the patient as well as caregivers who are at work.

When Kathi Benneft, coordinator of the CommuniCall/Lifeline Program out of Somerset Medical Center, comes to the house with the new system, she walks the client through the program.

"If you wake up in the middle of the night and find yourself becoming tense at every little noise, call them up," she says with a smile.

She adds, "If you're alone and just can't get that crossword finished, call them up, see if they can help. If you need to be reminded of a doctor's appointment next week, call them and they will call you in time." The CommuniCall addition is another \$10 a month. But buyer beware! Don't be scammed! Don't buy the service from a private company that may or may not be available next year. Rent it from a reliable hospital or home care provider. The service is available through Somerset Medical Center at 704-0096, through St. Peter's Medical Center at the Margaret McLauglin McCarrick Care Center in Franklin at 545-4200, and Muhlenberg Hospital and its new Atlantic affiliation at 540-5753.



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
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## International Film Festival brightens up the summer months

#### WEEKEND PLUS WRITER

The premise behind an International Film Festival in Central New Jersey should be laudable: Get arthouse movies, critics' darlings and re-releases out of Manhattan and into Central New Jersey. But why do it? Somerset County, Union County and northern Middlesex County are relatively close to Manhattan, so it would make more sense for those who do like those movies to go into Manhattan and see them there. (This writer has been a member of the Manhattan-based Film Forum since 1992 and has patronized other Manhattan cinemas as well.)

Then again you do have that suburbanite mentality where many people out here don't want anything to do with New York. Festival programmer Albert Gabriel Nigrin has a formula similar to what his New Jersey Film Festival does the rest of the year: Look through the New York Times and the Village

Voice, find what's supposed to be good for you, slap a schedule together, show the movies in a crowded college meeting hall or a cavernous 1,500-seat auditorium. This approach hurt Nigrin last winter when he scheduled "Secrets & Lies" at the State Theatre in New Brunswick. "Secrets & Lies" was up for Academy Award nominations, but the State Theatre screening drew pickets and the resulting front-page coverage spooked mainstream theaters away from scheduling the movie in the run-up to Oscar night.

The International Film Festival does have some worthy choices for its second season which began last weekend. Most notably the fest may have landed the first Central Jersey showing (June 22) of "When We Were Kings," about the memorable Muhammad Ali-George Foreman "Rumble in the Jungle" in 1974 in Kinshasa, capital of Zaire (now the

Democratic Republic of Congo). "When We Were Kings" won the 1996 Academy Award

for best documentary and should have been a box-office hit given the fame of Ali. Yet, in the best Hollywood tradition, the distributor mishandled the film and never gave it a wider release to cash in on the Oscar. "When We Were Kings" has played in North Jersey but not in Central Jersey.

Getting the benefit of excellent timing are "Ernesto Che Guevara: The Bolivian Diary" (June 6) and "Watermelon Woman" (June 13). The former is a documentary on the last campaign of the Cuban revolutionary, ending with his assassination in Bolivia in 1967. How timely is it? Che disciple Laurent Kabila ousted Zaire's dictator Mobutu Sese Seko last month. The latter film is a lesbian movie that has whipped up pro-censorship and anti-gay organizations into war fever.

The festival provides a safe haven for two releases with an NC-17 (no one under 17 admitted) rating, "Crash" by David Cronenberg (June 27, 28) and "Pink Flamingos" by John Waters (July 18, 19).

"Crash" had its U.S. release blocked for six months by Ted Turner, the cable TV entrepreneur turned corporate hatchet man: three theater chains that operate in New Jersey banned the movie because of the NC-17. "Pink Flamingos" is genuinely trashy "art" that did get re-released in Manhattan and is settling in there for what should be a long run as a midnight movie, the format in which it first became famous.

Amid all the worthy films scheduled. Nigrin has a habit of taking credit for "premieres" of films that Central Jersey theaters have shown already. The festival brochure brags of "An Area Premiere" for "Kolya" and "Female Perversions," tentatively scheduled July 20. "Kolya," a lovely movie about a middle-aged man and a 5-year-old boy, has been playing Central Jersey arthouses on and off since April. "Female Perversions," based on a book by a feminist psychotherapist, was playing a Union arthouse at this writing. "The Garden of the Finzi-Continis" is listed as "An

Area Premiere" for June 21 when it played a Red Bank arthouse in December. If you didn't get to Manhattan for the re-release of "Das Boot," you won't see it here; the potential attendance wouldn't be enough to justify the cost for the digital sound system that would be required.

Still, it's worthy in a way to do a series that brings 26 features, one program of short subjects and one program of experimental film to Central New Jersey.

At least it helps keep Scott Hall (at Rutgers University) and the State Theatre, homes to most of the screenings, going during the summer when they're usually dark. At most it'll give people something to talk about.

## Weekend Plus **Experience fine dining** at The Frenchtown Inn

Follow the sun down Route 12 and stop just before the bridge to Pennsylvania. After a countryroad ride you will find yourself in the arty town of Frenchtown and just outside The Frenchtown Inn.

Dinner at The Frenchtown Inn is a dining experience; it is the night's activity. This is not the place to go if you have an afterdinner engagement. This is the place you stay and enjoy a leisurely repast fit for the most discriminating gourmand.

To begin the evening, the wine list offers a good variety priced from \$18-\$150, with a glass of most bottled wines \$5. Iced tea is served elegantly in a snifter. As you wait for your drinks you take in the rediscovered romantic old brick walls of a building built in 1805, made more appealing by candlelight, electrified in ceiling and wall candelabra, the real thing on each table, including a fresh flower and double white linen tablecloths.

Appetizers (\$8.25-\$11.95) include a charcuterie plate, smoked salmon, lobster spring rolls and bay scallops with spinach cappellini. Our special, sauteed soft shell crab, was a juicy, incredibly tender treat served with orange lentils and lump crabmeat. The lobster bisque, served in a martini glass, was a sophisticated, smooth, light puree with lots of succulent lobster bits and a whole jumbo shrimp. Menu entrees range from \$19.95 for Peking duck breast to \$26.95 for a Provencal "bourride" (fish stew) improvisation with lobster tail, scallops and shrimp. In between is beef Wellington, sirloin steak, salmon filet and rack of lamb, all with glorious combinations of vegetables and starches and condiments and herbs. The additions (not specials) included roast quail served with a wild mushroom, sausage and olive stuffing that had a unique

country flavor with a complex flair.

Everything we sampled was perfect — including the mesclun salad with roasted garlic and an apple slice coated and fried, fritter style, that somehow managed to stay crispy - down to dessert, the creme brulee was that true creamy delight, not custard, and especially good served with fresh berries.

Service is slow and deliberate. making dinner at least a twohour affair: most tables do not turn over in a night. And, as you can imagine, with this quality and quantity the bill is high, but those who appreciate and relish fine dining don't mind at all.

If, however, you must get on to another place, or your wallet is a bit thin, try the room on the other side of the front fover. The Grill Room, where dinner is less exquisite but nonetheless satisfying for those who want a decent glass of wine with a hamburger and steak fries (\$8.85) or pasta with sausage or smoked chicken or clams and mushrooms for \$7.95 or \$12.95 for the heartier appetite.

For the more refined diner, there is a rack of lamb (\$15.95) or duck pot pie (\$12.95). Even the "starters" are unique for a lively room with large bar and plenty of oak tables. There is black bean chili (\$6.50), a plate

floor into a bed-and-breakfast inn, with private baths. When that is done (hopefully next year). a ride in the country, to a charming old inn with a distinctive dining room will allow travelers a most incredible getaway.

In the meantime, go for a fabulous dinner. You have a great selection: a taster's dinner any night except weekends for \$65-85; prie fixed dinners on Saturday that includes hors d'oeuvre, choice of five appetizers, four salads, sorbet, six entrees, five desserts and coffee or tea; a clambake beer luncheon featuring Harpoon Brewery of Massachusetts (\$36) is scheduled for Saturday, June 7: a Benziger wine dinner (\$65) planned for Thursday or Friday, June 19 and 20; or a sophisticated spring brunch with a menu choice of entrees or omelettes (\$18.95).

Whichever you choose, you are in for a gourmet treat designed by a loving chef who has truly learned his craft.

## Relay ices state title for MHS 4x400 squad lifts Bulldogs to Group 1 championship

boys track and field team wrapped up the Group 1 Championships with the 4x400 relay Saturday at Frank Jost Field.

## Weichert, Realtors reports best 1st quarter in history Buyer demand reducing home inventory in many markets


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

## **Reflections on the auto business**

The automobile business is very, very big, both here and in all the industrialized countries around the world. At one time, it was estimated that one out of every nine Americans was directly or indirectly involved in the car or truck business and that involvement ranged from food service in the factories, to writing auto insurance policies for motorists. I'm included in that group, too, since I write about cars.

The bottom line of the car business is really pretty simple; someone or some business organization buys a vehicle from somebody or some sales organization and it rolls off the showroom floor destined for a finite life of service. When I was growing up, there was a standard routine. A salesman at our local De Soto, Hudson or Nash dealership ushered a customer (they weren't called consumers back then) into his showroom, exhibited the merchandise, demonstrated it and made the deal.

But things are rapidly changing and some of those time-honored ways of doing business are being circumvented. Credit unions are becoming middlemen, brokers are setting up deals and dealer association "tent sales" are collectively peddling cars and trucks in a carnival atmosphere all around the U.S.

But of all the forces for change, the most dynamic and potentially the most far-reaching is the use of the home computer and the Internet to buy new cars and trucks. To get information on the performance or esthetic factors of a particular car or truck, the interested web-surfer need only to sit down at the keyboard, click onto one of the many web sites that provide information and road tests and search among the offerings for the make and model that he or she is interested in.

Everybody from specialized information providers like the Auto Channel, to traditional magazines like Motor Trend, offer road tests and evaluations on everything from Kias to Ferraris. In some cases, they're accompanied by video clips of the car or truck being examined, and the beauty of it is that the viewer can go "tire-kicking" any time of the day or night. Then the virtual shopping begins in earnest.

the many "servers" who provide sales information. These are highly specialized businesses that research prices of any and all cars, trucks and other licensable vehicles sold in this country, including motorcycles. The know the bottom-line costs of all these. machines paid by retailers as well as the costs of all the factory options and accessories from special performance tires to cold-weather block heaters. For a price, the researcher provides an extremely detailed report on what a dealership pays for a vehicle, what the manufacturer's suggested retail price or lease capitalization cost should be, including costs and prices of whatever accessories and options are desired. The web-searchers usually wind up with much more information than they really need, but what the heck, it comes with the package.

At this point, most of us would abandon the virtual world and go out to dealerships to kick tires, inhale the new-car perfume from the unsullied interiors and peruse the colors available. If we buy, we deal with real people, sign real contracts and drive out in a euphoric stare of well-being.

But there is another way of doing it and again, it's the computer-oriented webcrawlers who are at the forefront of the new purchasing technique.

Around the country, a great multitude of dealerships have gone on-line with web sites that are, for all intents and purposes, showrooms without walls. A search of the web produces dealers of almost all brands who use their in-house web sites as an inexpensive and often very successful method of selling their merchandise. They make interactive "deals" around the country and will often provide air fare to customers who fly in to pick up their new vehicles.

The system is so new that some of the auto makers are still trying to figured out how to uphold the time-honored tradition of "turn-and-earn." This is a system whereby dealers are allotted new hot-selling vehicles based on how many of them were sold the week before. Until the advent of Internet selling, sales outside a dealer's primary area were relatively rare but now the entire world-wide web is a potential sales area for dealers who have the know-how. As it is now only about one or two percent of American auto sales are Internet-generated. I know those numbers can be increased, but it will take new and innovative technology. All the dealers have to do is figure a way to transmit that new-car interior smell over the wire.



Since most potential buyers are pretty heads-up consumers (there's that word again), they want to get a handle on what the car of their dreams is going to cost them. At this point, they click onto one of

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
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
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


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
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
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




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
