### Macrae Gets Into "Boss" Statement

The township's Democratic leadership "has degenerated from the arrogant to the ridiculous in recent days," it was asserted today by Mayor Donald Macrae.

"The intellectual level of the local Democrat leadership has hit an all-time low, if recent pronouncements by the opposition 'brain-trust' are any indication," Macrae noted in a statement released today.

"Judging from Democrat chairman John Phillips' notorious 'I'm the boss' comment and the Democrat council candidate's assertion that we are all controlled by 'intimidators and Goldwater conservatives,' it is difficult to believe that the opposition party has any intelli-

gent approach to local government.

"Now I've got a sense of humor as well as the next fellow," Macrae said. "But the Democrat Party could present a more responsible, mature approach to township affairs once in a while."

He continued, "Of course we Republicans sympathize with the seriously divided local Democratic Party over their complete lack of any genuine issues with which to hit us.

"But surely, their zealous young candidate can find something else to criticize us for besides our national preferences for the GOP presidential nomination.

"Perhaps if the Democrats

weren't so busy trying to avoid the stigma of boss-rule suggested by Phillips' arrogant comments, they might be able to do a more serious job of evaluating the present administration."

Macrae said there is always room for responsible constructive criticism concerning ways to better handle the affairs of the township.

"No one is perfect, and we don't pretend to have all the answers to all the town's problems.

"But we do have the right to expect something of a mature, responsible approach from those who would like to replace us."

The GOP mayor added, "The leadership of the local Democrat Party has an uncanny preference for totally indefensible remarks. They can't help getting caught with a foot in their mouth whenever they decide it's time to 'sound off' on some issue.

"The Republicans wish them continued success in that venture and we hope they will keep up the good work of demonstrating the difference between responsible Republicanism and immature, reckless Democrat opposition," Macrae concluded.

A Choice-Not an Echo" that is the slogan for Barry Goldwater's Campaign in seeking the Republican nomination for president. 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## Police Chief Warns About Vacations Home Burglary

Chief Boice announced today, that Mayor Donald Macrae, in cooperation with the New Jersey State Association of Chiefs of Police, Inc. state-wide program, has proclaimed the week of June 21st through June 27th as Burglary Prevention Week.

According to Chief Boice, "this is not intended to be facetious, nor an indication we're only interested in preventing burglaries one week of the year. Rather, various law enforcement agencies throughout the country have designated this week to emphasize the seriousness of this crime and how the public can help by observing some simple means to keep burglars out of their homes during the vacation months ahead."

Few people realize burglaries account for 44% of the total major crimes in the country. They occur at a much greater frequency than any other crime — one every 35 seconds, day and night, throughout the year. During 1963 there were an estimated 900,000 burglaries committed across the country. The total dollar loss of these burglaries was approximately \$200 million. Big business, yes, but Chief Boice went on to say, "alerting the public to this menace, and suggesting to them some of the simple precautions to take, can substantially reduce this menace in our community."

Here are some suggestions the police department recommends you take before leaving your home

during the warm months ahead:

1. Use good locks. Don't rely on cheap door locks to protect your home and valuables. Pin tumbler cylinder locks or locks with a deadbolt mechanism are most effective.
2. Have one or two lamps burning during the evening hours. This can be easily done by using an automatic timer on lamps or making arrangements with a neighbor to turn them on and off each evening. Lights burning all night or day and night fool no one.
3. Be sure to discontinue deliveries during your absence. A call to the dairy is safer than a note left for the milkman. The post office will hold your mail, too. Have your newspaper forwarded to your vacation spot.
4. Tell one neighbor you are leaving, ask him if he'll look after things for you in your absence — sweeping up, cutting the lawn, picking up circulars, etc.
5. Use safety latches on all windows. They'll allow the windows to be opened far enough for proper ventilation, but not enough for someone to enter.
6. Notify the Police Department when you're leaving, where you can be reached in an emergency and when you expect to return.

An informed public, cooperating wholeheartedly with their local law enforcement agencies, can successfully put Mr. Burglar, "out of business" in our town.

## Bayshore Community Drive For Hospital Organized

Madison Township has organized for the Campaign Drive for the new Bayshore Community Hospital to be built on 17 acres of land on Beers St., Holmdel, adjacent to the Garden State Parkway.

John Chamberlain, former Mayor of Madison Township and chairman for Madison Township in the Campaign Drive conducted the meeting for captains and workers in the Wrode House, Highway 35, Cliffwood Beach.

The 100-bed general hospital will serve the needs of the twelve communities in northern Monmouth County and Madison Township. Jay Longacre, Associate Campaign Director, was the guest speaker. He explained the facilities of the new hospital which will provide medical, surgical, maternity, emergency, out-patient, diagnostic and treatment services. The hospital will meet the full normal hospital needs of the people in the Bayshore area without duplicating the highly-specialized services, which may be available at other nearby hospitals.

D. Louis Tonti, Executive Director of the New Jersey Highway Authority which operates the Garden State Parkway, and a resident of Holmdel, is General Campaign Chairman. According to Mr. Tonti, the hospital will cost \$2,240,000. It will be financed by \$750,000 donations; \$750,000 government grants and \$750,000 mortgage. Donations will come from three sources: Industries, Big Gifts and the Founders Benefit Plan.

There are 1,004 volunteer workers already briefed and calling upon families to explain the Founders Benefit Plan of giving to the new hospital. Twenty-nine teams in Matawan Township, Union Beach, Holmdel and Raritan Township have already exceeded their quotas. The two top

teams have tied with 483% of their quota, from only 25% of its families.

The \$2 1/4 million dollar 100-bed hospital is planned to meet the medical demands of the surrounding areas, relieve the serious overcrowding in nearby hospitals and provide for the rapid growth of the adjacent communities in northern Monmouth County and Madison Township.

Any resident of Madison Township who would like to attend a briefing meeting to find out

more about the Bayshore Community Hospital may call the Campaign Headquarters 264-7500 for a schedule of meetings.

"If every family in Madison Township and northern Monmouth County makes a pledge when a worker calls during the next few weeks", stated Mr. Tonti, "We will reach our goal of \$750,000 which is necessary to qualify for the Hill-Burton government grant, and maintain our schedule of bids in late 1964, construction in 1965 and completion in 1966".

As a part of his Annual Report, Joseph J. ### PLANNING A PICNIC, BARBECUE, THEN READ THIS

Are you planning a picnic, barbecue, or church supper soon? If so, you will probably be confronted with quantities of food to handle on a hot day.

"Food that has not been handled properly could cause upset stomach and great discomfort to those eating it. There are, however, some precautions you can take to insure the safety of the public or your guests," says Miss Eileen Ryan, Middlesex County Home Agent.

First, make sure that everyone and everything connected with the preparation of the food is clean and free from infection.

Be sure there is plenty of hot, sudsy water available for washing hands and for washing dishes.

Secondly, keep cold things cold. The bacteria which could cause illness grow best between the temperatures of 45 degrees F and 120 degrees F. The temperature in a normal kitchen will fall into this range.

It is best to chill main-dish salads for large groups in shallow bowls or on trays in the refrigerator. In this way the temperature in the center of the food is brought down below 45 degrees F faster than if the food were stored in large, deep containers.

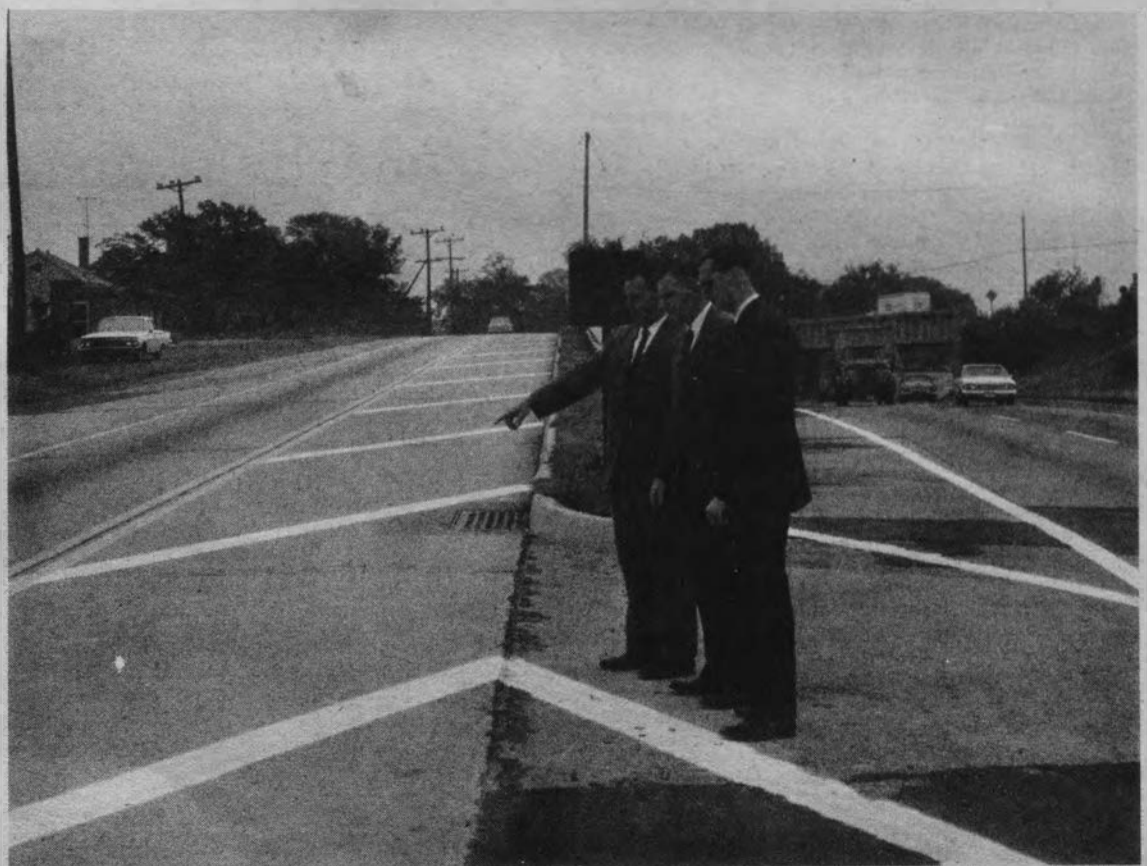
Miss Lombardi was salutatorian of the high school's first graduating class. She was selected for the prize, a \$25 check, by the high school administration for her outstanding scholastic record.

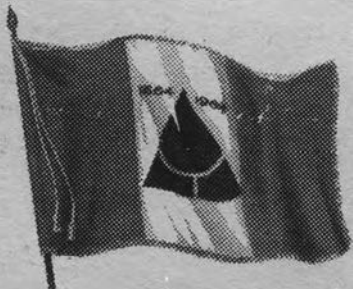

# Open New Headquarters

The general public will have the opportunity to inspect the new three-level headquarters building of The First National Bank of Middlesex County on Route 18 in East Brunswick this Saturday from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.

The new bank building, which opened for business on Monday, houses the First National's executive and administrative offices, trust department and East Brunswick banking office.

The opening culminates three years of planning to centralize facilities for the phenomenal growth of the bank which in the past decade has become one of the largest in Central New Jersey.

The bank is located at the intersection of Route 18 and Turnpike Road in East Brunswick.

Joseph G. Mark, president, called completion of the new building "a milestone in the successful growth of The First National Bank of Middlesex County which arrives appropriately with the observance this year of the 100th anniversary of our charter."

The new building overlooks Route 18 from a high natural elevation. The landscaped site is 293 feet wide by 500 feet deep and has parking facilities for 65 cars with considerable room for expansion of the parking area.

Exterior materials include pre-cast concrete louvers and panels, glass in aluminum settings, pre-cast aggregate panels and stucco. A decorative masonry screenwall accents the modern styling.

The main floor of the building is devoted to the East Brunswick banking office, which replaces rented quarters in a nearby building long outgrown since that office was opened seven years ago.

The banking floor covers 5300 square feet of space including a public lobby, two lounges, safe deposit lobby and vault, offices, and tellers' locations.

A six-station teller's fixture is constructed of laminated plastic and wood with Andes black granite ledges. It is equipped with the latest features to offer prompt, convenient customer service. Plans provide for two future teller stations.

For drive-in customers there are two drive-up windows and a walk-up window, besides built-in provisions for two future units at the drive-up "island."

Vinyl tile flooring is used throughout the lobby area and rich carpeting accents the lounge and officers' areas as well as the private offices located on the main floor. Decor includes anac-

oustical tile ceiling with recessed lighting fixtures, vinyl-covered columns and oil walnut furnishings.

The lower level houses the central accounting department and bookkeeping operations for all seven of the bank's offices located throughout Middlesex County. The directors' room, finished in rosewood paneling, is also located on the lower level plus a book vault and large storage area.

The second floor, largest of the three, provides over 9,600 square feet of carpeted floor space for the offices of the president, senior vice president, and executive vice president. In addition, the second floor has partitioned areas to accommodate the investment office, loan officers, trust officers, secretarial areas, trust department, two conference rooms and two lounges.

Speaking in behalf of the directors and officers of the bank, Mark expressed "great pride in the completion of our new bank building. This new structure is a reflection of the continued and outstanding growth of the First National Bank of Middlesex County. But more than that, it is an expression of the complete confidence we have in the future prosperity of Middlesex County and in the thousands of people and companies who entrust us with their banking matters."

Business hours for the new bank will be Monday through Thursday from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. and on Fridays from 10 a.m. to 8 p.m.

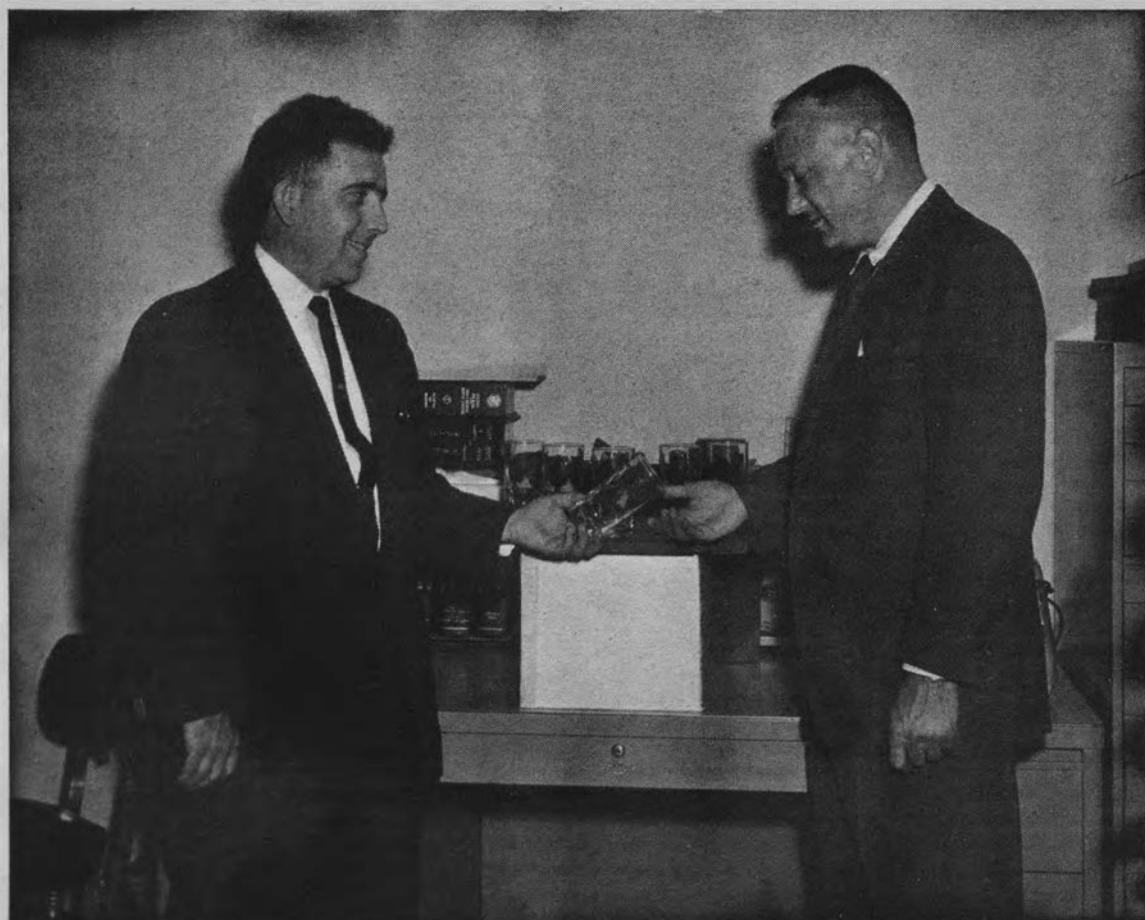

AN ORDINANCE FOR THE RENOVATION, ALTERATION AND IMPROVEMENT OF CERTAIN SECTIONS OF THE TOWNSHIP MUNICIPAL BUILDING AND THE PURCHASE OF EQUIPMENT TO BE USED THEREIN.  
BE IT ORDAINED BY THE TOWNSHIP COUNCIL OF THE TOWNSHIP OF MADISON, IN THE COUNTY OF MIDDLESEX AND STATE OF NEW JERSEY:  
1. That the Township renovate, alter and improve that section of the Municipal Building presently used and occupied by the Municipal Police Department in connection with the functions of its office and that the Township purchase miscellaneous standard office equipment to be used in the same.  
2. That no more than the total sum of THREE THOUSAND (\$3,000.00) DOLLARS be spent for the purposes mentioned above.  
3. That the total sum of THREE THOUSAND (\$3,000.00) DOLLARS as set forth above shall be raised from the Capital Improvement Fund.  
4. That this Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon final passage and publication as required by law.
