After digging about ten feet, the water was located, but the quality of it is so decidedly "different" that the "strike" aroused the owner's curiosity and he believes he has located a mineral flow.

TAKE BETTER CARE OF EYES IN SUMMER.

Colored glasses are not disfiguring, but they prevent the eyes from seeing clearly. To those who have the slightest trouble with their eyes should wear them as a protection against summer sun.

It is an interesting fact for persons who are observing to note that it is exceptional to find not one or more perpendicular lines between the brows. Whether it is that children of our generation have some nervous organization is a question for discussion, but it is true that formerly frowning lines that were a mark of age now are seen on the foreheads of young children and youthful maidens.

In applying this treatment every night the forehead should be massaged from the edge of the hair to the rows, as well as between the brows. Many women lift their foreheads over their eyes, and these are extremely difficult to get rid of once they are acquired.

This portion of the brow treated, the rest of the forehead must be rubbed with cream and then massaged. This movement should be a combination of the rotary and the straight down and out toward the temples. It stands to reason that the flesh must not be made to sag, for it would sag down over the brows; therefore effort is made to get it to one side, the stroke at the same time strengthening the muscles beneath the skin.

When wrinkles are already present strips of adhesive plaster may be used. These, after smoothing the skin, are put on in such a manner as to hold the surface smooth.

FEEDING THE BABY IN HOT WEATHER.

All careful work will go for nothing and the milk will spoil if it is not kept cold at a temperature of at least 50 degrees Fahrenheit. To keep the milk at the degree of coldness it must be on ice. Now, to put milk on ice does not necessarily mean that a costly ice man should be called for. This receipt will show you how you can easily construct a simple but practical refrigerator from a soap box that will keep a 5-cent piece of ice twenty-four hours, thus insuring the freshness of baby's milk.

In fitting out such a home-made ice chest, a soap box will do as well as a soap box, and the box then set with sawdust. In the pail is placed a thick layer, large enough to hold the ice. This receipt calls for a cover, and when packed with ice should be surrounded by bottles of milk put in the wooden pail. The bottles must then be covered with a newspaper, over which should be spread a piece of burlap or carpet. A bottle may be taken out only as it is required. Nothing else should be kept in this, and milk bottles should not be removed until the infants need them.

When the care of milk—as soon as it has been modified it should be put into a cold place. It may, however, stand until the first intention of use is required. The bottles, of course, be corked. While still warm, and before the germ-laden atmosphere can begin to affect the liquid, the bottles must be put into the cold storage box.

Though baby's milk is kept constantly cold, it is not so good to him chilled. Nothing would sooner bring on a diseased condition of the bowels. Instead, this food must be just at blood heat. This temperature is secured by putting the bottles into hot water. The original corks should not be taken out until the rubber is slipping and ready to be slipped into their places.

If baby has the slightest tendency toward indigestion when the weather grows warm, and his milk fed on milk, his food should be pasteurized. This process of sterilization should be done to all milk fed an infant until he is a year old, and even older. Another important detail to be remembered is that baby, like a grown person, requires less nourishment in summer, and it is not quantity so much as quality that is to be reduced, for a child always requires less food in summer than in winter. When the liver begins to work too frequently, a slight reduction of the quantity of cream, used in modified milk, adding as much water as cream has been taken away, will sometimes be enough to make baby well. No mother should take chances, though, and the services of a physician must be called without delay.
