### STATE CONFERENCE OF CHARITIES AID

#### Three-Day Session to be Held at Montclair, Beginning April 29

Completion of the program for its three-day session has been announced by the State Conference of Charities and Corrections, which will convene April 29 at Montclair. As has been told, the general theme will be "Community Problems." There will be discussion of housing and health in various localities, the subject of public or private relief, the opening session Sunday, April 29, which will be held in the First Congregational church and will be under the chairmanship of Mrs. Lewis S. Thompson, vice president of the conference. Governor Edge is expected to speak on the State's responsibility in solving the certain of these problems. Albert T. Harris, director of the Cleveland Foundation, will tell how to get results.  
Monday morning, in Unity church, when many of the other sessions will be held, the problem of "Child Welfare" and how to prevent delinquency and dependency will be discussed from the angles of the home, the school, and the court. Robert L. Fleming, of Jersey City, will act as chairman and prominent New Jersey workers will take part in the discussion. Monday afternoon "Health and Housing" will be dealt with, and a constructive program will be offered as to what should be done by means of laws and regulations to correct some of the existing evils. W. L. Kinkead, president of the New Jersey Housing Association, will act as chairman.  
Tuesday evening, April 30, "Social and Health Insurance" will be discussed by Dr. Royal Meeker, Camden, chief consultant of Labor formerly professor of economics at Princeton, and Dr. Frederick L. Hoffman, statistician of the Prudential Insurance Company.  
Wednesday, the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company, will be the chairman.  
Thursday morning, May 1, "Family Problems" will be the topic for consideration, with Henry L. De Forest, of Plainfield, as chairman. Robert E. Lee, of the New York School of Philanthropy, will speak on "The Essentials of a Community Program With Respect to Family Problems." Mr. Lee is chief director of the Department of Child Welfare of Westchester county, New York, will tell how that public agency is solving these problems. Various New Jersey workers will tell why it is necessary in the investigation that precedes the treatment of family problems to consult the family's relatives, employers and church, also with schools, medical agencies, etc.

The final session of the conference will be held on Tuesday afternoon, May 2, and there will then be a discussion of the immigration problem. At this session the business of the conference will be transacted.

## Commercial Problems Growing Out of War Conditions

A Non-Technical Explanation of the Big Questions Confronting Business Men at This Time

By SAMUEL WANT

### The Sovereignty of American Business.

Whatever else may be true in connection with the status of neutral trading with belligerent countries, the present situation has at least settled the proposition that neutrality is no longer a guarantee of freedom of intercourse in international commercial relations not directly concerned in the war. The world neutralism in favor of the least interference with neutral international commerce during war, expressed in many conventions and other international declarations, has proved impotent in the face of the actual or supposed necessities of the belligerents for the preservation of their national existence. The Declaration of Paris, the Hague Conventions of 1864 and 1907, and the International Naval Conference of 1909, are only some of the outstanding declarations of international law indicating a world recognition of the right of neutral commerce to unimpeded freedom of action except in so far as it would tend to directly assist the military or naval forces of one of the belligerents.

While these various international conventions have not been formally acceded to by all of the powers of the world, there has been a general acceptance of their fundamental principles; but throughout the present war the declarations from belligerents on both sides of the conflict have constituted a series of repudiations and rejections of all accepted safeguards in favor of neutral commerce.

The world has entered upon a period of the sovereignty of belligerent might over neutral rights. It is for the American people to say whether American business is to be thus stifled, and American commercial interests crushed, as a part of the furtherance of offensive or defensive operations upon the part of nations with which we are at peace.

A point has been reached in international affairs where the business interests of neutral countries have been created by business men and statesmen of the country, supported by the declarations of a neutral power, the protection of the nation of the world, including those now engaged in the European conflict. The nature of this great movement, its relation to American business, and the lines along which American business men can lead a hand in the asserting and enforcement of their rights, will be outlined in succeeding articles.

### CENTRAL POWERS SUBJECTS MAKE RUSH TO LEAVE CHINA

Tokio, March 28.—Availing themselves of what may be their last opportunity to cross the Pacific until the end of the war, sixty subjects of the Central Powers took passage on the liner China, due at six P. M., all but four boarded the vessel at Shanghai, since early in the war Teuton subjects have been forbidden to leave China only aboard American steamers. It is the possibility that the China might be the last American liner to leave China, and that the vessel would be between the United States and Germany, caused a record number of Germans, Austrians, Hungarians and Bulgarians to take passage at Shanghai.

### FIRE IN MINE IS EXTINGUISHED

Special to Courier-News: Butte, Mont., March 28.—The West Cotnam mine of the Alexandria Mining Co., which was forced to close to spend for several shifts in consequence of electric power wires starting fire in the shaft, resumed yesterday. The blaze having been extinguished.

## ACTIVITIES OF SPECIAL AID

Branch of National Society Has Many Industries and is Rapidly Gaining Members

The membership and activities of the Plainfield Branch of the National Special Aid Society are increasing rapidly. The society now numbers upwards of 800 members and new names are being added daily. The headquarters of East Front, are constantly busy answering questions of inquirers, supervising the sewing, receiving the materials and instructing members in the making of surgical dressings. Everything made is kept for the use of the base hospital. If one is established here, as the officers feel sure it will be, the supplies will be used for the soldiers wherever they may be.

The headquarters have been donated for two months and all the furniture and equipments have been given for the use of the society. One donor, whose name is withheld for the present, has built a large house and turned it over in its entirety for the use of the society in case of emergency. Several people have offered four or five beds at their homes.

Among the departments in which citizens are asked to aid are the following: Agriculture in all its branches, clerical service, manufacturing and mechanical work, personal and domestic service, professional service, public service, transportation and trades. There are three classes in first aid, a motor squad of forty members is being taught; translators have offered their services in German, French and Italian languages; many girls of eighteen years and over have agreed to become munition makers and several women have declared themselves ready to conduct trolleys in case the roads are conducting should enter the army or navy.

### RAILROAD PLACING EMBARGO

Special to Courier-News: New York, March 28.—On account of an accumulation of freight at Galveston, the Southern Pacific Company has announced the placing of an embargo on all goods northbound routes via the Mexican line steamers. Shipments intended for the use of the United States Government are excepted. As soon as conditions at the Southern port become normal the restrictions will be abolished.

### YALE MEN TO FLY

Twenty-nine to Study Aviation at West Point. New York, March 27.—Twenty-nine officers of the aerial coast patrol, all Yale men, will leave Wednesday for the aviation training camp at West Point, N. Y., for six weeks of flying. All of the expenses of the trip will be met by Henry P. Davison of J. P. Morgan & Co. The expedition is a reward for the good work done by the Volunteer Aerial Coast patrol, Unit No. 1, with the "muse line" in the industry last fall. This unit was organized through the aid of Mrs. H. P. Davison, John May Hammond, Alan Adams Peir, Alan R. Hawley and Hour Woodhouse.

### MORGAN AIDS ARMY

Lends \$1,000,000 Without Interest to Pay War Supplies. New York, March 28.—J. P. Morgan & Co. by a timely loan of \$1,000,000 without interest to satisfy the claims of Government creditors has prevented the business of supplying the needs of the army from coming to a standstill. Payment for government supplies was stopped last March 2 by failure of congress to pass the army appropriation bill. One contractor had \$250,000 coming to him but the government had no funds. Another business man to whom the government already owed \$20,000 wrote across the face of a requisition for \$50,000. "We will do no more business with the government until it pays its bills."

### SEVENTY DEAD PURDYS EVICTED FROM CEMETERY

New York, March 27.—Seventy bodies of members of the Purdy family of Port Chester who died during the last hundred years were removed from the family burial place around in auto trucks to Greenwood Union cemetery in Rose, N. Y., where they were reinterred. Living members of the family did not want to prevent the removal of such activities in or about graves. It is a rule of the cemetery that no body of New York who recently bought the Purdy estate.

### TAKING OUT BIG LIFE INSURANCE

Special to Courier-News: New York, March 28.—H. P. Davison, of J. P. Morgan Co., is contemplating taking out an additional \$1,000,000 life insurance. Mr. Davison now carries \$1,000,000 insurance and is doubling the amount. The policy is to be written by the New York Life Insurance Co., but will be distributed with several other companies. Harold Pierce will have charge of writing the policy, he having insured J. P. Morgan recently for \$2,500,000.

Articles of incorporation for the Aceto Dye and Chemical Company with its principal office on Durham avenue, Metuchen, have been filed at the Middlesex county clerk's office, the agent being Small W. ### WHAT NEWSPAPERS MUST NOT PRINT

Regulations for the guidance of the press of the United States in handling news in the present emergency, which have been framed by the State, War and Navy departments and approved by representatives of the principal press associations, have just been made public.

They set forth that no information should be published which would tend to disclose the military and naval policies of the United States Government. No information should be published which tends to disclose movements or employment of armies, fleets, movements of vessels, departure of merchant vessels, a statement or movement of groups of individuals, of officers and men of the army or navy, transportation of mails, supplies or munitions. It is further requested that no information be given as to designs, intentions or test or distribution of implements of war, concentration of military or naval supplies or location of such activities in or about arsenals, fortifications, army posts, naval bases and radio stations, publication of any maps, diagrams or photographs. No moving pictures should be displayed which are of military or naval value. Any doubtful matter should be submitted to the authorized representatives of the department concerned. It is requested that no information, reports or rumors attributing a policy to the Government be published.

## State's Fishermen Are Preparing for the Opening of Trout Season

## SUNDAY IS THE DAY

Sleepless nights and dreams of the coming trout fishing season affect many a country boy just now, and some of the city folks as well. The great metropolitan center of the fishing game takes place next Sunday. Many anglers are now in training, some, but to the angler it means a spell in the country waiting a favorite stream in search of the elusive speckled trout, with a fly rod and worm as weapons. There is no law against Sunday fishing in New Jersey. There is in Pennsylvania.

Trout fishing in New Jersey is no longer a job. A few years ago, when the State was so backward in the maintenance of a hatchery that never existed, it was, indeed, toilful to spend time and money searching for trout that never existed. All that has been changed now and today the angler can look forward to the coming season with more than a degree of certainty as to the trout are in the streams to be sought. The only drawback that can be mentioned is that the water, in unusual condition, which is unusually high because of the great amount of snow and ice that accumulated in the winter. That the coming season will be the best that has happened in years is the opinion of those who are in the systematic stocking of the water with matured fish has been carried on by the members of the Board of Fish and Game Commissioners for four years, and the work is now being continued. Ten millions of trout have been liberated in that time, and great attention is being given, as well as knowing when and where to place them in the water. Wonderful results have followed. Many streams are now stocked with more than three weeks by men who usually get their bearings before the season opens. Reports from many show that the trout are in the streams for food. Rainbow trout measure four to five inches in length. The fourteen inches have been seen in the first moving object that appeals to them. One party of three anglers spent an entire day along the banks of the Passaic river, looking for signs of trout, and they returned well satisfied with what they saw. Reports from the other parts of the State, especially Monmouth county, where the streams have been stocked, are encouraging. Fishing, while as far south as the county, where the trout are newcomers, the anglers are making good. The fact that the catching of trout has been so successful is an annual event, while far off, sex, not to be outdone, is sending out the word that the trout are breaking the ice. The trout of the week it will have disappeared entirely. Warren county has many fine streams, and with the fishers there from the last season. Hackettstown, while Morris county claims to have received more than that of any other county in the Passaic county, Union county, Bergen county and Middlesex county streams have been well stocked, and the work will be continued until next Friday, when the waters will be withdrawn from the work to the anglers who are impatient for a chance to take a chance before the season opens.

Manhattan anglers will go to Monmouth county on the opening day, as the streams are about down to their normal spring capacity. Brook trout has been stocked in the following streams of Monmouth: Yellow brook, Pink brook, Rock brook, Little Passaic brook, West Passaic brook, Metuchen brook, Milltown brook, Rock brook and Arrowhead brook. Middlesex county—Mill brook, Green, Indian Spring brook, Basking Ridge brook, Sage brook, Silver brook, Little Passaic brook, West Passaic brook, Metuchen brook, Milltown brook, Rock brook, West Passaic brook, Metuchen brook, Milltown brook, Rock brook and Arrowhead brook. Union county—One of the best streams in the county is the Passaic, last fall and thousands of trout were lost. It is the Railway river at Hoodwood mills and the Passaic. 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
