Miss Shirley Davis has been enjoying her "happiest hour," teaching French to the ninth grade since the Fall of 1952.

"I am a French teacher," she said, and has found her teaching a wonderful chance to know the students better.

Her active life as headmistress does not prevent her from participating in community affairs which include the League of Women Voters, the Present Day Club and serving on the joint management committee of the YMCA-YWCA.

"Working on joint management will help me in learning what the problems of the future will be. But I must say that the joint meetings that have been held by Miss Fine's and Princeton Country Day School have shown a wonderful spirit of co-operation."

Both Miss Davis and Mrs. Alfred Busselle, the administrative assistant, are on the council of the National Association of Schools for Girls. Mrs. Busselle, who has been with Miss Fine's for 12 years, is also the editor of the association's 1960 proceedings. In discussing the school, Miss Davis stressed the growth in importance and responsibility of the middle school council and activities.

The library council has also grown in responsibility and interest, she said. The council was started four years ago and is now bringing out a phamphlet, "Undercover," in which students from the fifth to 12th grades write book reviews.

Two Russian classes are now offered at Miss Fine's, one for beginners and one for the advanced pupils.

Miss Davis also reported that she has been delegated a specialist on Switzerland and was greatly honored to address the sixth grade geography class on Switzerland!



THE NEW SCHOOLS MFS-PCD

Plans for Miss Fine's and Princeton Country Day Schools on their future joint campus off The Great Road have been reported by the chairman of the Miss Fine's trustees, Mrs. Barklie McKee Henry.

The 58 acre property includes the generous gift of 40 acres of Mr. and Mrs. Dean Mathey and purchase of the 18 acre Colross property with its Georgian 1799 mansion moved from Alexandria, Virginia 30 years ago.

As a first step, Michael Rapuano of the firm Clarke and Rapuano Landscape Architects, has been retained to study the site and to recommend locations for the buildings, roads and playing fields.

A joint steering committee of the two schools has been established. Three sub committees have also been formed to further plans for the joint schools.

The program committee was set up to study what the basic philosophy of the two schools should be and what the educational goals would be for the two schools on a co-ordinate campus. The members stressed the need for excellence, individual attention to students and development of intellectual curiosity. Also stressed was the need for involvement of parents and participation in furthering new classroom techniques.

The new plan will combine the lower schools, administered by Miss Fine's, kindergarten through fourth grade, with both boys and girls totalling 210 students.

Miss Fine's will have a separate middle and upper school, grades five through 12, with 315 students and Princeton Country Day will have its middle and upper school, grades five through 12, totalling 300 students. The number of PCD students is slightly lower due to the larger proportion of boys who go away to preparatory schools. The two schools will eventually total 825 students compared with the present 520 students.

The steering committee also studied what facilities could be used by both schools. The members decided that this will include the library, the auditorium, visual-aid equipment, science and language laboratories, arts and crafts, music, kitchen facilities.

Teachers may be shared for art, music, dramatics, science, Russian, Greek, etc. and in some advanced courses for a few highly qualified students.

The members of the committee who studied these problems over a period of six to eight months were Mrs. Douglas H. MacNeil, Mrs. Robert G. Potter Jr., Mrs. J. Richardson Dilworth and James I. Armstrong, representing Miss Fine's; Marston Morse, Sidney Shea, Chester Stroup and C. William Edwards from Princeton Country Day School and Richard W. Baker and Mrs. Henry, trustee representatives.

The second sub committee decided on the choice of an architect for the new building. Frederick B. Adams Jr. was the chairman and the members include C. McKim Norton, David H. McAlpin. They chose the New York City firm of Moore and Hutchins and preliminary plans and sketches should be ready by Sept. 1. Moore and Hutchins designed the new music building on the Princeton University campus.

The fund raising committee was composed of Warren P. Elmer Jr., chairman, J. Richardson Dilworth, Bernard Kilgore, Dr. Sachs-Wilmer, Mrs. Hibben Ziesing and Henry H. Patton. They decided to employ the firm of Marts and Lundy. The committee conducted a survey last Fall to determine the climate of opinion and the chances of success for raising the money needed. The findings were favorable and a fund raising campaign will be started this coming Fall.

This year over \$40,000 in unsolicited gifts have been received for the joint project. The first work to be undertaken will be the roads and playing fields.

Secretary's Report

The annual meeting of the Miss Fine's School Alumni Association was held on May 22 where new officers were elected and reports were given by the treasurer and the president.

Mrs. A. Peter Carter presented the treasurer's report. The Alumni Association has had its own bank account as of February and presently has a balance of \$434.15. This year the balance will be made available for the Alumni Magazine.

Mrs. Wells Drorbaugh gave the president's report. The board members had voted not to merge the Parents' Association with the Alumni Association.

Revisions which the board has made for its members were outlined by Mrs. Drorhaugh. The four officers will remain—president; vice president, who is to organize all social activities, secretary and treasurer. In place of the members at large there will be three board members, one to act as liaison to the board of trustees, one to act as liaison to the Outgrown Shop and the current editor of Alumni Magazine.

The association will continue its membership in the Alumni Presidents Council.

Two constitutional amendments were made and passed unanimously. The changes are article IV, section 1, stating the change from nine to seven board members, their terms being: officers, two years; alumni representative to Outgrown Shop, two years; alumni representative to board of trustees, three years, magazine editor, one year.

The other change concerned article V, section 5, stating that the treasurer of the Alumni Association will be given \$500 from the board of trustees for a yearly allowance.

SCHOLARSHIP BENEFITS

Deemed a major artistic and financial success was the second annual Festival of the Arts. The festival netted \$4,750 for the May Margaret Fine Endowment Fund.

Nearly \$100,000 worth of art works were on exhibition and sale at the show held Oct. 17 through 20. There was an over-flowing gallery of contemporary sculpture, ceramics and paintings from nearly every eastern state and several foreign lands.

Mrs. Augustus K. Mills was general chairman with Mrs. Peter C. Cook and Mrs. Gilbert Lea cochairmen of the painting department.

Benefit Dance

The Benefit Dance Committee has announced that the dance held in February netted \$1,255.63 for the endowment fund.

The 10th annual dance will be held Feb. 4, 1961 in the Miss Fine's School gymnasium.

UNIVERSITY HONORS

MRS. WADE

The head of the French department at Miss Fine's School, Mrs. Mable Hamilton Wade, was named a recipient of the second annual "Princeton Prizes for Distinguished Secondary School Teaching in the State of New Jersey," a series of four yearly awards consisting of \$1,250 each.

Announcement of the awards was made by President Robert F. Goheen at Princeton University's commencement, June 14, in recognition of Mrs. Wade's "fruitful teaching, devoted service and human as well as professional qualities."

A graduate of Marietta College and a recipient of a Master of Arts degree in French from Columbia University, Mrs. Wade has studied at both the Alliance Francais in Paris and La Sorbonne.

After two years of teaching at Bradford Junior College in Massachusetts, she joined the faculty of Miss Fine's School in 1927 and has played a prominent part in the school's growth through five administrations.

At Miss Fine's School, Mrs. Wade, the wife of Professor Ira O. Wade of Princeton University's Department of Romance Languages, has taught French during her entire tenure in grades nine through 12. For 16 of those years, she has served as faculty advisor to the junior class and to the student social service committee.

Mrs. Wade has, for 15 years, served as academic head of the school whenever the absence of the headmistress made it necessary.

In 1959, Mrs. Wade was awarded a "Certificat d'Honneur" from the Concours National de Francais sponsored by the American Association of Teachers of French because of the excellence of her students in these competitions.

Four of the five American Field

Service Scholars from Miss Fine's School have been named to go to France (to spend their junior year abroad) largely because of their excellence and fluency in the language and the extraordinary interest which Mrs. Wade has developed within her students.

The tribute paid to Mrs. Wade in the 1959 Senior Yearbook at Miss Fine's emphasizes the qualities and talents which have led to her selection as one of the 1960 Princeton Prize winners.

"The teaching of French takes on a new dimension in her classes for through her scholarship and contagious enthusiasm, she instills not only a knowledge of the language and literature of France but its culture, its people and its way of thinking," reads the tribute.

ALUMNI WHO'S WHO

The achievements of Miss Fine's School alumni are varied—ranging from a pianist playing in Austria to the school's first Guggenheim Fellow. Many of the alumni are quietly disproving the bitter and sometimes exteremly emotional argument of career versus motherhood.

Mrs. Marina von Neumann Whitman is certainly such an example. Malcolm Russell Whitman, age seven months and the beginning of a Ph.D. thesis in the area of American private foreign investment have proved to be a perfect combination, aside from the usual demands of a home.

After graduating from Miss Fine's in 1952, Mrs. Whitman majored in government at Radcliffe College. She was co-editor of the News, Junior Phi Beta Kappa and won the Phi

Beta award for the highest ranking senior.

She graduated from Radcliffe College Summa Cum Laude and was awarded the Fay Prize for the member of the class "showing evidence of greatest promise."

Commuting four days a week from Princeton to New York City, Mrs. Whitman received her Master of Arts degree from Columbia University's department of economics in February 1959 and passed her Ph.D. orals in May 1959. Her Master's thesis "The United States Investment Guaranty Program and Private Foreign Investment" was published by the International Finance Section of Princeton University in February 1960 and was sent by the State Department and ICA to various embassies and missions around the world.

She has received two Columbia University Fellowships and this past year a dissertation fellowship from the Earhart Foundation.

Miss Sarah Hart has continued her piano studies and is seriously thinking of a career. She received her Master of Arts degree four years atter graduating from Miss Fine's in 1953, from the Yale School of Music.

In Princeton she played with the Princeton University Orchestra and gave a recital after graduating from Yale.

She studied and played in London, England and has been working in Vienna, Austria for the past year, under the famous teacher Seidelhofer.

Last Summer she also studied and played in Salzburg. Miss Hart is returning to Princeton this month.

Miss Jane M. Cooper, class of 1942 from Miss Fine's, has been granted a fellowship by the John Simon Guggenheim Memorial Foundation. She is the first alumna to have received this distinction.

The fellowship is for creative writing in poetry and she plans to spend a year abroad, principally in Italy and Greece. After graduating from Miss Fine's, Miss Cooper attended Vassar College, received a Bachelor of Arts degree from the University of Wisconsin and a Master of Arts degree from the University of Iowa. She is a member of Phi Beta Kappa.

At present, she is a member of the faculty of Sarah Lawrence College, where she has taught creative writing and literature since 1950.
