



The inventor believes that Niagara might be harnessed and electricity transmitted from the Horse Shoe Falls to New York or Boston.

THE PHOENIX IMMIGRATION.—The arrival of 3,850 immigrants at Castle Garden, yesterday, makes the total for the month thus far 43,261, which is a greater number than ever before recorded here on any one month. The highest figure ever before reached was 48,774, in April, 1878. The following is the list of the immigrants: 502, from Hamburg, 1,816, Baltimore, from Bremen, 1,194, Algeria, from Liverpool, 423, State of Indiana, from Chicago, 502, The Belgians, from Antwerp, and the General French, from Bremen, passed Quantico last night, and their passengers were not landed. There are eight more steamers expected to day, which, with the two above mentioned, will bring the total increase of immigration in April to between 47,000 and 48,000.

There has been a marked increase in the immigration of Hungarians, owing to the terrible distress which prevails in the northern districts of Hungary. The number of these has been reduced to the lowest depth of destitution, and hundreds of families are fleeing from the suffering and seeking refuge in this country. It is said that the authorities of Hungary are becoming alarmed at the large emigration of their people, and are beginning to consider means to check this depopulation of their country. Much suffering from severe weather is reported.—New York Advertiser, April 30th.
