**THE NEW JERSEY NEWS.**  
William Dabell still lies in jail at Paterson, the Court having refused to accept all sureties so far offered. The Court adjourned Saturday until Tuesday, and declined a proposition of counsel to permit bail to be taken meantime, insisting that the security must be offered and acted on in open Court. Dabell seems to think the Court is reluctant about letting him get out of jail.  
The Paterson Iron Works there has just been forged the heaviest piece of iron ever made in this State. It is a heavy frame for the steamer W. A. Slotten, now being repaired in New York. It is 23x27 in. and weighs 15,000 lbs. It was made in the Paterson Iron Works, and it is the heaviest piece of iron ever made in this State.  
The quantities of herring caught at the Gloucester fishery are so large that they have become almost unsalable.  
A full grown whale, fifty or sixty feet in length, came ashore at Leonardville on Monday last. The fishermen of that district were afraid to undertake its capture with the weapons they had, and on Wednesday evening the unusually high tide enabled it to get off.  
In his next Geological report, that of the present year, to be issued in the fall of 1881, Dr. Cook, the State Geologist, will publish a report on the climatology of this State, based on statistical information collected during the past year. It is a very complete and valuable contribution to our knowledge of the climate of this State.  
A despatch dated Atlantic City, May 18th, says: "There is a great misunderstanding about the amount of damage by forest fire in this country. The reports of the burning of the forest are greatly exaggerated, and the amount of damage is not so great as is generally supposed."  
Jacob Schaffer, of Trenton, who introduced his son, Dr. Schaffer, in the latter's drug store, Monday evening. Fortunately, the Doctor had his hands clasped in front of his body, and the bullet struck the index finger of the right hand, penetrating it and bruising the skin of the right hand. The man raised the pistol to his head, when the Doctor ran into the hall, followed by his father. A struggle ensued, and the pistol was fired. The old man was arrested and locked up. The Doctor is now in the hospital, and the pistol is in the hands of the authorities.  
The late Chief Justice of the Court, of New Jersey, died at his residence, at Rahway, N. J., on Saturday last. He was 82 years of age. He was a member of the Union League, and was a very popular man. He was a very able and successful judge, and his death is a great loss to the State.
