## GIVE US GOOD CANDIDATES.

It is not within the proper sphere of our duty as conductors of a public newspaper, to make individual nominations for members of our city government. That duty belongs to the primary meetings. Neither should we, in advance, dictate the particular duty of these meetings. They are to be decided by the voters of the city.

Their duty is to devise plans to advance the public welfare, especially to ease us of the burdens of municipal debt to such an extent as to render the load tolerable. Our duty is to reflect the best popular opinion as to the nominations, and to the plans suggested by the members of our government, to adjust that load so as we can carry it.

Keeping ourselves within the appropriate sphere of duty, we have expressed, with freedom, what we deemed were the true sentiments of most intelligent citizens with reference to the proposed plan of our Common Council to compromise our debt. That our views correctly reflected those sentiments is now a demonstration. Only about one in four attended the polls. Had the plan suggested of the majority, the results of the election would have been different. We have called out the largest vote ever polled. Three out of four paid no attention to the election, and the majority of opinion that the scheme proposed was childish and senseless.

It may be natural that those who inaugurated it are at hand. Those who are wrong in an argument, when their arguments fall generally get mad at their opponents. We do not believe they will help the case by their irritation. The problem proposed to solve was not a party problem. The creditors, in conformity with the laws governing human nature, will treat it with the calmness of critics. Getting mad will not help the debtors. It will not show the creditors.

Again, there is no sound sense in continuing to show that the debt was imprudently incurred. That is not the question to be met at. It is imprudently incurred. No sane man doubts it. Our whole people, of both political parties, were bound to permit it. There were no sane men at the time. There were no sane men at the time. There were no sane men at the time.

We are just as anxious as any one that our city shall be relieved, and that the relief shall come as honorably and quickly as possible. We, however, will not permit ourselves at this time to be diverted from the main question by personal attacks. The action of our citizens in regard to the recent special election seems to have angered a small tribe of insects which attributes our virtues as the cause of this action. This is all a mistake. We only reflected the popular sentiment. We showed our sympathy with the object proposed. We asserted the opinion that the plan proposed to accomplish it would not do it. When it was found that the substantial bulk of our people agreed with us in that opinion, this tribe denounced us personally and howled at our putting into print the reasons for our opinion. They seem anxious to be noticed, and for once we will oblige them. If all vulgar assertions were true it would not touch the question in dispute. We have written a good deal more upon the question of settling our financial troubles. To those of our readers who answer our arguments by personal defamation, because we use the peaceful weapons of logic and type, we propose their methods, we simply quote the language of another:

"It is not the practice with destroyers of vermin to allow the little victims a veto upon the weapons used against them. If this were otherwise we should have done so verminous verminous little tooth-combs, another protesting against mouse-traps, a third prohibiting the finger and thumb, a fourth exclaiming against the instrument of using soap and water. It is impossible, however, to listen to such pleas. They must all be caught, killed and crushed in the manner and by the instrument most efficacious for their destruction, and the more they cry out the greater, plainer, is the skill used against them."

But, after all, the thinking people have no sympathy with personal controversy. They very properly ask: What can be done to get our city out of its financial embarrassment? In answer to this we say the question is one which cannot be answered off-hand. If one tribunal had the power to compel the city to pay a certain amount, and the creditors to accept it, the answer would be easy. But there is no tribunal possessing that power. What we insist, no settlement can ever be made except upon a basis that will be acceptable to all the creditors. We cannot force them. Their notions as to our ability to pay are their own.
