



All indications are that it is destined for the kind of drastic revamping dealt to many of the administra-tion programs in 1977.

But an overall tax cut at least as extensive as the one suggested by the White House appears likely. Many leading economists favor a larger tax cut than President Carter has recommended. On the basis of their projections, a tax cut substantially in excess of \$25 billion would not only be fiscally sound, but fair to
