

At the present time, only the interstate highway system qualifies for direct 90% federal funding. Mass transit projects receive 80% federal funding. Bridge replacement projects are given 75% and secondary roads qualify The idea of making transit fiscally attractive to local government through revision of the funding ratios has been endorsed by President Carter. But the administration program submitted to Congress by Transportation Secretary Brock Adams calls for the funding ratio to be equalized for all transportation programs at 60% federal, 20% local.

A weakness with this recommendation is that it fails to provide the incentive needed to promote new initiatives in mass transit planning and spending. Eventually, when

a coordinated transportation system has been estaeu, an equalized funding ratio might be justified. But not look early this year at the Highway Trust Fund and the Ever since 1956, federal taxes on gasoline and other automotive products have been funneled into the Highway Trust Fund to help finance the Interstate and other federally-supported road programs.

Now that more than 90% of the Interstate system has Now that more than 40% of the Interstate system has been completed and mass transit is in greater demand, some way must be found to free Highway Trust Funds for transportation programs other than road construction.

One option before Congress is to broaden the trust fund into a general transportation account from which support can be drawn for both highway and mass transit programs. Another would be to scrap the trust fund, putting high-way-generated tax revenues into the general treasury and drawing on the treasury for highways and mass transit grants.

Whatever the outcome, the final goal must be the creation of a balanced, functional transportation system that can cut gasoline consumption, lower the bill for imported oil, and provide safe and speedy bus and rail service at a significantly lower cost per passenger mile than the

Bet be aware that choosing the mover with the lowest estimate may not ultimately give you the lowest total In fact, under BPU regulations, the total moving cost can be as much as 25% higher than the estimate. However, any higher than that, the mover must file a detailed explanation with the board. You may do your own packing, but the public mover is not responsible for damage resulting from any faulty packing.

Though movers are willing to unpack containers they pack, they will not unpack any you have packed.

Major appliances such as stoves, refrigerators and washing machines must be disconnected, and usually they require special servicing to protect their mechanisms during movement. This is your responsibility, not the mover's. You are also responsible for taking down all blinds, draperies, window cornices, mirrors or any other items attached to walls. Consumers are also required to take up carpets which are tacked down. If the mover has to perform any of these services, he will charge you extra -- by the hour. And remember, that under no circumstances should you pack jewelry, money or valuable documents with your belongings. Matches, inflammable or other dangerous articles should also be excluded.

You may request exclusive use of the moving vehicle if you do not wish someone also be excluded. Consistence New if you do not wish someone else's goods to be transported with your belongings. Just he willing to pay an extra charge.

Before the truck leaves for your new home, get a bill of lading, a receipt listing your goods, signed by both you and the mover. Make sure it also lists the following: extra charge.
