

Carter should follow in facing up to Soviets



This one Lilliputian country, the Republic of Maldives, consisting of a string of 2,000 tropical islands in the Indian Ocean, only 215 of which are inhabited, recently told the mighty Soviet Union to "go figh." Badly in need of cash, the Maldives offered to rem one of its uninhabited islands, Gan, formerly the site of a British air base. In line with Britain's world-wide retrest from power, her forces had been withdrawn in 1976.

In time a Source will have delivered to the line of the lin In June, a Soviet military delegation paid a visit to the Maldives and proposed to lease Gan Island, complete with its British-built 8,700-foot runway, rader station and other electronic installations, for \$1 million per year. Allegedly, the Soviets would use the island to repair and supply their fishing hours in the ladian Ocean.
But President Ibrahim Nasir, less wishy-washy than other heads of state, had the good sense and courage to say, "No, thank you." He explained the Maldives did not wish to have another superpower settle on its island paradise. It would seem the Maldive leaders did not trust the Communists to limit their activities as promised. If only President Carter would take a leaf from the book of President Nasir! To date his foreign policy has left everything to be desired, chiefly because of his compulsive obsession with detente.

President Carter unilaterally, without the advice or consent of the Senate, returned the Crown of St. Stephen to Janos Kadar, Communist dictator of Hungary,
