





A lot of things are different today. in some quarters, the possibility is being suggested the extraordinarily severe weather experienced by the United States in the past two years may be the result of weather modification of a highly refined nature. Drought in California and other western states, violent loods, often in unusual areas and heavy snow and wintry emperatures in the Midwest and on the eastern seaboard -- can they all be just a happenstance: In May, 1976, Soviet Party Chief Leonid Brezhnev nuclear bombs." According to "Argosy" magazine for that month, Brezhnev meant "weather war." Later the same year, the Canadian government protested to the USSR about the disruption of regular Canadian broadcasts caused by powerful radio waves from a sending station on the Soviet Baltic coast. These Soviet transmissions, the most powerful man-made transmissions ever recorded, were monitored in the range of 40 million kilowatts. They were so powerful they upset the lonosphere with electromagnetic waves.

And it is from lonospheric conditions that weather systems develop.

Drastic changes have occurred in the jet stream which, customarily flowing from west to east across the United States, creates weather patterns. These were revealed in an upper atmospheric chart published by 'Time" magazine on Jan. 31 of last year. At about the same time, Canada charged the Soviets with tampering with the upper atmosphere. Stories appeared both in this country and in Canada about the Soviet interference with weather on an inter-
