



In private business, monopoly has been disarmed by federal and state anti-trust laws against combinations which restrain free, competitive trade.

In government, monopolized power has been forestalled by the constitutional division of power between legislative, executive and judicial authorities.

The monopolized power of labor union houses is expressly exempted from the anti-trust laws which so firmly restrict the employers of both union and non-It is this exemption which has permitted the United Mine Workers to bring every section of our nation to its knees, even as the federal government is spending millions of taxpayer dollars to solve energy shortages. Consider the monopolistic organizations of police, firemen, school teachers and other public service employes who frequently walk off their jobs together—anti-strike laws to the contrary notwithstanding, and then demand exemption from the legal penalties for If all of these monopolistic union entiries should ever act in concert nation-wide, our country could be forced through the bloody horror of anarchy into the iron flat of a tyramical dictasorship.

This could well result from the present irrational xemption of labor unions from the anti-monopoly regulations.
So inequitable and dangerous a gap in our legal protections should be closed during the present session of the 95th Congress. Several bills which would accomplish this end have been introduced.
