### It's no secret: U. S. mental health ails

it's no secret the United States has a tremendous mental health problem. An estimated 30 million persons in this country -- one out of every seven -- suffer from some form of mental or emotional illness and need some kind of treatment. Even sadder, an estimated eight million children --5% of our school age population --need help for psychological disorders.

These figures exclude six million people who are mentally retarded. Years ago the mentally ill went to insane asylums, and most lived out their lives in such institutions. ociety was content to see them shut away, but as we came to understand more about mental illness, facilities and treatment improved. it was not long, however, before facilities --particularly state hospitals for the mentally ill --became severely overcrowded. Although treatment in these facilities was reasonably successful for many patients.

With all that excluded it became apparent that the recovery rate could be improved considerably in a better environment.

Proof of its effectiveness in channeling patients back into the community can be found in statistics. In 1955, some 550,000 mental health patients were residents in hospitals. Federal legislation was first approved in 1963 to assist in the construction of community mental health centers, with subsequent amendments providing finds to establish and operate special services for alcoholics, drug abusers and children. icoholics, drug abusers and children. By 1970, the number of patients in mental hospitals had dropped to 371,000. Five years later, in 1975, the rander of invitationalized patients was 224,000.

Although the development of new drugs and chemical Although the development of new drugs and chemical therapy is partially responsible for this significant reduction, most of the success is attributed to the spread of community mental health centers.
