In 1902 and 1903 violent fires and floodwaters almost destroyed the "Silk City," but even today Paterson survives with hundreds of smaller industries humming in the factories where a single product was made in the past. 





# feds eye the obvious: A belanced budget

Reversing a trend that has been underway for decades, Congress has begun moving toward a balanced federal budget. federal budget.

The first concurrent resolution on the budget, adopted earlier this year, projected a record high deficit of \$60 billion. But largely as a result of spending cuts made by Congress during the year, adjusted figures in the second budget resolution submitted last month whittle the projected deficit to less than \$40 billion.

Continued movement in this direction, coupled with action to reduce the balance of payments deficit, will speed a return to economic stability, it is the best possible tonic to cure inflation.

The revised budget figures would allow a \$19.4 billion tax cut beginning next January instead of the \$16.3 billion tax cut package approved in the House. The extent to which additional tax cuts can safely be applied is under consideration in the Senare. applied is under consideration in the Senate. Scaling down our nation's budget deficit and providing tax cuts are not incompatible goals. They can be achieved --with beneficial results for the nation's package, including a reduction of capital gains tax rates. In light of the revised hadget estimates, I would welcome a fiscally-realistic extension of the tax cur This would be in line with my vote earlier this year to reduce the 1979 projected deficit by \$10 hillion. What is needed in Congress in this period of inflation is a firm commitment to these goals:

-- Positive, effective restraints on the growth of federal spending through mandatory budget cuts for every branch of government. Eliminating waste and needless spending can achieve massive savings without undermining the effectiveness of reducing the scope of essential federal services.

--More tax cuts rather than less, with a strong accent on providing relief for middle-income families. A direct result of extended tax cuts would be to spur the nation's economy and combat inflation.

--Cutting the budget deficit to a level where it becomes feasible to balance the budget in the foresee-The consumers who were surveyed unanimously wanted this requirement extended to all perishable foods and 95% wanted it extended to all foods. in a recent assessment of the first year of zero-base
