## Health agencies keep state's eye on sanitary laws

The New Jersey Legislature created the State Board of Health in 1877. Over the years, it became the focus of a new day of health and sanitation laws. Under the State Sanitary Code, the State Board of Health is the agency responsible for enforcing the laws. The board is composed of representatives from the State Department of Health, the State Department of Education, the State Department of Transportation, the State Department of Agriculture, and the State Department of Public Safety. The board is headed by the State Commissioner of Health.

## Heavy trucks would be barred near Featherbed bridge

Reports to the Featherbed L.A. Bridge over the Passaic River, owned by the Middlesex Water Co., was the reason councilmen passed an ordinance on first reading that would bar heavy trucks weighing over four tons from certain streets. The measure was advanced unanimously on first reading. It calls for the restriction of the bridge to vehicles weighing less than four tons. The law would also restrict the bridge to vehicles with a gross weight of less than four tons. The measure was introduced by Councilman Thomas A. Harrison of 17 Westfield Ave. and is expected to pass on second reading.

## \$200,000,000 bond issue gets approval for ballot

Additional proposal the Capital Needs Commission agreed with the state's

A \$200,000,000 public and percentage bond issue, which heavily emphasizes urban areas, will be on the November ballot. Gov. Brendan T. Byrne made that official in Trenton Sept. 21 by signing the enabling legislation. The bond issue is part of a larger package of \$250,000,000 in bonds. The package includes \$100,000,000 in general obligation bonds and \$150,000,000 in revenue bonds. The revenue bonds are to be used for the construction of new roads, bridges, and public facilities. The general obligation bonds are to be used for the purchase of land and the construction of new buildings.

The Clark School Board of Education has approved a report that suggests the creation of an assistant superintendent position. The report was prepared by a committee of the board and was presented to the board on Sept. 21. The committee found that the current structure of the school district is inefficient and that the creation of an assistant superintendent position would improve the district's ability to manage its operations. The report also suggests that the assistant superintendent should be responsible for the day-to-day operations of the district and that he should report to the superintendent.

## Salaries approved for school officials

## Rent ordinance amendment would decontrol some units

Several amendments to the rent ordinance of the townships of the Middlesex County, which were adopted at the Sept. 18 meeting of the Township Council, would decontrol some units. The amendments were proposed by Councilman Thomas A. Harrison of 17 Westfield Ave. and were approved by a vote of 5-2. The amendments would allow landlords to raise the rent on certain units without having to go through the rent control process. The units that would be decontrolled are those that were built before 1940 and that are not subject to the rent control ordinance.
