



U. S. tux dellars held finance world handouts

By E. Sidman Wachter

Many millions of United States taxpayer dollars are being slipped into Communist Cuba, Vietnam, Cambodia, Laos and other Communist slave nations through the United Nations and the World Bank.

One loophole for U.S. taxpayer dollars is the United Nations Development Program to which Americans were forced to "contribute" \$115,000,000 last year alone.

This outfit is financing a \$49,000,000 aid program for Communist Vietnam and a \$13,000,000 hand-out to Fidel Castro's Cuba.

Meanwhile, Communist Angola has not only hit our Meanwhile, Communist Angola has not only hit our nation's taxpayers for more than \$5,000,000 in direct foreign aid but is getting another \$10,500,000 through the United Nation's Development Program. Handouts to Marxist-ruled Mozambique, which is doing its utmost to destroy anti-communist Rhodesia, total \$36,000,000 half in direct U.S. aid, the other half through the U.N. Equally bad, or worse, is the International Development Assn. of the World Bank; which is considering no less than five no-interest loans for Communist Vietnam to the tune of \$160,000,000. Scheduled for repayment over a 50-year period, with nothing to be repaid during the first 10 years, and only the principal to be repaid during the ensuing 40 years, these loans are on terms far more favorable than those which can be obtained by Free World countries Washington did reject Hanoi's insolent demands for \$4,750,000 as "war reparations."

But Tran Doung, director of Vietnam's Central Bank, boasts, no doubt correctly, the U.S. will end up by forking over the money indirectly through the World Bank's IDA program.

DA program. Like so many hand-our agencies, the World Bank was It was designed to assist post-war reconstruction and development of UN member countries.

On what country does it depend for its continued. You guessed it -- Uncle Sap. Indeed, in the past 33 years, the U.S. taxpayers have paid a staggering \$5,000,000,000 into the World Bank and its branches. In 1956, the World Bank branched out with the International Finance Corporation (IFC).

The purported objective of IFC is to encourage the growth of private enterprise around the world, but one Its results in the past 22 years have certainly all been negative, whether or not its efforts have been In 1960, along came the international Development Assn. 

A public referendum is a chance for the voters to tell government officials what they want.

This November, New Jersey residents will have the opportunity to be heard on six questions appearing on the state-wide ballot.

In addition to electing candidates for public office, New Jerseyans will decide on four bond issues and two constitutional matters. two constitutional matters.

I will try to describe briefly the questions you will be asked to vote on next month. Anyone wishing further information should contact my legislative office for measure must be submitted to a referendum vote, the proposal to authorize jai alai in New Jersey will be on the ballot. The games would be regulated and controlled by the state, a parimutual betting system would be permitted, and the entire net proceeds of jai alai would be applied to the relief of municipal real properry taxes in countries where the games are played.


Passage of this measure would mean New Jersey
would have more forms of legalized gambling than any years, this proposal would, by means of a constitu-tional amendment, incorporate the county courts into the Superior Court system. According to the adminis-trator of the courts, this merger would merely change the bookkeeping from two systems to one, thus saving the counties \$2,400,000. This would provide \$100,000,000 for public buildings, including renovation and construction of facilities for the mentally retarded and renovation of the Trensor -- Green Acres bond issue -- Similar in structure to preceding Green Acres (Land and Water Conserva-tion Fund) band issues, this measure would authorize issuance of \$200,000,000 worth of hands to be used for the acquisition and development of open-space land in New Jersey.


--Refinancing of the New Jersey Sports and Exposition Authority -- The refinancing at a lower interest rate will produce an estimated \$111,000,000 in increased revenues to the state over the life of the bonds.
