Johnson to open house this evening

A spokesman for the Union County Regional High School District No. 1 announced Arthur L. Johnson Regional High School in Clark will be open this evening from 6:30 to 9:30 p.m. to enable teachers, parents, students and administrators of the elementary school system, district and non-public schools, as well as all other community organizations to take part in an open house in accordance with the "Expanding Vocational Opportunities" project.

The open house will enable parents and especially eighth-grade students, to visit the school and gain a greater understanding of vocational opportunities in the regional high schools by having classes in operation and appropriate teaching staff available to inform and counsel those attending.

The need for first-hand visual contact becomes important when the entire breadth and scope of the vocational programs housed in the high school is considered. In addition to the regular teaching staff, a guidance counselor will be available in the school to answer questions regarding course and career choices.

The Career-Vocational Education program will be administered by Stanley Grossman, coordinator of industrial arts and home economics education, with the assistance of Mrs. Emma Massey, business and distributive education coordinator.

Programs being exhibited will include: Machine shop, cabinet shop, mechanical drawing, automobile shop and co-operative industrial education; metal shop, general shop, shopwelding, heating, ventilation, air conditioning and refrigeration; office education, distributive education, "Food and Clothing," "Personal and Family Living" and guidance counseling.

First-aiders offer advice on emergencies

A spokesman for the Clark Volunteer Emergency Squad requested the cooperation of township residents in addressing the following emergency procedures:

—Post the telephone number of the Clark Police Dept., 386-3434, at each telephone in your home. Those who have a "Speed Calling" telephone, this number is 1-1-1.

—"Code No. 2" can be found easily, even in the dark.

—When a medical emergency arises and an ambulance is needed, please telephone the Police Department at the above number. Tell the dispatcher you want an ambulance and give the house number, street and apartment number if any. Also give your name and telephone number if it is within the telephone area.

—Return to the patient. Re-assure him or her on the way. Should there be any indication of neck or back injury, do not move the patient.

—Designate someone to stand in front of the building to signal the emergency units when they arrive on the street and lead the way to the patient. During daylight hours the waving of one's arms should be sufficient. At night the flashing of a porch light or the waving of a flashlight will be particularly helpful.

—Place the family dog in another room.

—If the family physician can be reached by telephone, advise him of the nature of the situation and what steps have been taken.

—Should the emergency be on the street, follow the procedure outlined above for reporting it. If it is an automobile accident, where someone is trapped, where someone is injured or where someone is trapped, do not move the injured or allow anyone to move them. Don't even lift the subject's head in place until he is secured. In any case, do not move him from the scene until he is secured.
