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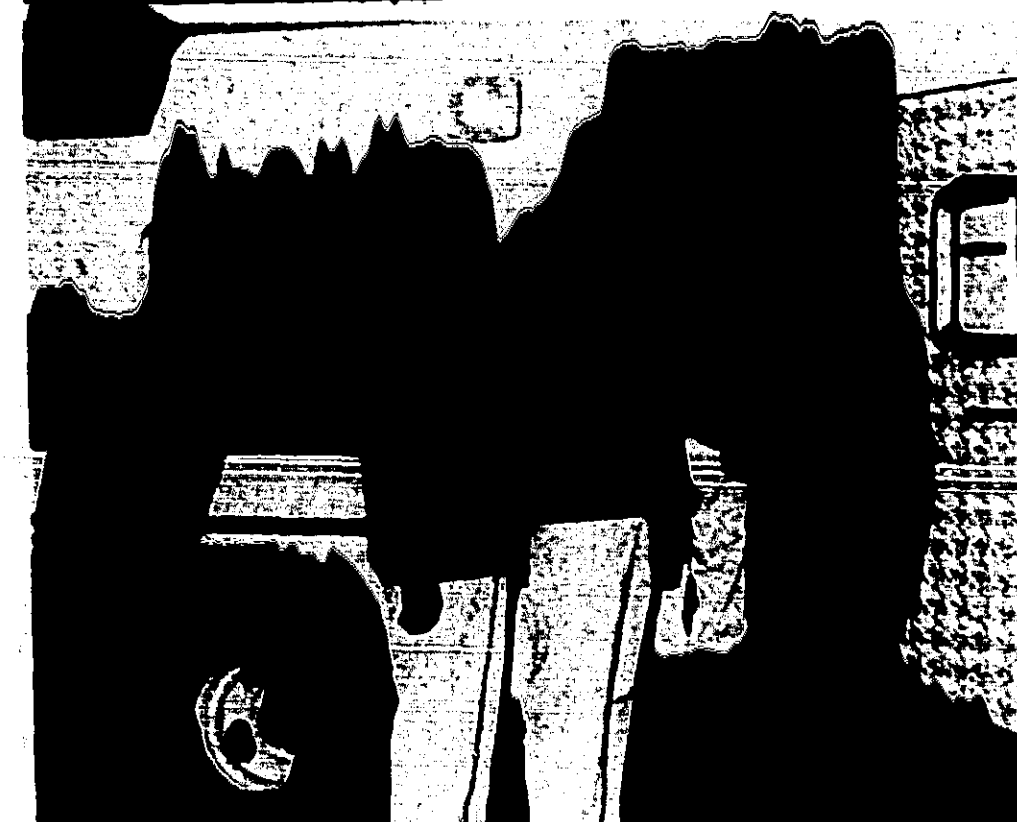

ATTORNEY AWAY ON CASE IN PHILADELPHIA

Hearing on Abraham Clark postponed until May 22 at residents' request

A postponement until Thursday, May 22, has been granted in the suit filed by a group of residents last December to restrain the township Board of Education from selling the Abraham Clark School property to the Public Cultural Foundation of New Jersey.

According to a Board attorney, John P. Higgins of Westfield, 130 residents asked for the postponement because their attorney, Neil Broder, was on an airplane in Philadelphia and was unable to appear before a Superior Court judge Monday. A. Feller in Elizabeth last week.
