Planning Board members had voted July 8 not to pass a resolution giving the Board of Education permission to divide the land on which its offices are located from that containing the now-closed school, which School Board members have voted to sell. According to Township Attorney Joseph J. Triasi, the Planning Board is required by law to take a formal action either granting or denying the subdivision. Since the July 8 action was not followed by a formal resolution denying the subdivision, state law requires the subdivision be filed as being granted.

He explained Tax Assessor Frank W. Naples was instructed by him, as mandated by state law, to record the Abraham Clark property as a subdivision because formal action was never taken specifically denying the subdivision within 45 days after the School Board filed for the subdivision.


