Three changes on state ballot for constitution

Three amendments to the New Jersey Constitution will be submitted to New Jersey voters at the Tuesday, Nov. 4, General Election, noted a New Jersey Tangier, N.J., spokesman.

The first proposed amendment is to change the Article II, paragraph No. 4, to raise the fiscal year from July 1 to January 1.

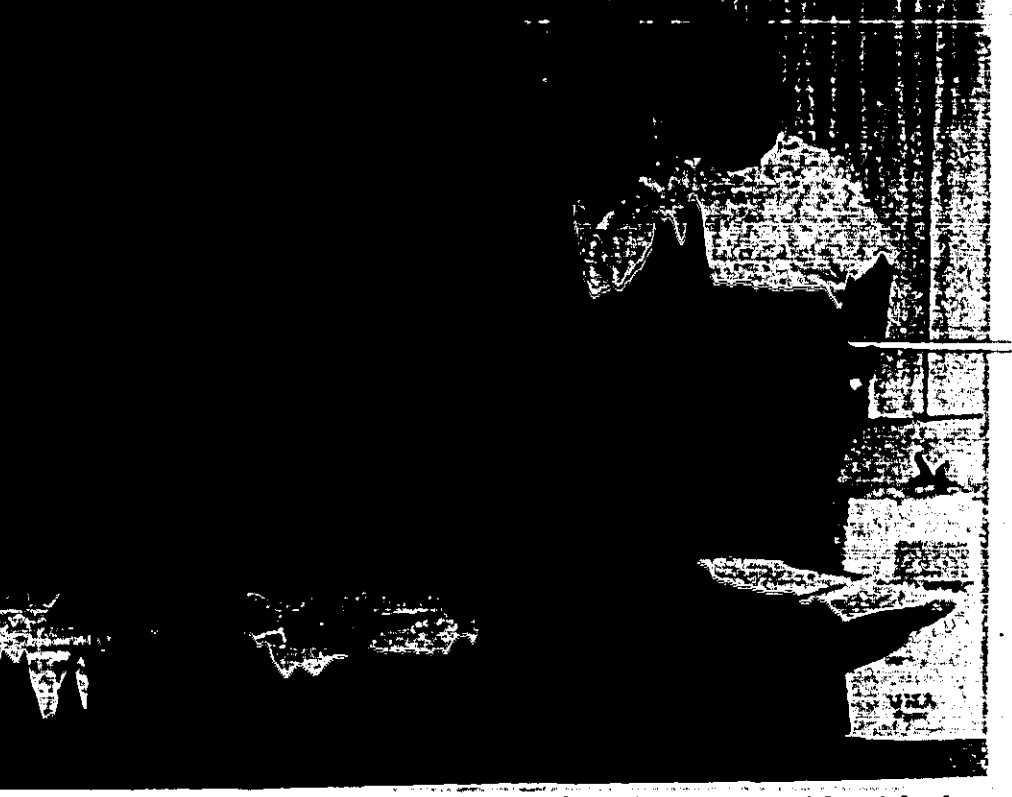
The second amendment would increase the amount of the deduction from the present \$140 to \$200 next year, to \$225 in 1982 and to \$250 in 1983 and thereafter.

In addition, the maximum amount for the deduction, exclusive of Social Security and other federal, state and local surcharges, would be raised to \$10,000 in 1980, \$12,000 in 1981, and \$14,000 in 1982.

The third amendment is to bring the amount of the deduction for the first 10 years, more in line with increases in the amount of the deduction.

Approval of this amendment could place additional pressure on the Legislature to pass the Tax Relief Fund which has been passed in the past. To have the deduction for the first 10 years, more in line with increases in the amount of the deduction, would be a significant step in the direction of a more progressive tax system.
