## Area voters follow county

Area voters generally agreed with the county-wide and nation-wide Republican victories in the Nov. 4 General Election, although the race for Union County sheriff proved to be the dividing line between Clark and Rahway balloters.

City voters gave their higher tally to the eventual victor, incumbent Democrat, Ralph G. Froehlich, while Clark residents preferred GOP hopeful, Alfred Vardalis. Sheriff Froehlich, the only Democrat at the county level to survive the GOP landslide which started with the victory of GOP Presidential hopeful, Ranald Reagan, tallied 99,129 votes countywide, compared with 87,142 for Mr. Vardalis. in Rahway, Sheriff Froehlich had 5,173 votes to 247 for Mr. Vardalis. Township voters gave Mr. Vardalis 3,863 votes to 3,740 for the Democrat. However, in every other instance from President to freeholder, the two municipalities agreed with the county choices, although not in the same order.

The Republican incumbent, Rep. Matthew J. Rinaldo, garnered 6,786 in Clark and 7,485 in Rahway, the hometown of his Democratic opponent, Mrs. Rose Z. Monyek. Mrs. Monyek had 1,318 votes in Clark and 2,513 in

Rahway.

Rep. Rinaldo, winning his fifth term with victories in all 18 municipalities in the 12th Congressional District, tallied 134,481 votes to 35,546 for Mrs. Monyek districtwide. The winner in the Presidential sweepstakes, Ronald Reagan, took 51% of the county vote with 112,034 to 86,039 for incumbent Democratic President Jimmy Carter and 15,512 for Illinois Rep. John Anderson, an independent cardiate an independent candiate.

President-elect Reagan had 5,283 votes to 2,863 for President Carter and 567 for Rep. Andersoa in In Rahway, Mr. Reagan had 5,582 votes to 4,835 for President Carter and 627 for Rep. Anderson.

Jumping back to the county offices, both municipalities favored the three Republicans, but not in the same order as the county wide to the

order as the county-wide totals.

Around the county, Roselle Park Mayor Miss Virginia
M. McKenney led the GOP trio with 92,485 votes to
91,431 for Frank H. Lehr of Summit and 90,875 for
Peter F. Okrasinski of Union Township.

The Democrats, who lost their bid for freebolder,
were topped countywide by Mrs. Joan D. Allen, followed
by Dexter A. Martin with 80,552 and Herman Schreiber
with 79,474. wih 79,474. Rahway voters agreed with the Republicans, although in different order. Miss McKenney polled 4,808 to 4,697 to Mr. Okrasinski and 4,645 for Mr. Lehr. Clark had the same order in the freeholder vote, with Miss McKenney tallying 4,254 to 4,224 for Mr. Okrasinski and 4,164 for Mr. Lehr.

Among the Democrats, Mrs. Allen tallied 4,516 in Rahway and 3,212 in Clark, Mr. Martin had 4,548 in Rahway and 3,007 in Clark, and Mr. Schreiber had 4,295 in the city and 3,107 in the township.

## State bonds get area nod;

Union County went along with the remainder of the state Nov. 4 in approving three hond issues on natural resources, public buildings and energy conservation and two constitutivnal amendments dealing with senior-citizen tax deductions.

A public question which would have permitted Sunday horse racing was rejected in Union County 85,429 to 62,238, as it was statewide.

A constitutional amendment which would have altered restrictions on boardwalk amusement games where merchandile is given as prizes was also defeated in the county 81,569 to 68,877. It also lost statewide.

In the county, 100,272 voted for the natural-resources bond issue while 59,952 said "so." On the public-buildings bond issue, 89,093 voted "yes" and 71,838 were opposed. buildings bond issue, 89,093 voted "yes" and 71,338

A total of 123,626 county voters approved and 61,556
rejected the constitutional amendment extendinguesiorcitizen eligibility for deductions on real property taxes.

On the other senior-citizen constitutional amendment to increase deductions, 124,822 voted "yes"
and 35,539 voted "no."

A total of 62,312 voted "yes" and 66,095 voted "no"
on the energy conservation bond issue.

Township voters favored the antural-resources measure 3,567 to 3,363, opposed public buildings 3,719 to
3,364 and favored energy conservation 3,880 to 3,072.

On the same three questions in Rahway, the first

4,426 to 3,575 and the third was favored by a 4,137to-3,693 margin.

On both senior-citizen questions vosers in both
municipalities went along with the county feeling.

The tally in Clark for extending eligibility to those

approved 5,187 to 2,161, and that for increasing
deductions was favored 5,505 to 1,655.




