The Clark Township Board of Education has approved a \$235,000 curriculum plan for the 1982-83 school year. The plan, which was presented by the board's curriculum committee, includes a variety of new programs and materials.

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Chief outlines bicycle rules

There are more than 100 million bicyclists, nearly half of the population, two wheeling today, making the need for bicycle safety more important than ever, according to Chief Anthony J. Smar of the Clark Police Dept.

"American Bike Month" this month is dedicated to promoting safe bicycling. For more than a quarter century, communities throughout the country have held special events geared to making their areas safer places for bicyclists.

Chief Smar noted that because more and more youngsters and adults are riding their two-wheelers for fun, physical fitness, energy conservation and short-haul transportation, Chief Smar emphasized the need for bicycle safety education in the schools, community centers and in co-operation with local law enforcement agencies.

Recent studies have revealed a common cause of many traffic accidents is the lack of eye of the motorist. Police chief said.

Misleading patterns of the driver were blamed at automobiles, frequently overlooking the face of the bicyclist on the road. The chief cautioned motorists to remain alert

for bike riders, and respect their right to the road. Some bicyclists also perform erratic and illegal maneuvers in unexpected places such as exiting from driveways and sidewalks onto public roads without looking, thus creating hazardous situations. Failure to stop or yield at controlled intersections and wrong way riding also contributed to bicyclist accidents, he added.

The chief reminded youngsters and adults along with the rules of the road there is further need for maintenance of a bike to make sure it is in safe operating order.

Most experts suggest bicycles should have regular maintenance inspections at a local bike shop, but there is no reason why the bike riders can't take some simple steps toward preventive maintenance on their own.

Handbars and seats should always be adjusted to fit the rider and tightened. Chains should always be kept lightly oiled, and brakes should always be checked before going out on a bicycle. Riders should also check tires to make sure there are no stones or glass bits lodged in the treads and they are properly inflated.

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Johnson chorus gets Montreal bid

The Arthur L. Johnson Regional High School Choral Crusaders of Clark will participate in the Montreal Music Festival from Friday to Sunday, May 21 to 23, thanks to a resolution passed April 20 by the Union County Regional High School District No. 1 Board of Education, which governs the township school.

Thirty-two students and four chaperones will participate in this international music show, and their choral performance will be judged by international experts, reports a Board spokesman.

In other action, the Board approved the operation of a summer school program at the Clark school from Monday, June 28, to Thursday, Aug. 5, with courses being offered for review, credit and enrichment, and the district will receive a grant of \$24,500 to support a project to permit the employment of \$24,500 of a home economy teacher in development work.

Students, enrolled in the program, will take a trip to the Space Museum in Washington, D.C., on the 30th of this year.

Authorized at the township school, the program will be held on Monday, May 24, and Tuesday, May 25.
