Council okays sale of bonds worth \$850,000

The sale of \$850,000 in township bonds was approved on July 29 by the Township Council to go to the lowest of six bidders, the United Jersey Bank of Hackensack.

That bank bid \$850,153 at an interest rate of 10 1/2%. Other bids submitted ranged to around 10.25%, reports the Office of the Township Clerk.

In order to enable township residents to be eligible for federal flood insurance, the Council also introduced an ordinance which would re-define certain flood-plain areas to conform to the federal regulations.

In particular, one section of the flood-plain ordinance would be modified to state the federal insurance administrator has identified the flood-plain area having special flood hazards, has provided water-surface elevations for the 100-year flood and has provided data sufficient to identify the floodway.

Also introduced was an ordinance to amend Clark's interlocal services agreement with Union County to aid the township further in receiving Community Development Block Grant funds.

The public hearings and possible final adoption of the two measures will be held on Monday, Aug. 16, at 8 p.m.

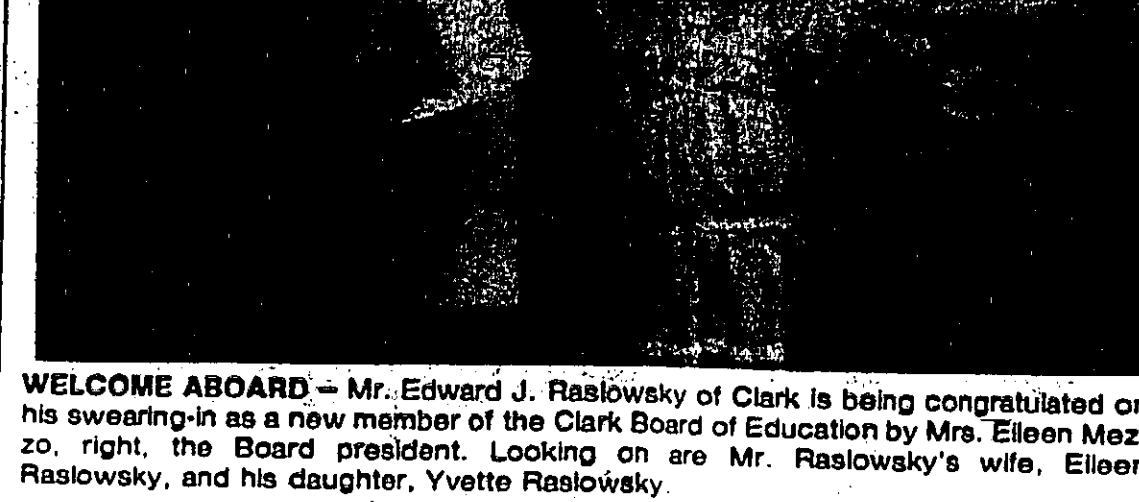
Councilmen also approved a resolution declaring a 1985 Rambler, a 1973 Plymouth Fury and a 1973 Plymouth Fury four-door station wagon used by the Police Dept. as surplus property, and authorized the business administrator to conduct the sale of bicycles and other miscellaneous equipment in addition to that mentioned above on Saturday, Aug. 14, beginning at 9 a.m.

Also approved was a resolution okaying an agreement with the state for the improvement of the intersection of Westfield Ave. and Raritan Rd.

The Governing Body also gave its permission for the late filing of the annual audit for the fiscal year ending on Dec. 31, 1981, by Supple, Clooney and Co., with three certified copies of the resolution to go to the Division of Local Government Services of the state.

Also authorized was the hiring of Gerald T. Ghislen, an attorney, to represent Alfred Yersich of the Clark Police Dept. in connection with a matter pending in Municipal Court, at a maximum fee of \$500.

Bingo licenses were approved for Temple Beth Or, St. John the Apostle Roman Catholic Church and The Gran Centurions, all of Clark.

School districting to be explored by Board Aug. 10

The Clark Board of Education has undertaken the task of studying the organization of the township's elementary schools.

This study is being conducted by a committee composed of three Board members, Thomas Faria is chairman of the committee, and other committee members are Edward Dreyfus and James Kehoe.

The concept of reorganizing the district's schools is not a new idea. Last October, there were 13 plans submitted to the Board by Superintendent of Schools Dr. John T. Farnella for study and review. The Board decided at that time for the 1982-1983 school year, the organizational pattern of the schools would remain the same. However, the Board felt further study was necessary, and thus the committee was formed.

The committee's task is to study the overall picture of the Clark school system including enrollment trends, effects of program offerings as a result of declining enrollment, uses of facilities, district lines, economy factors and overall effectiveness of the current organization of the Clark school system, the committee chairman added.

This Board committee has been studying those 13 plans plus some additional plans that have been offered by the administration. The committee has held meetings with Dr. Farnella, School Business Administrator Philip Miller and school administrators. These meetings have been information-gathering sessions designed to bring many variables into proper perspective, the Board official noted.

After gathering most of the preliminary data, the committee will report to the full Board. The first presentation of this data will be made to the full Board on Tuesday, August 10, at the Board of Education offices on Schindler Rd., Clark. The committee will be making further reports to the Board, Mr. Faria explained.

The Clark school system currently is comprised of the Frank K. Henly and Valley Road Schools, for kindergarten to fifth grade; Charles H. Brewer School, for sixth to eighth grade; Carl H. Kumpf School, for kindergarten to eighth grade and the Board of Education Administration Building on Schindler Rd.

Five year study cites regional scores

A five-year review of the Minimum Basic Skills Tests results of the Union County Regional High School District No. 1, which includes Clark, shows an excellent pattern of student achievement, reports a spokesman for the district's Board of Education.

The review of basic skills tests results for the period from 1978 to 1982, conducted by the New Jersey State Dept. of Education, resulted in state approval of the basic-skills instructional programs of all four high schools of the regional district, the spokesman added.

Included in the five-year review report is a statistical comparison of 1982 Minimum Basic Skills test results with 1980 results. In these analyses students at David Brearley Regional High School in Kenilworth showed a significant gain in computational skills, students at Jonathan Dayton Regional High School in Springfield showed a significant gain in computational skills, and students at Clark County Regional High School in Berkeley Heights showed no significant change in either area, this is to be expected due to the very high percent of students passing the basic skills tests each year, the spokesman pointed out.

Tank case to begin Sept. 28

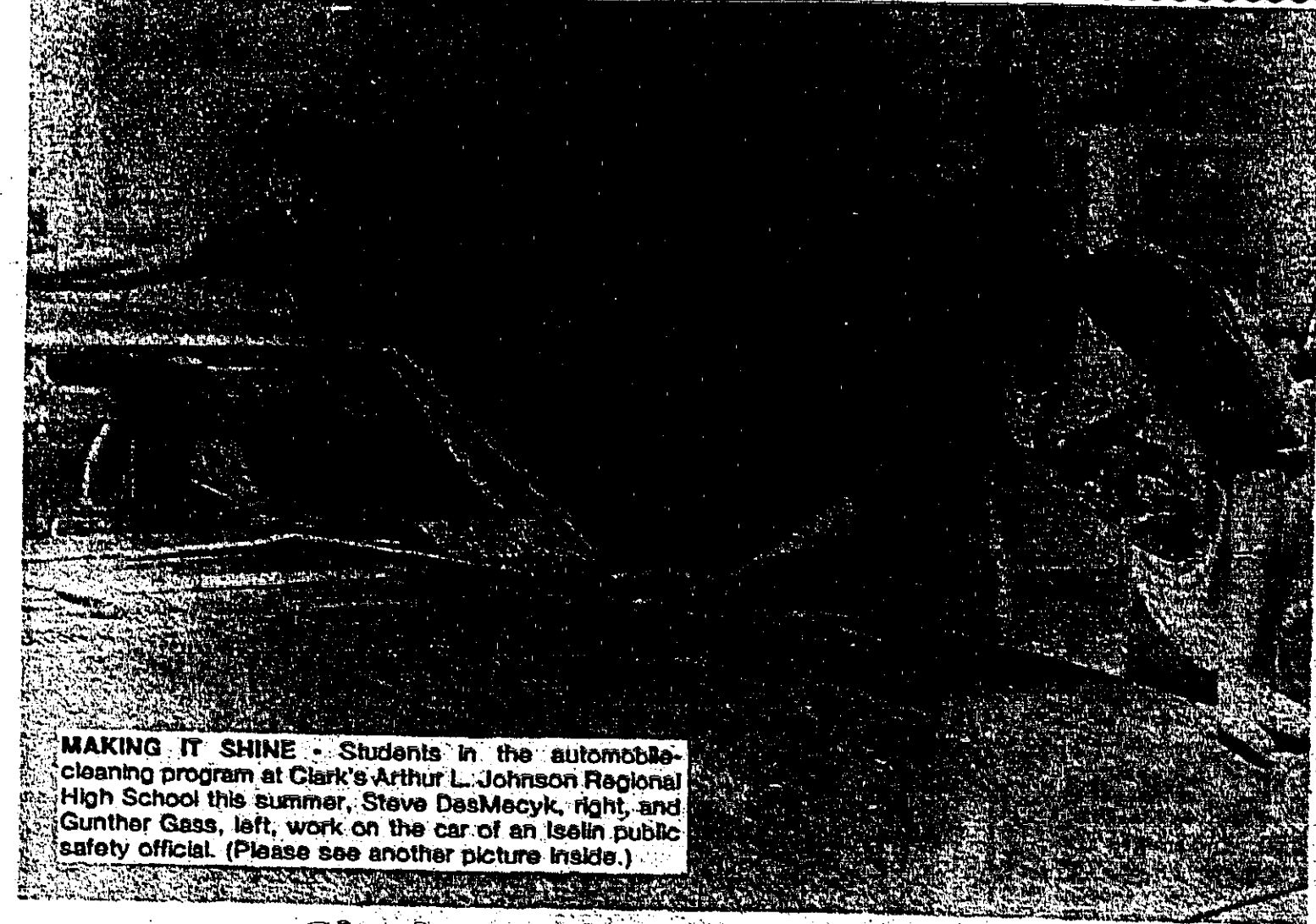

Clark students put gleam on cars as they learn

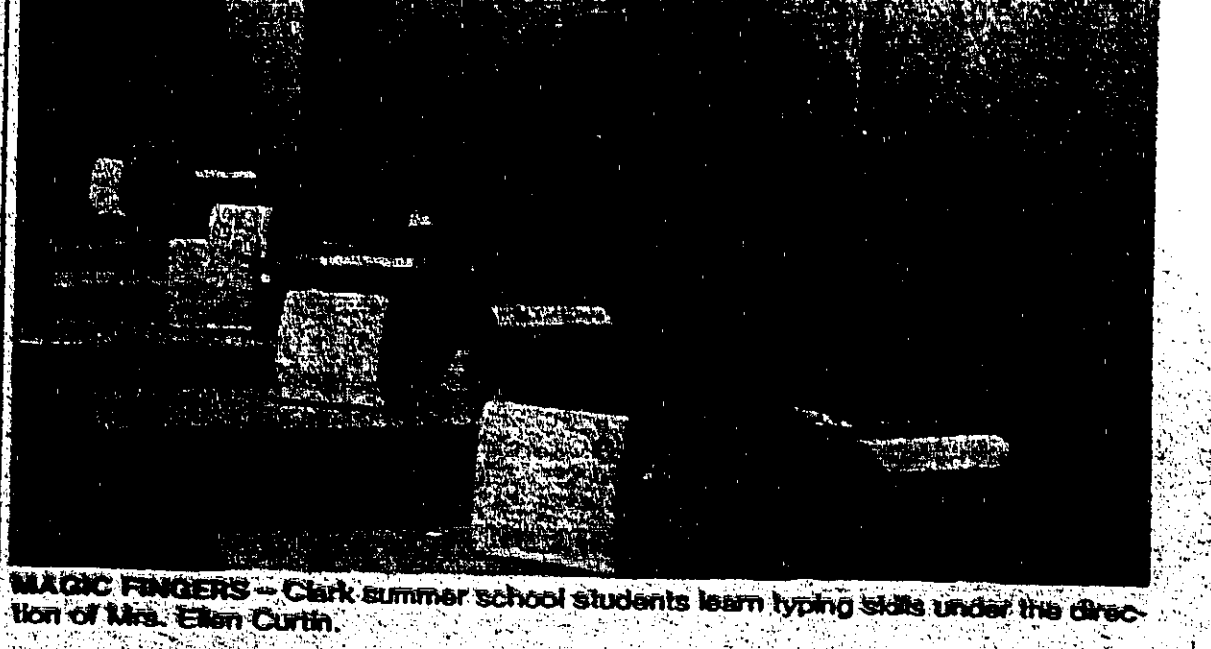



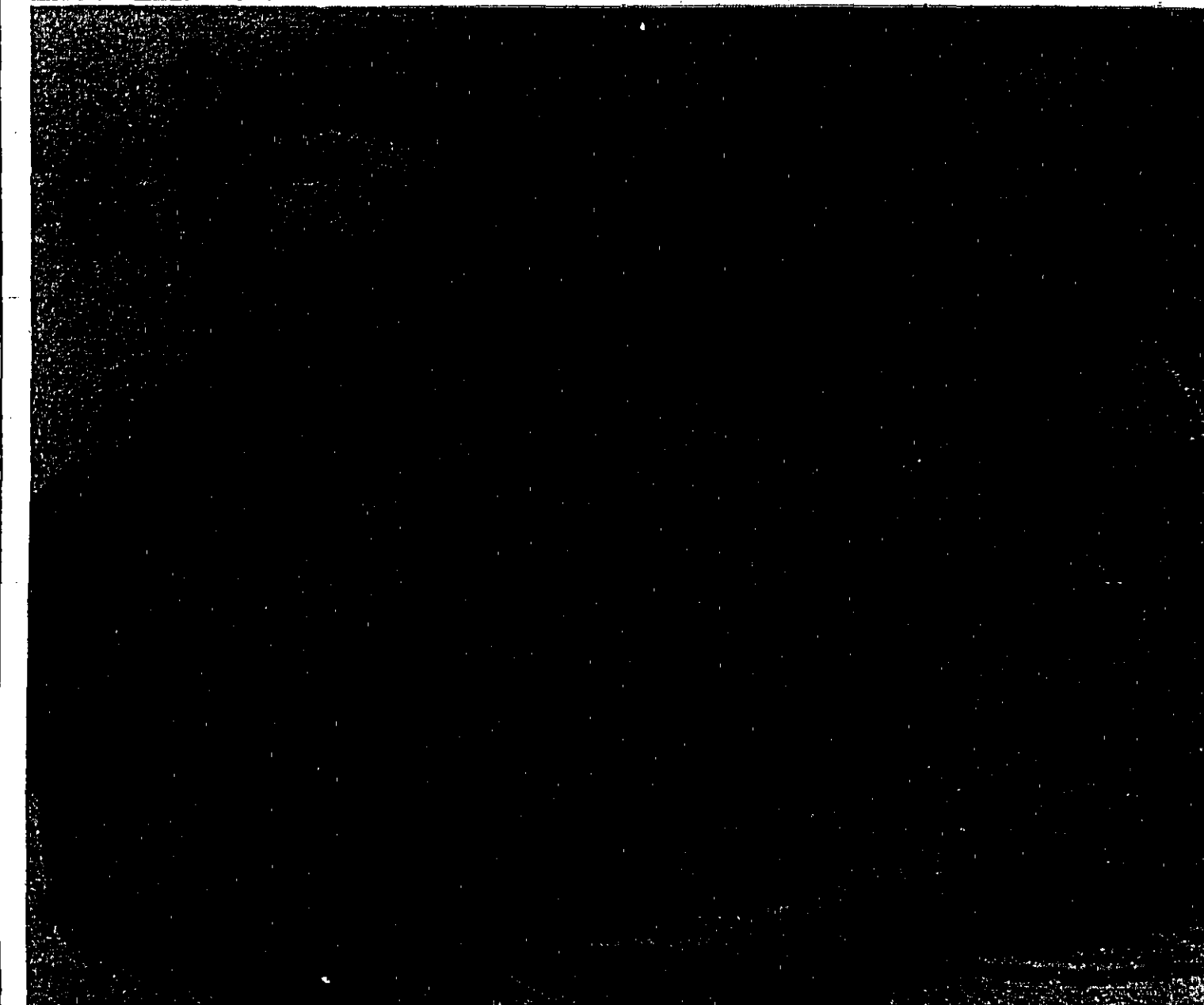
'Summer Strike' to be bowled on cable

Rinaldo: Jersey needs full tax cut

The first big dividends from the personal income tax cut bill approved by Congress last year have just started to come in, and already there are proposals to repeat next year's reductions, reports Rep. Matthew J. Rinaldo, whose district includes Rahway and Clark.

When Congress voted for the cuts in a bid to pump more money into the private sector to stimulate economic growth, it trimmed income taxes by 5% as of last Oct. 1, and an extra 10% this past July 1. A third cut, an additional 10%, is scheduled for Friday, July 1, 1983, Rep. Rinaldo adds.

Don't burn freshness from clothes

Summer clothes require more frequent washing, pressing or airing than clothes for other seasons, according to Carolyn V. Healey, the Union County Cooperative Extension Service's home economist.

Heat and humidity increase the amount of perspiration which is absorbed by clothing. Aside from perspiration, heat and humidity can set wrinkles that may be difficult to remove.

During the heat of summer, all garments should be allowed to dry thoroughly after removing. Don't be tempted to put damp clothes into a clothes hamper, as mildew stains will result. Water soluble stains should be sponged immediately with cool water unless the fabric water repels. Test a spot on an inside seam first. Later, complete stain removal treatment may be necessary.

With man-made fabrics or a combination of natural and man-made fibers, use a fabric softener in the final rinse.
