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## Regional teachers call wage plan 'inadequate'

An overflow crowd of teachers from the Union County Regional High School District No. 1, which includes Clark, thronged into the Springfield Knights of Columbus Hall on July 29 to hear an update on negotiations from their union president, Evelyn McGill of the Union County Regional Federation of Teachers, Local No. 3417, of the American Federation of Teachers, AFL-CIO, reports Mrs. McGill.

The contract covering the district's 360 teachers expired on June 30, and the teachers overwhelmingly endorsed a "no contract-no work" policy prior to the end of school, she said.

The Federation began negotiations in February, but bargaining broke down in June when the Board of Education declared im-

asse. Since then, eight additional negotiating sessions have been held with the assistance of a state-appointed mediator, the union president noted.

"We didn't receive the Board's first salary offer until July 20," Mrs. McGill told the teachers, "and it's totally inadequate. It would provide smaller increases for those positions which have the greatest number of people—and that just isn't fair."

The fringe benefits package needs upgrading, too, according to members of the federation's negotiating team.

"Many of our students who work at local supermarkets have better fringe benefits than we do," exclaimed one teacher.

The federation will open a crisis headquarters at 667 Chestnut St., Union, at the offices of Machinists Union Local No. 315 of the AFL-CIO.

"It's a terrific location for our office," said Mrs. McGill, "and it will make an excellent strike headquarters if that becomes necessary."

Arrangements for the offices were made by Earl Hendler, the local's labor delegate, through the Union County Central Labor Council, with which the local is affiliated.

"This is just one example," Mr. Hendler said, "of the advantages of our relationship with organized labor."

The federation plans another district-wide meeting on Thursday, Aug. 26, according to state

federation staff representative, John Fallon, who has been assisting the federation in negotiations.

"We'll have a lot to discuss," Mrs. McGill said. "If we don't have a settlement, we'll be putting the finishing touches on our strike preparations."

Teachers in the four regional high schools—Jonathan Dayton in Springfield, Arthur L. Johnson in Clark, David Brearley in Kenilworth and Gov. Livingston in Berkeley Heights, voted for American Federation of Teacher representation in a secret-ballot election conducted in December by the New Jersey Public Employment Relations Commission.

The teachers had previously been represented by an affiliate of the New Jersey Education Assn.

## Lung unit changes in name only

The Central New Jersey Lung Assn., now The American Lung Assn. of Central New Jersey, is changing its name to the American Lung Assn. of Central New Jersey. Eugene J. Rodgers, of Mountainside, said the new name will better communicate the group's relationship with the parent organization—the American Lung Assn., which was founded in 1904 in Atlantic City.

"We will continue to serve Hudson, Monmouth and Union counties," Mr. Rodgers noted, "and this year's Christmas Seal Campaign letters and literature will bear our new name."

"In addition," he continued, "the education and the other materials we distribute to the public are produced by our national headquarters, and bear the American Lung Assn. name. These materials often refer people to contact their local lung association. It will be easier to find us in the telephone directory if the local name begins with American Lung Assn."

The central association has been serving Hudson, Monmouth and Union counties since 1967, when a consolidation of the local units took place as a part of a restructuring of all New Jersey lung groups.

"Although the name now is slightly different," Mr. Rodgers said, "the services and programs offered by the association remain the same. They include family asthma programs, physical re-conditioning programs for adults with lung diseases, professional education and training seminars and conferences, public health education, anti-smoking efforts, occupational health and a variety of patient services for children and adults with breathing problems."

all in its power to exert its influence upon the legislature of New Jersey for restoration, added the spokesman.

If restoration of state minimum aid is not made, the Board could consider additional budgetary reductions or utilize surplus funds to meet its obligations for 1982-1983. If surplus funds are used, there will be less surplus to be applied against the 1983-1984 school budget. This could mean the amount to be raised by taxation for school purposes during 1983-1984 will increase because there will be fewer school funds to be appropriated to offset next year's taxes, he noted.

The Board, despite the responsibility of the State Legislature in eliminating state minimum aid at this late date, does not wish to jeopardize the instructional programs of the district for students. Therefore, the majority of the budgetary delays and reductions listed at this time will not directly affect instructional programs, he concluded.

## State aid loss cuts Regional Board budget

At the Aug. 3 meeting of the Union County High School Regional District No. 1 Board of Education, which governs Arthur L. Johnson Regional High School in Clark, approval was given to the superintendent's recommended budgetary reductions for the 1982-1983 school year.

The budgetary reductions are required because of the State Legislature's decision to withhold \$1,012,435 of state minimum aid which is due the regional district. Due to this loss, the following budgetary reductions will be made, reports a Board spokesman.

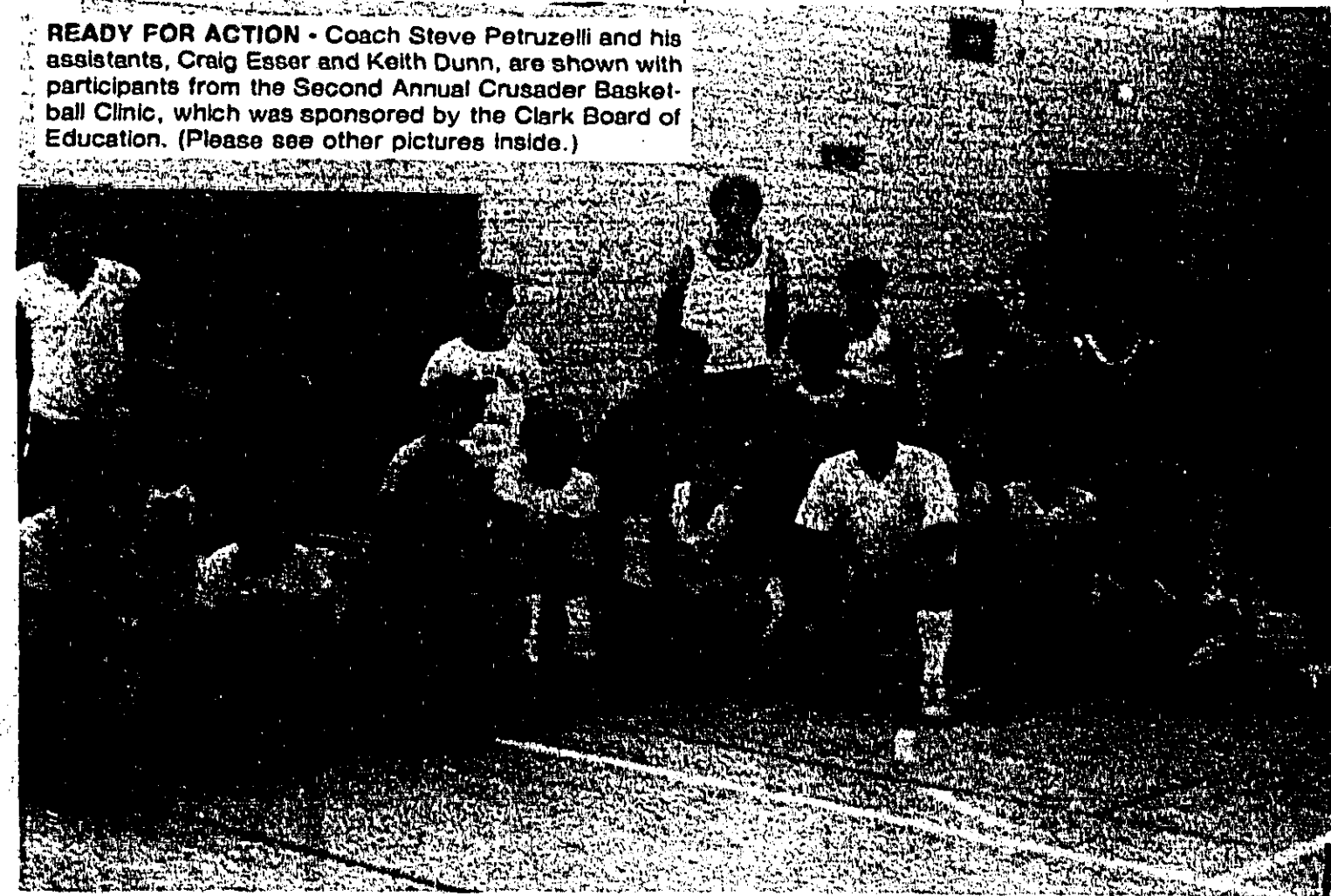
