POOL TOURNAMENT.

The principal contest of the pool tourna-
ment for the gold badge, which commenced
on Monday evening of last week at H. C.
Wilson's billiard room, on Cherry street, took
place Saturday evening before a crowded
house. The game was between Davis and
Chamberlin, who was forced to wait for special

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
