





SIR MOSES MONTEFIORE

WHOLE NUMBER 2200.

Sir Moses Montefiore, the well-known Hebrew philanthropist, who in October last celebrated the one hundredth anniversary of his birthday, died at Ramsgate, England, July 28.

Moses Montefiore, son of Joseph Elias and Rachel Montefiore, was born in Leghorn in 1784, whither the father and mother had gone from England on a visit. The family of the Monteflore among the Jews was one of old stante. ing, as they had settled in London some time in Oliver Cromwell's time, whither, they came from Italy, tracing their ancestry back to Spain. Moses Monteflore's entrance into business was as a clerk in a wholesale tea and grocery house. After a few years he became a stock broker. Aided by the relations of his wife, who was Judith Cohen, sister-inlaw of Nathan Meyer Rothschild, and somewhat associated with the Roths. childs, his success was immediate. In 1824 his father lied, leaving a handsome fortune. The son had now accumulated some wealth, and in 1825 he retired from business. Early in life his heart had been touched by the miserable condition of his people, the Jews, abroad, and he had long nurtured plans for redressing it. In England there were many wrongs the Jews suffered from. Immensely conservative, an enemy to all sudden traditions, Moses Monteflore, for more

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than three-quarters of a century worked for the freedom of his people. In 1829 he visited Palestine in company with his wife, and became deeply interested in the welfpre of his co-religthe establishment of the Palestine Fund; which worked great relief and which still continues its charitable work. Before 1828, according to the English statutes, "a Jew was prevented from sitting in Parliament, holding any office, civil or military, under the Crown, or any situation in corporate bodies." With the repeal of the test and corporation acts in 1828, associated with Nathan Rothschild and Isaac Lyon Goldsmid, an endeavor was made by Monteflore to

The agitation was continued, and, when in 1837 he filled the office of Sheriff of London and Middlesox, he was knighted on the occasion of the visit of the Queen to the the Guildhall, Nov. 9 of that year. In 1846 he was raised to a baronetcy in recognition of his high character. From the time of his visit to Palestine

the life of Sir Moses Monteflore was spent in arresting that march of intolerancy and bigotry which oppressed the Jews in Asia, Morocco, Italy, Roumania and Russia. No journey was too long for him. Up to his eighth decade his activity was censeless. In 1865 there had been cholera in Jerusalem, and the the fell scourge had left starvation and misery behind it. Sir Moses in 1866 proceeded to the East to personally apply a charitable fund which he had been instrumental in raising. In 1873 Sir Moses went to Russia, his second visit there, with an address of congratulation to that ill-fated Emperor Alexander II. The seventh journey to Jernsalem was made in 1874, when he was a man of ninety. So, whenever he could help his people, not only was his voice ever uplifted to intercede for them, though it be to address an Asiatio or European throne, but his fortune was at service; and thas, when most men are feeble and a burden to their relations. he cathers up his remaining strength, girds his his loins to far Palestine. 
