Rugs are cert inly free from many of the most serious objections to carpets, tard to the pepper and salt. A BREAKFAST DISH --- Mix half a pound even when they are fixed upon the floor, which in our estimation they never ought to be. It is impossible to wash well around them, to remove the dust from the corner, of the room, and even under the edges of the rug itself. But such a condition of affairs is far

from satisfactory. There is always more or less dirt about a stationary carpet, in any room that is much lived in, and the best housemaids in the world cannot ri au immovable rug of dust as readily on the floor as they could off it. Cappets ought, as a matter of health, to be taken up once a week, laid over a line and thoroughly beaten. But where is the household where this rule is enforced ?

The growing conviction of the superiority of rugs to chrpets, is shown in the newest houses, in many of which the floors are expressly arranged with staiued borders, a parquet flooring, which it is possible to leave entirely uncovered. What a boon this 'is to persons of small means. Nothing eats into a small sum of money for house furnishing more disastrously than a carpet. It is useless to buy a cheap one; cheap carpets are never of any use and the price of a good one is a formidable consideration. That is another argument in favor of rugs --- cheap rugs wear much better than cheap carpets.

Bay rum may be colored with tincture of saffron. VINAIGRETTE sauce is made by putting salt and pepper in a shallow dish and pouring vinegar over them, a little at a time, beating constantly. While beat-ing add olive oil also, little by little, aud then add chopped parsley. If the sauce is used with cold meat, add mus-

of crumbs with an equal quantity of finely-minced lean boiled ham; moisten, with a little stock or water and butter, adding salt to taste. Put the mixture in a baking dish, make depressions in it the size of an egg and break an egg in each hollow. Bike a delicate brown in a good oven. AN EXCELLENT soft gingerbread made by this recipe: One quatter of

pound of butter and one quarter of a pound of lard mixed; half a pound of sifted sugar; one and a quarter pounds of flour with four tenspoonfuls of baking powder; one pint of molasses; half pint of milk; one teaspoonful of ground ginger and five eggs. Mix thoroughly and bake in a quick oven.

VEGETABLE SOUP .- Put a piece pork that is not too fat and any bones left from roast beef in a soup kettle with as much water as will be needed for soup and set the kettle on the fire. As soon as the water boils, add pointoes, carrots, celery, an onion and a small Savor cabbage, all cut in small pieces, and salt to taste. Simmer for two hours and a half; remove the bones and pork, aud serve.

MOOK MINCE PIE. -Nine small buiter crackers, two cups of cider or one cup of vinegar, and one of water; half a cup of molasses, one cup of sugar; a piece of butter the size of a walnut one cup of chopped raisins and spice to taste. Mix all the ingredients together and set them on the fire until they be come hot. When quite cold fill the pastry-lined pans; cover with a top
