It appears probable that the days of patent fruit jars are ended, since the testimony is so satisfactory in favor of tying cotton batting over the mouth of the jar containing the fruit. The fruit is cooked, or rather brought to the boiling point, and then poured hot into the jars, which are at once covered with white paper, and over that a layer of cotton batting, just as it comes off the roll, and tied down securely with cotton twine. The philosophy of it is that the cotton prevents the entrance of bacteria, which are the cause of all ferments.

Religious and temperance are working wonders in Belvidere. Among the converts are the postmaster and his deputy, and numerous liquor sellers. After April 1st the American home will go away with the bar and become a temperance house. This is a true gospel temperance. Testimony from Kansas, concerning the success of prohibition in that State, is not reassuring. A correspondent of the *Christian Advocate*, the leading Methodist paper in this country, says: "Within my knowledge it is just as easy to obtain whiskey, beer or alcohol here as it was in Ohio two years ago," and adds that there really exists no such thing as prohibition in Kansas. There seems to be about as much difficulty in legislating to make a man sober as to make him frigid.

This is the way Prohibition works, according to the record published in an exchange. "In 1887 Detroit had twelve hundred saloons within her limits, and collected nothing from them because there was a prohibitory law against them. In 1888 the city had one thousand saloons, and collected \$180,000 from them under a high license law."

The Prohibition Reform Club is rapidly growing. Reason: Its members don't meddle with anything outside of true temperance reform, avoiding all politics, and not interfering with the business of local or other legislators.
