CHRIST AT NAZARETH.

LESSON VIII, FIRST QUARTER, INTER-
NATIONAL SERIES, FEB. 24.

Text of the Lesson, Mark vi, 1-13—Com-
ment Verse, Luke ix, 10—Golden Text, Mark
vi, 12—Commentary by the Rev. H. H.
Stearns.

1. "And He went out from thence," that is
from Capernaum, where He had just healed
the woman who had been twelve years sick,
the little girl 12 years old who had just died,
the two blind men and the dumb demoniac;
where also He had on previous occasions
healed the man in the synagogue with an un-
clean spirit, Peter's wife's mother, the sick
with the palsy, the nobleman's son, the sym-
on's servant, and many others not men-
tioned individually. (Mark i, 4, v; Matt.
ix, 35; Luke vii, 1-17.) How highly privi-
leged Capernaum was; how many mighty
works were done there!

"And came into His own country." After
the people of Nazareth rejected Him and
sought His life, He made Capernaum His
home of He could be said to have a home,
and it was called "His own city" (Matt. ix, 1;
Luke ix, 10, 31); but Nazareth was His own
country where He had been brought up. How
patient, forgiving and long suffering He is,
and how earnestly He continues to seek those
who reject Him, if perchance they may re-
pent: for He is not willing that any should
perish. (Matt. x, 6.)

"His disciples follow Him." Some follow
fully and some follow afar off; some seek
and serve Him with the whole heart and some do
anything but that.

"When the Sabbath day was come, He
came to teach in the synagogue." He had
