

saints for vengeance pion his enemies and redemption for Israel. (Isa xxxlv, 8; lxiii, 4.) Then shall Israel see that the store which they as builders rejected is indeed, after all, their own Messiah, King of Kings and Lord of Lords: they shall mourn because of thelir cruel treatment of Hun, saying: "Io, this is our God; we have waited for Him and He will save us; this is the Lord, we have waited for Him, we will be glad and rejoice in His salvation." The despatch was shown to the election boards during the day so as to save them the time and trouble of calling and tallying the names in counting the votes. We are informed that some Republicans, when they found that the Democratic tickets had been printed with the election officers denounced it as a trick by the editor of this paper, and asserted that we had received a despatch from the Governor stating that he had signed the bill; that we had promised them to inform them if we received such information, are false.
