THE CONTEST FOR MAYOR

As will be seen by the returns elsewhere the vote for Mayor is a tie, and consequently results in no election. Those who were opposed to the Republican nominee were so confident that the Democratic candidate would be elected, that they expended their efforts for their candidates for Councilmen and others not anticipating such a close vote on the Mayor. The first report was that Mr. Esterbrook, Republican candidate, was elected, and the hilarious vote Republicans, with their usual tendency to "pretentiousness," commenced shouting and shouting, and marched to his residence. He came out and made a characteristic speech, telling them that as the result of government would fall into his hands, he would not change his name, but being a stranger to the forms of our city government, of course he is not aware that the Mayor's powers do not go a great way in that direction. The young enthusiasts were considerably crestfallen at this later, when they found that he was not making demonstrations that were premature.



The Schemers Make No Progress

There were many complications that entered into the election on Tuesday, resulting in a general confusion and confusion. The Republicans have lost full's booth campaign fresh in their mind were well fixed with the cash and were ready to negotiate for single votes or blocks of five to forty, and thus succeeded in holding their own not making a gain in any office in the city. As will be seen by the figures which we print below and which we take from the returns as filed in the City Clerk's office, there is a tie of the vote for Mayor, hence no gain there for either side. For Water Commissioner Mr. Ehrlich is elected in place of Mr. Ira LaForge—both Republicans. For School Commissioner Mr. James M. Silvers, Democrat, is re-elected. For Councilmen Messrs. Parrill, in the 8d, and Durkin, in the 9th ward, Republicans, are re-elected; in the 1st ward, Belmer, Democrat, is re-elected, and in the 4th ward Tutin, Democrat, takes the place of Silvers, of the same party. Therefore it is seen that the Republicans have only held their own, and have no reason to indulge in jollification and howling about the streets as they did late on the night of election. The fact is they had another night of the same result, which has frequently caused them to crowd before they get out of the woods. The people have great cause for rejoicing at the defeat of the Republican candidate in the 4th ward, for according to his own announcement he would have been a stumbling block in the Council and doubtless the cause of constant wrangling. The next Common Council will stand precisely as the present one—eight Democrats and four Republicans. The Board of Education will also stand the same—four Democrats and one Republican. The only point of comfort they have is that neither candidate for Mayor was elected. This will result in another election for that office—unless the other candidate is appointed to a recount. The latter would be a doubtful expedient, however, as, after the trouble and expense of taking to the court, it might result the same, and a new election would still have to be held. An adjourned meeting of the Common Council, was held on Thursday evening, April 18th, 1889, and the present session of the Council was opened by reading the minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The committee on drainage reported that they had made an appointment with the Superintendent of the P. R. R., in regard to the defective drainage at the Scott's avenue station.
The committee on licenses reported the license application of A. S. Baker, saloon corner St. and Maple avenues, and laid over for two weeks.
The committee on licenses also reported the license application of Herman Graves.
On motion of Mr. Shipman the Chief of Police was instructed to notify Herman Graves to stop the sale of spirituous and fermented liquors during the time his license is pending, as per license expires on April 1st. Which was so ordered.
