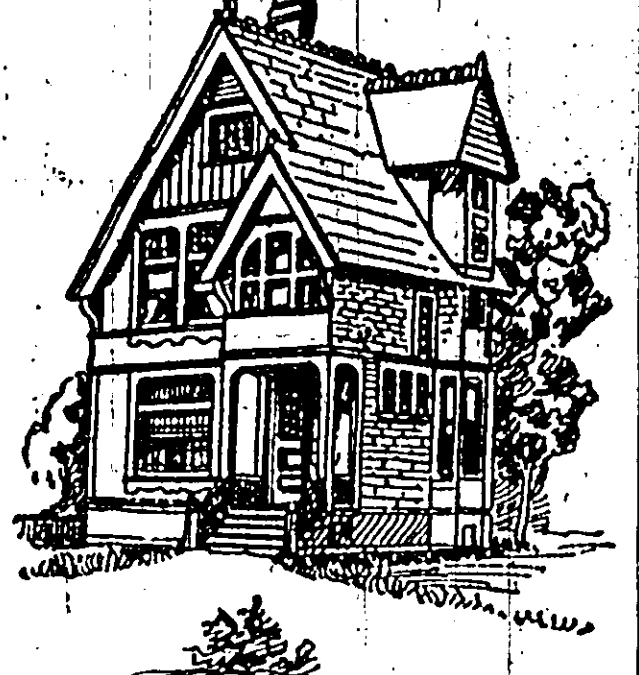

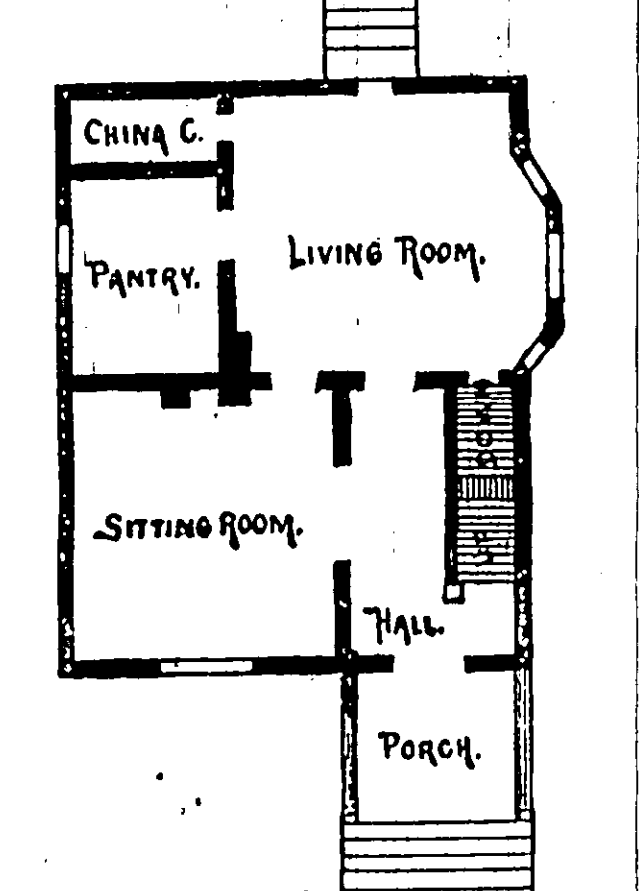
Plans and View of a Two Story Frame Dwelling.

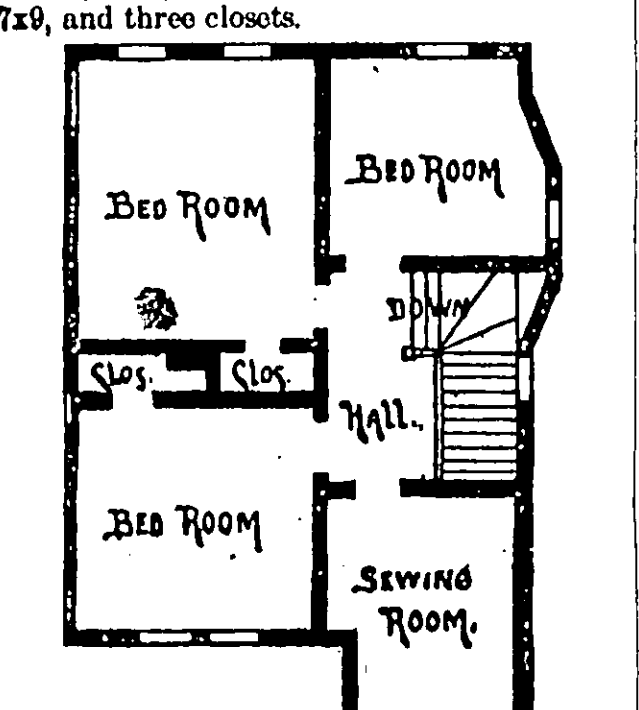
PERSPECTIVE VIEW.

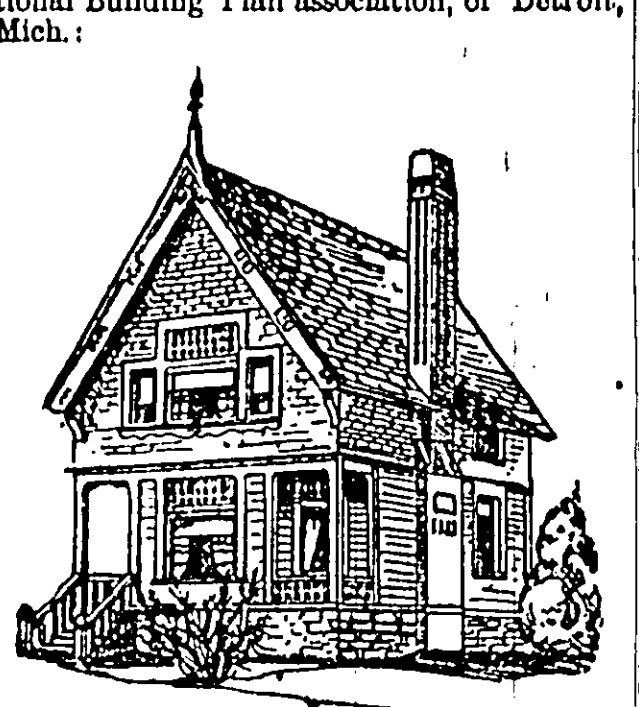
SECOND FLOOR.

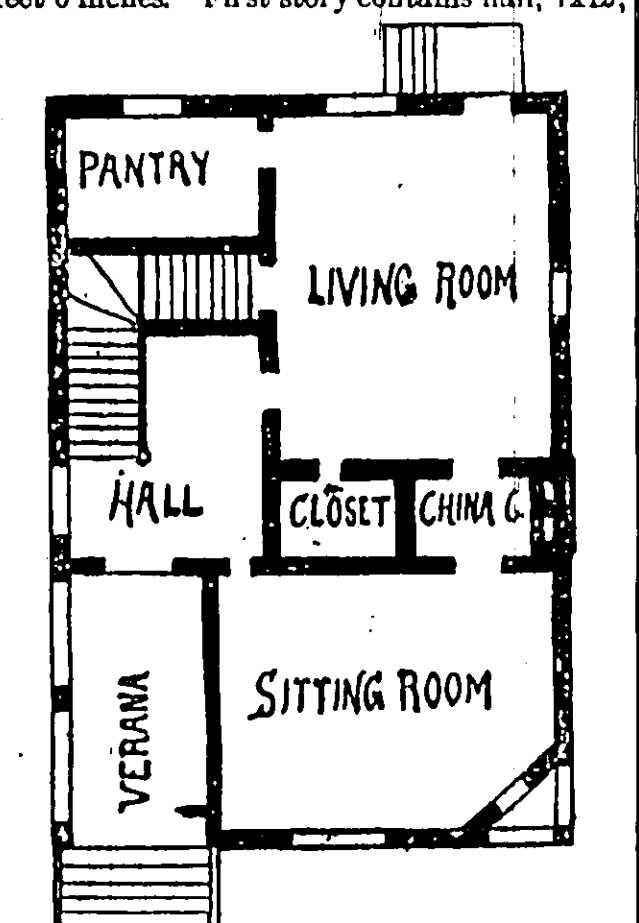
A neat story and a half structure Planned and Described.

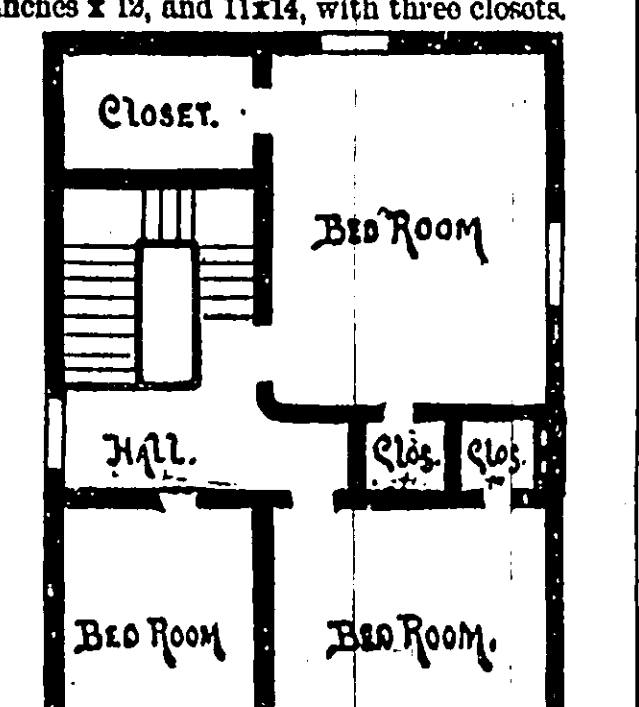
