The August General says of four newly elected Democratic U. S. Senators: "Vance, Woodcock, Vest and Villas is a straight bunch of 2's and is hard to handle."

Col. William H. Vilas, Postmaster-General under President Cleveland, will be the first Democratic United States Senator from Wisconsin since the expiration of the term of General Henry Dodge on the 4th of March, 1887, thirty years ago to-day.

## TIN PLATE.

A Republican club has been sending out platters of tin as samples of American manufacture, in which they say workers can make their own dinner plates, etc., and making a very liberal proposal as to one case.

The platters of tin in the place that are being exhibited to show how we can manufacture them commodity under the McKinley tariff, are composed of iron imported by the importer, Welsh workers, at an expense to the American people of about \$10,000,000 a year. This is a sum that the country is any better off than it would be if the samples came direct from Wales.

## THE LEGISLATURE.

There was but little business done in the Legislature this week, beyond the appointment of the State Treasurer and Comptroller; and for those positions, respectively, George R. Gray, of Essex, and Gen. Wm. C. Hippelheimer, of Hudson, were chosen at a joint meeting held on Tuesday. This was the first time for many years that those offices have been filled by the same men.

The Republicans nominated the present incumbents, John T. Toffey for Treasurer and Major Anderson for Comptroller—the vote being one for each.

We have known both the appointees for years, and feel that there is no doubt as to their expediency, honesty and dependability, that they will make faithful and judicious use of their powers.
