pital, and an educational program for all personnel has been established. The program has the complete cooperation of the Fire Department which will conduct unannounced drills on a periodic basis.

## Rahway Hospital Institutes Fire Prevention Program

In an effort to minimize the likelihood of fire at Rahway Hospital, a preventive program is being conducted involving implementation of new policies, education of personnel, practice drills, new equipment, and enforcement of regulations.

According to John L. Yoder, Director, the hospital has instituted a "no-smoking" policy for visitors, in cooperation with the Rahway Fire Department. New regulations posted in each patient room also restrict smoking by patients to designated areas. Use of electrical devices not supplied by the hospital is prohibited, to eliminate the fire hazards of "improperly wired electrical equipment. In the case of radios, patients are encouraged to use transistor radios.

Monthly unannounced fire drills require employees to follow the hospital's published Emergency Fire Plan which includes three specific procedures geared to meet possible emergencies. When the hospital's fire alarm is sounded, an alarm

at the Fire Department headquarters is automatically activated also.

The hospital's new security locks have been adjusted for opening in case of fire. The ensuing alarm would help to determine the location of the fire.

The locations of carbon dioxide fire extinguishers are prominently indicated in the corridors and the quantity is being increased so that one is nearby, no matter where a fire might occur. To assure familiarity with various types of extinguishers and understanding of how they should be used, a fire-fighting demonstration was conducted on the hospital grounds for personnel on May 24. The program was conducted by Fire Director John Yantz, Chief George Link, Deputy Chief Robert Duffy, and members of Engine Company No. 5 supervised by Captain Charles Roberts. Anker Goldmann of Approved Fire Protection Company of North Plainfield demonstrated three types of fire extinguishers.

## Summer Days In Rahway To Be Filled With Fun

Included in the sports section there will be youth baseball daily from July 1 to July 30. The Butch Kowal Association youth baseball league for boys 13 to 17 will have games Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday evenings at 7:30 on the Madison School playground court. Inter-county baseball games will be played at 6:30 Wednesday and at 10 a.m. at Veterans Field on Saturday. Wrestling classes will be held at 10 a.m. Thursday in the Rahway Junior High. Tennis lessons at the Ilderan Club will be held Friday mornings starting June 30 and continuing to August 19 at 9:45 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. Individual instruction will be given daily at the Rahway High School court.

Shuffleboard will be available from 10 a.m. to 9 p.m. daily at Tully Field. Inter-Playground softball leagues will operate daily from June 27 to August 18. Men's Slow Pitch softball league will play daily from June 1 to August 30, starting at 5:45 p.m. Physical fitness programs will be held daily on various playgrounds.

One of the big events of the summer will be the Fourth of July annual fish-

ing derby at Milton Lake between the hours of 9 a.m. and 11:30 a.m.

The City Senior Playground Championships for the Leo Blitzer Memorial Trophy are scheduled for the week of July 17 to 21. The City Junior Playground Championships will be held the week of July 10 to 14. Union County Playground Championships at Warrington Park in Scotch are scheduled for August 7 and 9.

A summer program for mentally retarded children co-sponsored with the Rahway Junior Service League will be held in Madison School, starting Tuesday, July 3, and continuing to August 10.

Playgrounds throughout the city will open on Tuesday, June 27 at 10 a.m. and continue to Friday, August 18 at 2 p.m. Supervised hours, Monday to Thursday will be 9:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. and on Friday's from 9:30 a.m. to 2 p.m. Fourteen areas will be open during the summer.

Information on special programs may be had by contacting the playground directors or the Recreation Office in City Hall. Weekly information on coming events will also be published in the News-Record.

## Now You Can Turn Complaints Into Compliments

So often you notice something amiss in town—and would like to see it corrected. But good intentions aside, most of the time you either forget what it was you wanted fixed—or you don't know how to report the problem.

Rahway is taking one step this week on the road to correcting some of these problems. Mayor John Marsh has announced that Observation Memo pads have been distributed to members of the Municipal Council and the Police Department.

"We hope to turn a complaint into a compliment," a city hall memo says in explaining that the memo pads will be used to expedite the handling of citizens' complaints and problems noted by city officials. The forms will be filled out by the person noticing the prob-

lem—be it a broken tree limb or illegal dumping—and returned to the office of Business Administrator Stone. A follow-up form will be filled out by the Business Administrator's staff, with one copy filed in his office and two copies sent to the department involved. Upon inspection and correction of the problem one copy will be returned to Mr. Stone so that he will know how work is progressing.

The possibility of distributing the Observation Memo pads to various civic and community organizations is being considered but no decision has been reached. Just in case you do have a complaint you'd like turned into a compliment, though, just fill in the form on this page—or save it to use when you notice something you'd like taken care of.

## 'Action' Gains Recognition

The Rahway Community Action Organization has won official recognition from the Union County Anti-Poverty Council for their work in aiding 800 families in town that are in the poverty classification.

(A family of four earning \$4000 a year or less is included in this category.)

Headed by executive chairman Stanley Kobl, the newly formed organization has been active in setting up several self-help programs for the target areas. First to go into operation will be Project Head Start which will provide learning, experience, social services, medical and dental examinations for needy pre-schoolers.

## Annual Meeting Of Red Cross Set For Monday

The annual meeting of Rahway-Clark Chapter, American Red Cross, will be held at the Church of the Holy Comforter, Seminary Ave. on Monday at 8 p.m.

The program, which begins the chapter's 15th year, will include service reports, election of directors and chapter officers, and two films: "The Land Called New Jersey," and "The New Red Cross Film, 'One Who Cares.'" Miss Ethel Henson, chapter chairman, will preside.

Mrs. George Kotuby, Mrs. Edward Levitzky, and Mrs. George Gutter are in charge of arrangements. Mrs. John Major heads the nominating committee, and Mrs. John Gonczlik will be in charge of the Canasta Service.

All residents of Rahway and Clark who have donated one dollar or more to the chapter during the past year, either directly or through United Fund, are invited to attend and take part in the program.

Mr. Kobl, who was elected by the RCOA members in March, serves without salary as a volunteer. In the insurance business, Mr. Kobl is an special agent with New York Life.

The RCOA is an organization of citizens interested in community betterment of which more than one-third of the members live in the anti-poverty "target areas."

Although all the administrative posts are volunteer, fees are provided by the federal government for professional services rendered. The funds allocated for these areas (i.e. \$11,000 for an attorney to give legal service on small claims to the unable to afford a lawyer) must be used for this purpose. If a resident accepts one of these positions and wishes to donate his services he may contribute the money to the RCOA as a donation, said Mr. Kobl.

The sessions for 45 children will be held in Grover Cleveland School this summer. Mrs. Rudolph Hawkins, Jr., 1640 Columbus Pl., is in charge of volunteers. The cost of operation will be a little over \$17,000 and a federal grant for \$14,000 has been approved for Rahway. The local group will provide the additional \$3,700.

The group is attempting to set up a Department of Legal Services, possibly by Aug. 1. Courtney Clarke of 763 Main St. has donated a 1000 square foot building for the offices, and the organization is working with county officials on the legal aspects.

The formation of a day care center at Trinity Methodist Church is currently undergoing study. Free nursery school service would be provided so that mothers could work. Target date for opening is Sept.

Finally, the organization is looking into the possibility of setting up a Youth Employment Service which would be available to all Rahway youngsters.

The Community Action Organization was formed in March after the Rahway Council Service was dissolved. The new group consists of 78 members from various service organizations, business groups, and educational institutions.

One-third of the members come from the target areas. The eventual hope of the organization is to train people who are in greatest need of the services—to handle their own programs. They also hope to attract funds from private industry for these programs.

The next meeting, which is open to the public, will be held on June 1 at 8 p.m. at the Second Presbyterian Church.

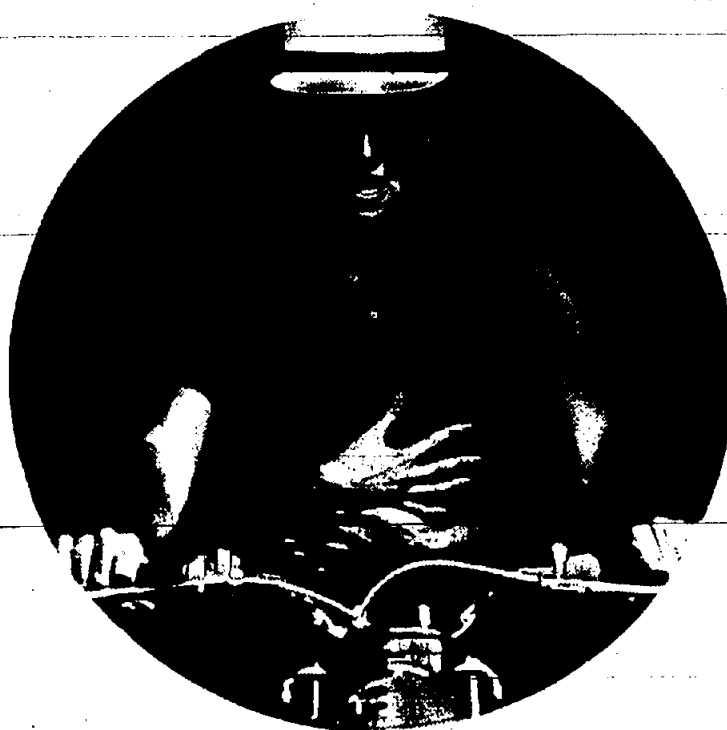

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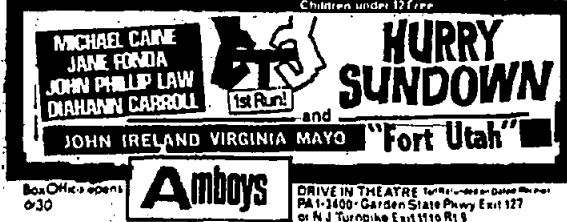

### Clark Trackmen Trail Cranford And Westfield

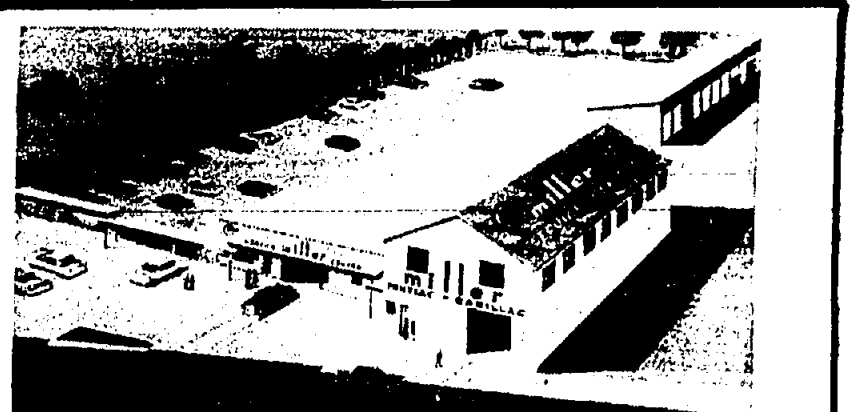
