Rahway Summer School Opens June 26

A Summer School program for secondary school students in Rahway has been approved by the Rahway Board of Education, with Herman Kagan, Vice Principal of Rahway High School in charge of operations.

The school will open June 26 and continue through July 26, with classes meeting Monday through Friday of each week. There will be no classes scheduled for July 4. The first period will be held between the hours of 8:30 and 10 a.m. and the second period from 10:05 to 11:35 a.m., Kagan announced.

Registrations will be received from June 12 through June 23. Applications may be obtained in Mr. Kagan's office at Rahway High School and at the Guidance Office in the Rahway Junior High School.

Tuition rates have been set at \$35 per subject except for typewriting which is established at \$20. Full payment must be made with the registration.

The purposes of the Summer School are to enable students to earn a passing grade in subjects previously failed, to raise a low grade, and to improve mastery in subject matter. Courses for advanced credit will not be offered.

Subjects to be offered include: English (grades 7-12), all foreign languages (7-12), basic mathematics, algebra I and 2, geometry, biology, chemistry, physics, general science, S. History (1 and 2), economics, bookkeeping, stenography, and typewriting (1 and 2).

Old Library Closing Set For June 26

The Rahway Public Library at the corner of Seminary Ave. and Campbell St. will close its doors to the public on June 26 to make its move to the new facilities in Central Ave. It was announced today by Mrs. Minnie Chapin, Chief Librarian.

The new library facilities will be open to the public on July 18. In commenting on the enormity of the change from the old building to the new one, Mrs. Chapin declared that the public could be of great help to the library staff if they would visit the present library the week of June 19 and borrow as many books as possible with the idea of returning them to the new library after it is opened on July 18. Mrs. Chapin pointed out that there would be no charge for the overtime use of the books, since these books would represent volumes which the staff would not have to transport in the move.

The new library will include all the facilities under one roof, including the children's library which is now housed in the basement of City Hall in Irving Street.

Firehouse To House Police, Civil Defense, Recommended

Fire Chief Link said that Captain Manthorn was so thrilled with his title, he planned to take the helmet and cord back home with him.

Construction of a single fire house which would house Civil Defense Department, Police and the majority of the Fire Department and at the same time provide a hardened shelter for the City's government in time of disaster, is recommended in the long report submitted by C. W. Robinson & Co., Inc., which has surveyed the fire protection needs of Rahway.

Declaring that three Fire Stations are both undesirable and unnecessary in Rahway, the Robinson recommendation calls for the retention of the Maple Ave. Firehouse and the construction of a new facility to house the equipment now assigned to the Seminary and East Milton Ave. stations.

The report also recommends that application be made to the Federal Government for Civil Defense funds for the proposed station, and that consideration should be given to the location of the proposed Fire Station in a housing project assisted by Federal funds.

Five desirable locations for the proposed new Firehouse in decreasing order of preference are recommended as follows:

Corner intersection of East Emerson, New Brunswick and Main Street; present site of obsolete Fire Station at East Milton and Augusta; present site of City Hall, intersection of West Grand Street and Elizabeth Avenue; Central Avenue and Irving St.

In the area of reorganization, the Robinson report recommends a Director of Fire Department Reorganization should be appointed to serve a temporary two year contract to institute reorganization changes, to train members of the Department in fire fighting and administrative skills and to develop office personnel within the Department for qualification by Civil Service examination for the position of Fire Chief. Once trained and qualified by examination, such an individual would take command of the Fire Department and the position of Director of Fire Department Reorganization would cease to exist.

The report also states that the Department should have only two Deputy Chiefs. One, the Deputy Chief for Training should be the second in command and the other would be designated Deputy Chief for Fire Prevention. One Fire Captain should be in command of each Fire Station, according to the report and the position of Fire Lieutenant should be created and such officers assigned to Companies under the command of the Station where they are assigned.

To protect toward a 42 hour week from the present 50 hour week without increasing full-time paid personnel costs one third, greater use will have to be made of Call Men and other reserve forces, according to the report which recommends a "Director of Call Men" position for recruitment and motivation of Call Men to attend drills and to report to fires. The report urges consideration be given to the Director of Civil Defense assuming this position, with responsibility for fire fighting training remaining with the Deputy Chief for Training.

The comprehensive report deals with a number of other items including training, testing of equipment, mutual aid programs, communications, fire prevention, hydrants inspection, and reports and records, with recommendations for the implementation of the program.

Kinch, New Police Chief Lauds Department's Work



The promotion of Herbert T. Kinch to Chief of Police for the City of Rahway, making him the first Negro to command a large city police unit in northern New Jersey, has made the headlines in several New Jersey newspapers and received special notice in the New York Times.

In addition to newspaper coverage, the appointment has brought letters of congratulation from the bachelor, friends and acquaintances from all over the United States, Chief Kinch reports. It is certainly unusual for such publicity in the instance of a promotion to a police department, but then Chief Kinch is an unusual man.

A native of Rahway, Chief Kinch graduated from Rahway High School and became an honors student at Virginia State College where he received his degree in 1939. He served in the Navy during World War II as a specialist third class with the shore patrol.

Out of service, Chief Kinch joined the Rahway Police Department as a patrolman in 1942 and rose through the ranks to his present position. He served in the detective division and was promoted to sergeant in 1953, lieutenant in 1954 and captain in 1959. He was promoted to deputy police chief on March 28, 1965.

Chief Kinch's interest in safety has led him to take many courses at the University level and to participate in police training schools over the years. When former Chief Lawrence E. Coman was unable to continue his duties, Chief Kinch was ready for the challenge and the city and the department were ready for Kinch.

Power Failure No Problem For Rahway

The massive electrical power failure of last Monday caused no major problems in Rahway. Despite silent air conditioners, soaring temperatures, melting food products, and darkened stores, the residents rallied well.

Police Chief Herbert T. Kinch proclaimed an emergency and called all men on the force to duty. Because burglar alarms were not operating, the rolling stock was on the roads patrolling the area within minutes. The emergency generator at Police Headquarters was switched on immediately and radio contact was maintained at all times with the Civil Defense. Traffic was hand patrolled during rush hours between 2:30 and 5.

Because the burglar alarms were not working, many banks took precautionary measures, and closed their doors at the first sign of the power shutdown. They serviced their customers via the walk - up and drive - in windows.

Some plants and companies, dependent on electricity for production or lights, sent employees home when electricity was not reinstated. Purolator closed the factory at 11:10 and office personnel left at 1:00. Over 900 employees unexpectedly had the day off. Rahway Hospital switched over to their emergency generators, so there was no interruption of power. However, as a precautionary measure, the hospital turned off air conditioners, some lights, cancelled operations, and restricted visitors. The patients were not disturbed by the power failure.

Electricity was restored section-by-section throughout the county during the afternoon. By 5:30 p.m. Rahway was back to normal.

Miss McLaughlin Gets Citation For Research

Myrna McLaughlin, a member of the Rahway High School faculty has been cited by Michigan State University for "significant contribution to the improvement of vocational education" through her work as a research associate in an MSU pilot project in office education.

Myrna McLaughlin was awarded a "certificate of participation" by officials of MSU's College of Education and the university's Research and Development Program in Vocational Technical Education, a large scale effort supported by a grant from the U.S. Office of Education and in cooperation with the New Jersey State Department of Education.

Rahway High School is one of 39 schools participating in the program's office education project. Its aim is to use the "block-time" approach to prepare persons for office occupations.

The program uses two and three consecutive class periods to provide instruction through a class simulating an office environment for high school seniors. It is an alternative to the traditional single-period approach to the teaching of office skills.

The "block-time" approach emphasizes three areas of instruction: normal

classroom instruction (typing and shorthand); laboratory experiences (use of office machines); and problem solving exercises (data processing, office organization and procedure, and human relations).

Leading the project are Dr. Peter G. Haines, professor of secondary education and curriculum, and John McBeth, occupational research specialist.

The Research and Development Program in Vocational Technical Education at MSU is administered through the Department of Secondary Education and Curriculum with Dr. Haines as director.

Its work is centered in three broad areas: Program development through clinical school sites in Michigan and in Florida, Arizona, New Jersey and Washington; Vocational teacher education through clinical school systems, in which schools prepare personnel under the direction of experienced professionals; and Allied research and development activities, such as evaluation systems, workshops, conferences and seminars.

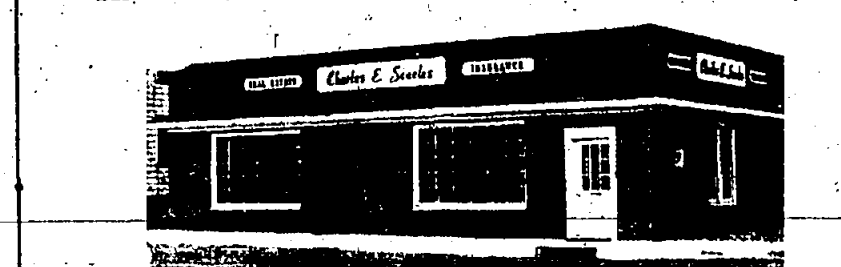
