

CORRESPONDEN Trials and Tribulations

Overcome in Search EDITOR'S NOTE: The author of the following column, Mrs. Douglas Woodward of Newton Abbot, Devon, England, tells of the difficulties she and her husband former Rahway residents, had in finding a home after they returned to the United Kingdom.

heating is synonymous with refrigeration, the experlence may be traumatic. I speak from recent exper-Because my breathing apparatus balks at stairs, my husband and I decided our new home must be a bungalow. It would have three bedrooms one of which would be my study; and either separate dining roomlounge, or a large lounge/diner.

But we soon learned that such accommodation was mostly available either with stairs, or at a figure above the maximum safety-level for our budget. - Each morning we set out with high-hopes and cheerful charrer, and each evening we returned in silent despair, depressed by the bewildering and pathetic contrast in properties of identical vintage and price. For while owners of immaculate homes apologized forimaginary imperfections, others -- oblivious to the stench of ill-kept rooms -- proudly pointed to fittings and decor which would make the average do-it-yourself novice seem like an artisan. But the well-kept homes were too small or too-remote for our needs and the others -- well, they just weren't our cup of

The representatives of the two agencies we'd selected were paragons of patience; their tactful perseverance and many courtesies seeming to stem from a genuine desire to find a happy solution to our problem, rather than from a wish to make a quick sale and pocket -their-commission. They worked so hard on our behalf that I dreaded having to tell either gentleman of the other's success in steering us to the right property though when that time came, the loser received the news most grac-Having found a suitable bungalow, we next learned that in England, unless otherwise specified, the purchase price of a property doesn't include cookstove. curtain-rods, cabinets, special light fittings, etc. We even had to ask our solicitors to request the return of the bell-push and door-chimes! But the worst-blow-of all came from my bank in

Exeter when we went there from Newton Abbot to transfer cash from deposit to current account in readiness for completion. Told that I had insufficient funds. I nearly passed out. When my strength returned, I demanded an audience with one or more of the various managers. Later, one of these august gentlemen sheepishly explained that the bulk of our American dollars had been credited to someone else's accounti Fortunately, the matter was cleared up in time for the signing of the check and other documents whereby

we became legal owners of our present home. At last we had possession, we exulted, as we happily clutched our newly - acquired keys. Now, all we ha to-do-was buy some furniture and move in. And that, we assured each other, would be a piece of cake, Swimming Instruction

One change made thus far, the mayor said, was the relocation of the office of Business Administration Sidney H. Stone. The office has been moved to the mayor's office on the second floor. Mrs. Charlotte Channell, secretary to the administrator, now will be secretary for both the administrator and the mayor.
The office of City Clerk Robert W. Schrof, which had been loc ated in the City Hall basement, has been moved to the office vacated by the administrator.

Mayor Martin said that appointed city officials will remain in the government as holdovers until decisions on personnel changes are made. No major renovation of City Hall is contemplated at present Mayor Martin stated, although the building has fallen into a state of disrepair. The building, built in 1909, was used as a high school until converted for use as a City Hall in the early 1940's. The mayor announced plans to hire a full - time maintenance man for the building, which has been cleaned by a company under contract. The building will be painted and kept in repair, the mayor added. Referring to an election promise to organize task forces of

citizens to assist officials with city gvernment, Mayor Martin said that the task forces are to be formed in 10 areas within the next few months. The citizens, he said, would help him to obtain the public's viewpoints on municipal problems. Plans to Get Financial Advisors The mayor, discussing the city's financial structure, said

that there are plans to obtain "outside" financial advisor and to enlist persons from other communities to assist the Rahway officials. Tax revaluation is a possibility and "must be considered, Mayor Martin declared. I don't mean to scare the ctrizenry, however, but certainly the city's tax structure needs updating," Mayor Martin commented. He added that there will be an attempt to practice "good economy." The mayor maintained that new ratables must come from expansion and from modernizing because the city has little room for new industry. Asked about a possible increase by the city of license fees and the imposition of new fees, Mayor Martin said that the revenue from such fees were "too small to bother making any changes." He termed state and federal aid more important

as sources of revenue. **HUD Reported Making Demands** The United States Department of Housing and Urban Development has been making demands upon the city in connection with the redevelopment program, Mayor Martin pointed out. He said that the pressure upon the city has been increased by HUD

since its district office was moved to Newark from-Philadelphia. Pa. The mayor added that the city needs the cooperation of the Rahway Redevelopment Agency, an autonomous body.
Mayor Martin explained that the "workable program" required by HUD concerns housing inspection, rehabilitation, and fire, health and building code changes. The city must designate areas for inspection and for improvement, Mayor Martin said noting that the city's oldest areas would receive attention first. Rahway has an opportunity to obtain a \$50,000 grant for necessary improvements, he added, and the planning director has been instructed to determine the areas requiring improve-Replying to a question about the possibility of having improvements made in the downtown business section, Mayor Martin-answered that he "wouldn't force merchants to improve their properties." He said he would like to see the isinessmen improve the shopping area but that he does not favor any one style of architecture. 'The city shouldn't have to do everything to improve the business area," Mayor Martin commented. "but it should be willing to do whatever is possible for it to do." One area

which could stand improvement, the mayor said, is parking. He voiced the opinion that the merchants should "show initia-Cites Example of Good Plowing

On the question of snow plowing and removal, Mayor Martin commented, "The only way to do it is to get out and plow." Admitting that past snow storms have not shown any efficiency on the part of the city's snow removal work "showed that the work could be done efficiently." He noted that having the work done on a holiday and the following day, a Saturday, was ex-Flood control was another subject discussed by the new mayor. He declared that it is 'next to impossible for the city to attack the flood control problem by means of its own budget appropriations." The problem is not a local one but involves he entire Rahway River watershed, the mayor stated. The Army Corps of Engineers will be asked to cooperate in getting the lower Main Street project for flood control underway and Representatives Florence P. Dwyer and cornelius E. Gallagher will be asked for help in having federal funds earmarked for flood control work, Mayor Martin said. Touching upon the Water Department finances, Mayor Martin said that department funds are being used for operational expenses. The department has a major improvement project started at a cost of \$2 million, according to the mayor, One million dollars of federal money will be used. Mayor Martin declared that the utility is owned by the city and should be

self - sustaining, adding that diversion of department funds was "not good in the citizens' eyes." There is "very little" money left in the department's account, he added. **Budget Requests to Be Cut** Business Administrator Stone, who was present at the conference, stated that requests made by departments for appropriations in the 1971 municipal budget were \$1,360,000 higher

than last year and that the amount represents an increase of 33 1/3 per cent. Stone pointed our that the requests included \$248,000 for salaries of employees the departments would like to add to the payroll. The administrator said that the additional amount needed for long - term financing is \$248,000 and that mandatory increases total \$198,000. Stone said the Police Department budget request is for \$209 000 additional and that it has proposed that 10 new lobs be created. The Fire Department request is for \$136,000 additional with eight new positions. The Planning and Building Department has asked for \$24,000 more and for three additional employees. Another large increase, \$103,000, has been sought by the Public Works Department which wants nine more The Fire Department also has requested that \$142,000 be appropriated for expenses other than salaries. Stone said the department, in anticipation of high - rise building construction in the city, has proposed that a snorkle - type aerial ladder be purchased at a cost of \$90,000 and that a cherrypicker" type truck be bought for \$15,000, It would be used for

It was stated that an appropriation for the Rahway Valley Sewerage Authority is mandatory. The 1969 appropriation was \$86,000 and the 1970 amount was \$106,000. This year the appropriation will be \$213,000, necessary because of expansion of sewage treatment facilities. Mayor Martin said the proposed 1971 budget will be presented to the Council by Jan. 15 and that it must be introduced by the Council before Feb. 10. The deadline for adoption is March 20.
