





Education budgets just like armies are defeated for rood reasons, and the Clark school budget is no exception to this fairly accurate rule. Taxpayers have

reached the point, even in affluent communities like Westfield, where they look with great suspicion on the ever - rising costs of education. The township school budget is up 10 per cent in a period of declining productivity, high inflation, and ____ climbing unemployment. These conditions clearly affect the economic status of most citizens, and the school board should always be aware that whatever increases it mandates have to be borne by the taxpaying public in the PRESENT economic atmosphere. Clark's texpayers have been funding the local school system most adequately, as we feel they should do. At the same time, this paper thinks that the school board should be the economic representative of the taxpavers, not only in its contractual negotitions with the Clark Education Association, but in the preparation of the approximately other third of the school cost Since the adoption-of Public Law 303, boards have been compelled to negotiate with the bargaining agents teachers. In Clark, the board MUST negotiate with the Clark Education Association which is the bargaining agent for the township's teachers. Clearly, the CEA is charged with representing the economic status of its union members. Likewise, the board's role is clearly to defend taxpayer interests. Where each body does not to the fullest represent its "clients," so to speak, the equity of the negotiating setup declines. We feel if the board had kept the budget to a 5 per

cent increase, taxpayers would have probably given their blessing. And let it be said in the clearest of terms, that a five per cent increase given the period's economic picture is a generously funded budget. The taxpayers have defeated the township budget: they want to see some cuts, and the paper feels assured the the council will be able to affect some economies. It should also be pointed out, however, that council has been left only a partial pie from which to make cuts. since the board of education locked in or, in other words. reached an agreement on teachers salaries which is binding, PRIOR TO THE APPROVAL OF VOTERS. All across the state, the reaction by taxpayers to the practice of denying them a full vote on school budgets has come in for severe criticism. The paper feels that this criticism is very just and proper, because the clear intent of Title 18 of the Revised Statutes of the New Jersey dealing with school budget votes is to grant the voter a full voice on all funding, we suppose, which is not expressly mandated. The Rahway Board of Education did not come to an agreement with the Rahway Education Association prior to a taxpayer vote and is now properly moving forward with the intention of the taxpayers fully and equitable

expressed as a guide for their actions. The budget in Rahway was also up about 10 per cent. but the city council at least has the option to make curs in all caregories. This flexibility should have been left to the Clark council, if the school board had given the voters a fair shake. In nearly every book put out by financial institutions on municipal bonds, it is stressed that interest and principal of general obligation bonds are backed up with the right of local government to levy ad valorem taxes without consideration as to rate or amount. What these financial companies are saying is that school boards and other municipal bodies which authorize the floating of bonds do not have to be concerned with economic conditions and that municipal bonds are a secure investment which must be paid by communities even be-While it's a pleasure for financial companies to talk

in this way to increase municipal bond sales, this almost unrestricted taxing right bears great responsibility and should be used with utmost restraint. It might augur well for the Clark board not to lock in teachers' salaries next year, evince a want to hold the line on taxes, and let the voters speak prior to final action on the board's part. Good educational standards can be achieved with moderate budgets that respect the taxpayer's pocket-

No New Tax in State This Year But Watch Out for Next Year A ray of hope was given New Jersey's hard-pressed

message to the Legislature on Tuesday. Gov. Cahill proposed that there should be no additional taxes imposed in New Jersey this year. The reason for the proposal, the governor stated, was that budgetary windfalls and fiscal maneuvers eliminated the need for a rax increase even though he submitted a budger totaling Gov. Cahill noted that the unexpected success of the state lottery is one of the financial windfalls that has helped to balance the budget for the fiscal year beginning July 1. The state's chief executive explained that he would have had to ask for imposition of at least \$15 million a year in increased state taxes if the lotteryticket sales had not yielded several times the amount The budget proposals anticipate the yield from the lottery to the state will be \$15 million, instead of the \$5 million anticipated, for the budget year ending June 30 and \$25 million, instead of \$12 million, for he fiscal year starting next July 1.

The lottery windfall offset the \$30 million deficit in the expected revenue from the state sales tax of 5 per cent during the budget year ending on June 30.

The governor's budget also included the use of \$78.5 million which had been in the surplus account because it had been appropriated but never had been spent, The principal part of the surplus money came from state highway and rail subsidy funds, amounting to \$68.5 million. The budger also had the benefit of \$10 million obtained by accelerating collection of the state tax on utility companies. By collecting one-half of the tax on May 1 instead of wairing until the end of the cal-

endar year, the state will obtain \$30.5 million from the levy to balance the budget instead of only \$20.5 The bad news for the taxpayers is that some of the money used for the 1971 budget will not be available to the state for next year's budget and that the proposals call for only a small surplus of \$11.5 million. The surplus is provided to permit emergency spending during the budget period. The State Constitution requires that the budget be balanced by having re-Cov.
