Read, director of sales-marketing, It is based on the company's more than 60 years of experience in recycling metals cans and scrap; "We wanted to put our recycling expertise to work at the community level," Mr. Read explained. "Since we have always been heavily involved in recycling, it was easy for us to convince our employees to boin up."

Red, white and blue collection bins are placed in many locations throughout the Rahway facilities. Employees are abked to remove labels, wash out the cans and flatten term before putting them in the receptacles. Once a week the cans are trucked to the company's metals recovery plant in Elizabeth for receiving beth for recycling.
