





Wendell Pl., Clark, and Edmund P. Milewski, 15, of 17 Mountain View Rd., Clark, became the latest victims of the reservoir, Mr. Harrison died in the icy water while trying to save the 15-yearold youth. Another boy, Brian Subliskey, 15, of 11 Winthrop Rd., Clark, was saved Mr. Harrison.

First Ward Councilman John Bodnar suggested that residents of properties adjoining the water company's land be equipped with ropes suitable for life saving on their -- properties -- Councilman Bodnar said arrangements might be made between the township and the water company to purchase the rope.

Councilman-at-large Stanley D. LeWand co mented that all letters from the township to the water company concerning cleanup of the property and other matters have not been answered

The two Clark boys, Ed-ward Milewski and Brian Subliskey, were ice skating on the reservoir about 4 p.m. on Sunday when the ice proke and the boys were plunged into the icy water. Mr. Harrison was walking with two of his children, Jean and Thomas, about two blocks from his home when he heard the two boys scream. Mrs. Valeria Cisneros of 54 Wendell Place heard the cries and telephoned to Clark Po lice Headquarters and then

went to the reservoir, which adjoins the backyard of her property Mrs. Cisneros said later that Mr. Harrison, who was in the water, called to her and asked her to "throw

something." Mrs. Cisneros related that she and her son, George, tossed a hose and electrical extension cordbut that Harrison couldn't reach them. Mr. Harrison tried to hold onto the ice but it broke off each time-he grabbed it,-Mrs. Cisneros related. Police and rescue worker arrived quickly but Mi Harrison and the Milewsl

reports that there is stark evidence of 2 drug subculture that has taken root in America and found fertile breeding grounds in the schools. President Nixon's "deliberately cautious" estimate is that 10% of the nation's 18,000,000 high school students are experimenting with marijuana. Most doctors, educators and drug authorities believe the figure is closer to 25 or 35%. The public relations association report says: "This means that up to 6,000,000 students are taking drugs illegally." It added that some 50,000 school children are addicted hopelessly on heroin.

The national school public relations association

The survey found high rates of drug abuse in big cities. It reported that 40% of San Francisco's junior and senior high school students were experimenting with drugs. The figure was 22% for Houston. Some teachers may use drugs themselves. It has been suggested that high school students and teachers undergo tests to spot drug users. Drug abuse reflects the failure of adults to enforce discipline in their homes, their schools and their cities.

> More money is expected to be available in the next federal fiscal year, and Rahway will reapply, if it still meets unemployment level criteria, the mayor said. He added that Rep. Cornelus E. Gallagher had done "an unbelievably outstanding Job in assisting the progress of our application on a daily basis." The congressman has pledged to work for further appropriations under Public Works Impact Programs, and to assist Rahway in reapplying for funds.

Mayor Martin said that this development "means that we will proceed at full steam on our other major community facilities project--converting the Elizabethtown Gas Company land and buildings into a modern police headquarters," The city appropriated \$130,000 late last year to purchase the property and buildings, and to cover legal, architectural and other fees. As of this date, title searches have been completed, the survey is near completion, work on final plans has started, and closing can be expected in less than two weeks.

# Crime in City Increased 10.1% in 71; Police Report

last year of Police Chief Herbert Kinch, said the number of crimes reported in the city last year was 1,228 as compared to 1,115 during the previous year. A total of 239 crimes were

solved by arrest during 1971. Director Hummel stated. Director Hummel listed the crimes committed in 1970 and 1971 as follows: Murder, 1970, none; 1971, one; manslaughter by negligence, three, two; forcible rape, three, five; robbery. 3; aggravated assault, 40, 29; residence burglary, 186, 233; non-residence burglary, 154, 162; larceny over \$200 in value, 45, 49: larceny, \$50 to \$200 in value, 113-143; larceny, under \$50 in value, 205, 235; auto theft, 199, 206; other assaults, 110, 100. Nineteen of the residence

burglaries and seven of the non-residence burglaries were solved by arrests last year, the police director said. Twelve robbery case and 43 larceny cases and 17 auto theft cases were solved by arrests, accoring to the report





# Silver Center Displays World's Heaviest Coin

"The world s most beautiful medal" (and the world's largest and heaviest silver coin are the latest additions to the National State Bank's display of limited issue medals, coins and ingots at the bank's silver center in the Rahway office, 1420 Irving Both the Waterloo Medal

and the 20 Balboas coin from the Republic of Panama were struck from sterling silver under the auspices of the <u>Franklin Mint, the world's</u> largest private mint. The Waterloo Medal was created more than 100 years

ago by the great Italian medalist, Benedetto Pistrucci, who also created the "St. George and the Dragon" design for British coinage. Pistrucci designed and created the Waterloo Medal to commemorate Wellington's great victory over Napoleon in 1815. Because the original dyes were actually considered too valuable to harden, the medal

was never struck from the original dyes. The sterling silver medal was finally struck from soft copper impressions of the original dyes made by John Pinches, Medallists Ltd. of England, an affiliate of the Franklin Mint. At 2 1/2inches in diameter, the new copper dyes are slightly smaller than the originals. The medal--limited in its minting to only 5,000 units-can be purchased at the local National State Bank office. The central motif on the face of the Waterloo Medal is profile busts of four sovereigns whose alliance overthrew Napoleon, the Prince Regent, later King George IV of England; Francis II of Austria, Alexander of Russia and Frederick William III of Prussia. The outer border which frames these

gorical interpretation of the victory and the peace which followed. The central motif on the reverse depicts two mounted horsemen galloping into action, urged on by the winged figure of Victory which flies between them. The border composition represents the mythological battle of the giants in their assault on

Heaven. Nineteen giants are shown. They refer to the 19 years of war between the -Atlies-and-Napoleon-----Each specimen in the limited edition is edgemarked with its own serial number and is accompanied by a certificate of authenticity.
