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Income Tax Law On Withholding Pay Is Changed

Most college or high school students who have summer jobs need not have federal income taxes withheld from their earnings.

Any student who has a federal income tax last year and who does not expect to earn more than \$1,000 in 1972 is eligible for this tax law benefit.

When these students first report to work, they should file Form 1041 with their employer to claim their exemption from withholding.

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Diligent Police Work Thwarted by Courts

The New York City Police Department made a random study of 136 cases of felonies referred for trial in the past 12 months. The study revealed that 100 cases had been convicted and sentenced to maximum terms, they could have been given a total of 952 years in prison.

Unfortunately for the law-abiding public, not one was convicted of a hard core crime. In 1969, New York City police made 35,629 felony arrests. In 1971, they made 94,042. That is an increase of 165%.

But what happened to the police's diligent work in preserving law and order? Only 352 of the 94,042 were sent to trial. The other 93,690 were dismissed or reduced to lesser charges. The 36 criminals served a total of five years and four months in prison.

Flood Study Funds Are Dwyer Goal
