Blue chip or other high-quality stocks should continue as good investments, In the expert's opinion, high-quality bondz in general can bring a higher yield than bank savings and are safer than stocks. On the other hand, there is the risk of loss of What to do?

According to a co-operative extension assvice family resource management specialist at Rutgers University's Cook College in New Brunswick a good investment for one family may well be a disaster for another. The right answers depend upon many things, including personal temperament, age, family situation, investment goals, tax bracket, and number and age of dependents. Those variables will help determine the most judicious piacement of your money.

However, one thing the specialist comphesizes is true of every purchasing power if the bonds are held to maturity. If the consumer needs to sell the bonds before maturity, there is still the risk of loss of capital, as bond prices fluctuate depending upon the interest rates in the money markets.

When money is put in savings accounts or certificates of deposit, the consumer does not carry the risk of loss of capital, especially if money is kept in an insured account, but does receive lower interest rates in most cases. 
