



James Dean, Elvis Presley, the Jets and the Sharks of New York's rough West Side -- these were the heroes of popular entertainment in the 1950's, the kind of guys who would never run away from a good "rumble." The kind of guys your father called "juventle delinquents." crimes committed by juveniles, defined for legal purposes as anyone unfer the age of 18, took a rather lesient form of protectionism. Because of the age of certain offenders, courts aimed for rehabilitation rather than real punishment.

Recent years have seen a swing away from this attitude. Serious crimes committed by young offenders, who are often released from juvenile court with

ers, who are often released from javenile court with a mere slap on the wrist, are now seen as deserving harsher punishment. Several states have revised their javenile codes to match the pensity to the crime, rather than to the age of the criminal.

In an attempt to help halt the wave of repeated javenile crimes, I am apossoring legislation that will toughen our javenile codes so we can more appropriately deal with young people who commit repeated crimes against society. analyzed to the appropriate adult court to be tried for the offense. 

Additional legislation adda restitution to the list of dispositions a juvenile and domestic relations court may order if a youngster is found delinquent. This measure will provide some compensation to victims of juvenile misdeeds.



By allowing young offenders "to get off the hook," we revive the minguided notion it is all right, even heroic, to be tough and mean.




