## City schools chosen as pilot district for new state monitoring program

Rahway Superintendent of Schools Frank D. Brunette announced on Oct. 17 that the city has been selected as one of the three pilot districts in the state for the new monitoring process developed by the state department of education under which school districts are classified.

Under the new state monitoring plan, announced by Commissioner Cooperman on Aug. 3, school boards will be freed from the constant monitoring of the past. The new focus of the state monitoring process is to determine how well schools are fulfilling their mission which will be composed of 10 elements to be initiated over the next two years.

These are: Planning, school/community relations, comprehensive curriculum/instruction, attendance, facilities, professional staff, mandated programs, achievement of mandated basic skills, equal opportunity and affirmative action and financial areas.

In another matter, the Board congratulated Rahway High School track stars, Carlette Smith and Claire Connors, for having an article written and published about them in the October issue of Seventeen magazine.

The Board also cited Rahway Junior High School student, Martin Quinn, for having his poem published in the September issue of 3-2-1 Contact magazine.

In other action, the school body:  
• Appointed Raymond Candiloro as the assistant freshmen football coach for the 1983-1984 school year.  
• Named Kenneth Farrell as the junior varsity boys basketball coach for the 1983-1984 school year.  
• Re-appointed George St. Andrassy as the assistant boys basketball coach for the 1983-1984 school year.  
• Authorized the submission and operation of the Bilingual/English As A Second Language Education Program/Plan Update for the city's schools for the 1983-1984 school year, which will be funded through local and state funds.

• Accepted support funds in the amount of \$14,043, from Sept. 1, 1983, to Aug. 31, 1984, to provide educational services for pre-school handicapped children.  
• Approved a motion to submit to the Union County superintendent of schools a request to use the unrecognized title of department chairman for the 1983-1984 school year.  
• Okayed a motion to implement career counseling for the disadvantaged for the balance of the current school year which would include one position of an elementary guidance counselor and state and local funding.

• Accepted the resignation of Mrs. Bronia Ichel, an elementary art teacher, effective immediately.  
• Accepted the resignation of Denise Viggiano as the yearbook advisor/financial, effective immediately.  
• Appointed Mrs. Marsha Watson to the extra-services position of public information/communications person of the Rahway district for the 1983-1984 school year.  
• Appointed Adam Eern as an industrial arts teacher at Rahway High School, retroactive to Oct. 3.

• Re-appointed Mrs. Lilian Dettmar from the Reduction-In-Force list as a business education teacher at the high school for the remainder of the current school year.  
• Approved a motion to name the Howard Savings Bank as the depository for the 1983-1984 school year.  
• Changed the salaries of the following staff members due to extra college credits and retroactive to Sept. 1: James Marino, \$17,225 interim salary to \$17,490 for bachelor's degree plus 30 credits; Toni Sullivan, \$14,685 interim salary to \$14,955 interim salary for bachelor's degree plus 30 credits; and Glenda Albert, \$18,665 interim salary to \$19,040 interim salary for master's degree plus 30 credits.

## Merck income increases by 15%

A spokesman for Merck and Co., Inc. of Rahway today announced net income for the third quarter of 1983 was \$109,022,000, or \$1.47 per share of common stock, an increase of 15% from \$94,542,000, or \$1.28 per share, for the third quarter of 1982.

"Continuation of our cost-containment program, together with increased productivity, contributed to the third-quarter gain in income," said John J. Horan, the chairman and chief executive officer of the health products company.

"Third-quarter results also benefited from an improved product mix, as the human and animal health segment of our business grew faster than the special-

ty chemical and environmental-products segment." The continued strength of the United States dollar in relation to foreign currencies continued to have a significant adverse impact on the company's earnings. A higher effective tax rate reduced earnings by 9% per share in the quarter, the chairman added.

Sales for the third quarter were \$797,724,000, an increase of 6% from that of \$753,428,000 for the third quarter of 1982. Net income for the first nine months of 1983 was \$346,020,000, or \$4.68 per share, up 10% from that of \$315,596,000, or \$4.27 per share, for the first nine months of the previous

year. Currency exchange and a higher tax rate both had a significant unfavorable effect on nine-month earnings, according to Mr. Horan. Sales for the first nine months of 1983 were that of \$2,390,360,000, an increase of 5% from \$2,271,570,000 for the first nine months of 1982. Contributing to the nine-month growth in human health sales were 'Mefoxin,' an injectable antibiotic; 'Timoptic,' prescribed for control of glaucoma, a major cause of blindness; 'Heptavax-B,' a vaccine against hepatitis B; 'Moduretic,' a potassium-sparing diuretic for use in certain cases of high blood pressure, and 'Dolobid,' a

non-narcotic long-acting analgesic, the company spokesman said. As previously announced Merck last month suspended distribution of the new osmotic-pump formulation of its anti-inflammatory product, indomethacin, in the seven countries abroad where it had been on the market. Other formulations of indomethacin, which has been a standard of therapy for the past 18 years, are not involved.

The company's action, taken in co-operation with health authorities, was in response to concerns expressed about initial reports of adverse reactions. Merck will meet with health agencies after completing a series of studies which it hopes will answer questions that arose about the new formulation. The suspension of distribution in early September did not have a significant impact on third-quarter or nine-month financial results, Mr. Horan noted.

Animal health products showed modest gains as a result of the continued good performance of ivermectin, Merck's new product for control of internal and external parasites in animals, the company official said. Specialty-chemical and environmental products sales for the nine months were below the 1982 level due to economic conditions worldwide, but effective cost-control measures helped lessen this impact.

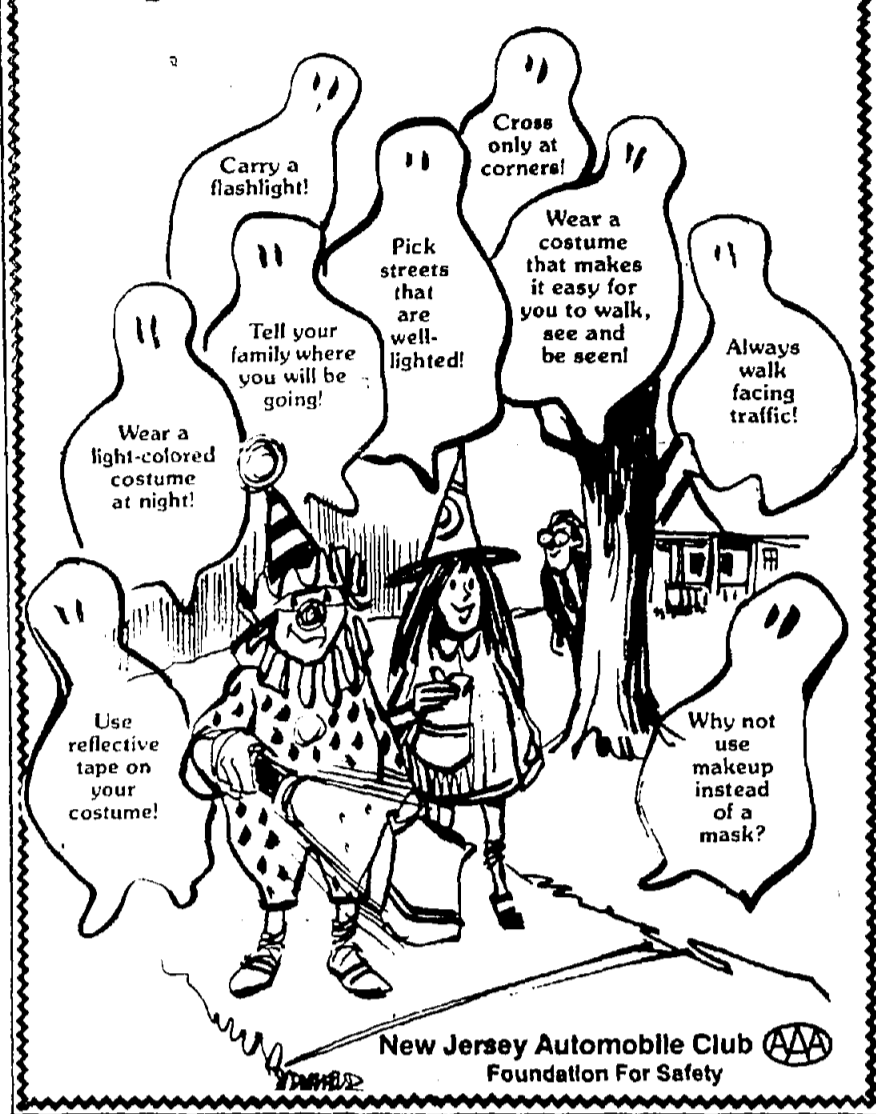

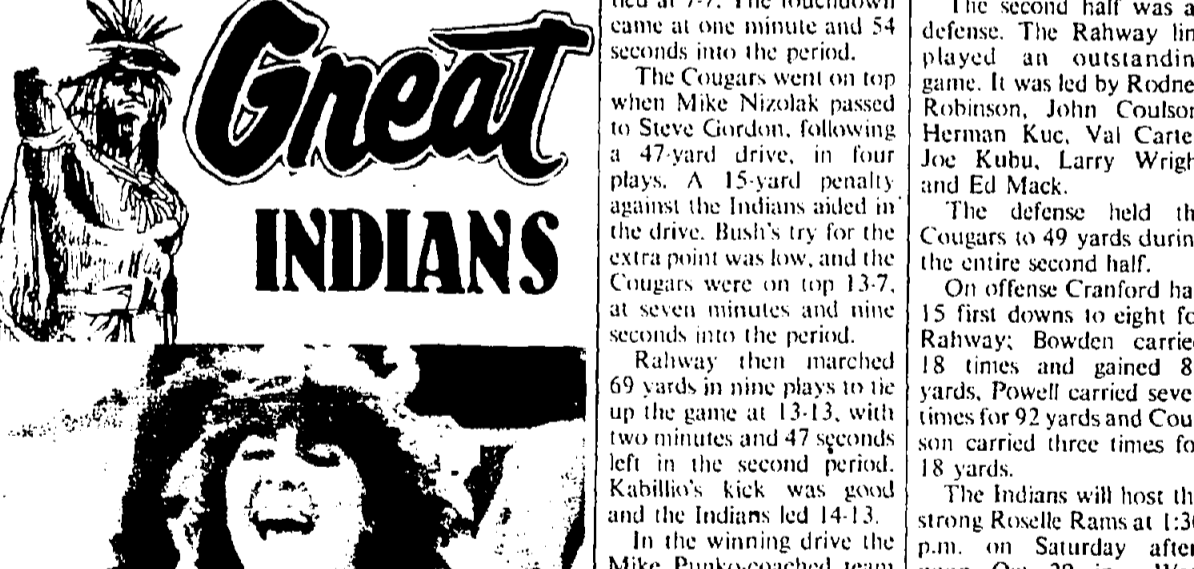

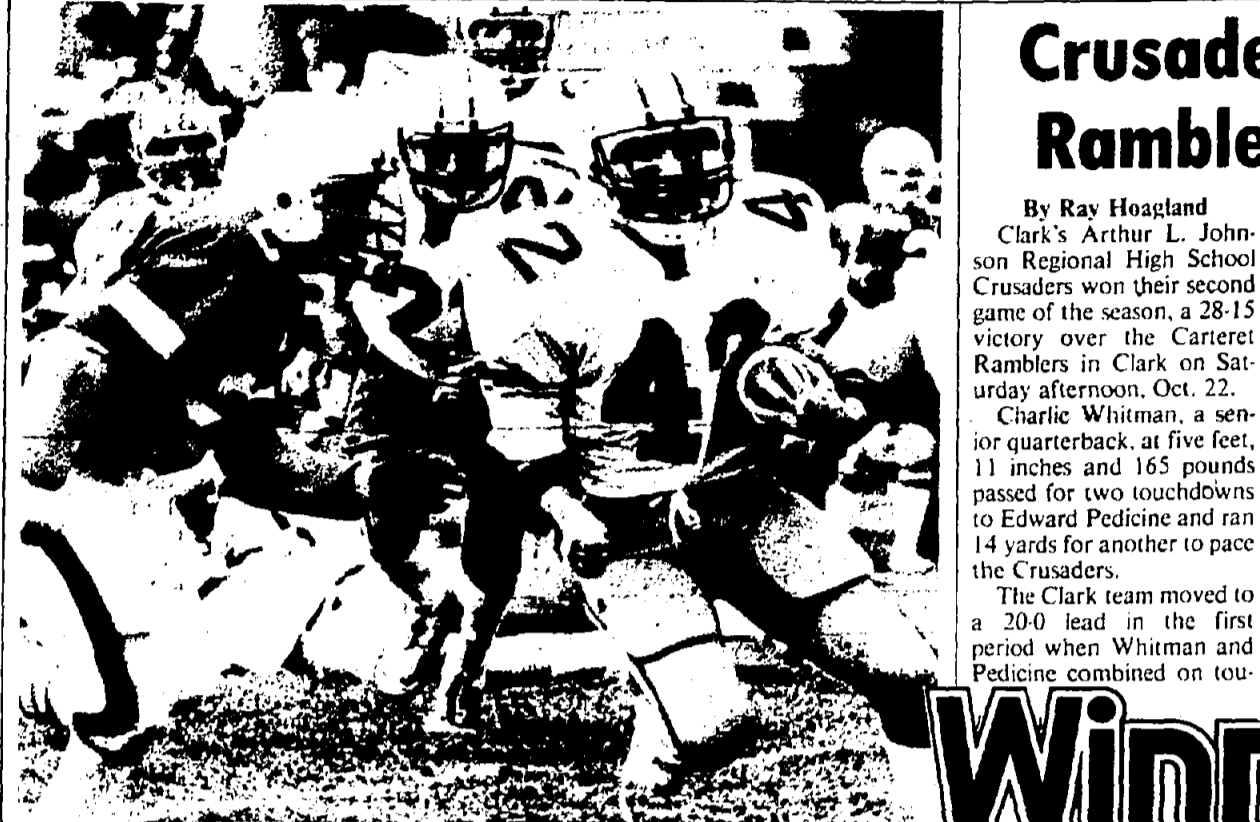

The proceeds will go to the care and feeding of homeless animals. There will be home-baked goodies and coffee for those who attend.



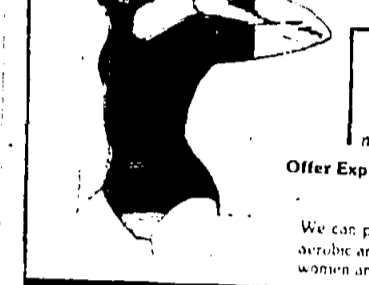
Space Heaters Warm A Lot of Space
