FIVE PASTORS HAVE WORKED UNHURILY

That the Rahway clergymen are doing their part toward bringing about a religious awakening in the city that will produce a deeper spiritual sentiment is evident from the stirring sermons that have been delivered every night this week in the evangelistic meetings.
