

PROPERTY TAXES

Eighth Installment of the 18,000 Holdings of Real Estate and Buildings in Rahway

In order that the citizens of Rahway may have accurate and definite information concerning the assessments levied on the taxable property throughout the city which will give them ample opportunity to judge whether there is need of greater equalization the Board has undertaken the gigantic task of publishing the entire list of properties in the city which numbers about 18,000 holdings. Some time ago a complete list of the personal property of the city was published and now the list of real estate and buildings is given. By comparison with pieces of property of which he has definite knowledge the citizen can readily arrive at some opinion as to the proper value of a piece of property and can decide whether the burden is properly equalized throughout the city. Taxing methods in a large measure determine the progress and prosperity of a city and for that reason the Board has planned to publish the entire property holdings in all of the five wards of the city. Some of the wards may be published complete in a single issue while others will have to be divided into two or three installments according to the space available.

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## Nation Should Prepare

For the Conservation

of Our Present

Prosperity

THE close of the war will not immediately check our prosperity,

although undoubtedly a large number of the men now working in

munition factories will be compelled within a few months to seek

other employment. Our business is progressing at such a rate that its

very momentum will carry on for some time to come, but I do not agree

with the statements which have been made that at the close of the war

we may expect in the country a prolonged continuance of the great

prosperity now existing.

Therefore I think that we should recognize the more

or less temporary character of our prosperity and pre-

pare ourselves for its conservation.

The business men of the country must give no cause for complaint in

the management of their affairs, and by this action they can and should

insure that the government, with its agencies and influence, cooperate

with them and aid them in establishing credit, in extending commerce,

in increasing capacity and in the development of natural resources.

We must be prepared for radical changes in volume, in process and in

the character of our production. Business men should realize that it is

possible danger ahead and should proceed with cautious appreciation

of the great and increasing value of the production of the country.

strength of the United States.

Capital and Labor Are Unscientific in Their

Treatment of Each Other

THE law of equal reaction is that for every act, word and thought

there is a reaction upon the person, class or nation from which it

goes forth, and that this reaction is equal and of the same charac-

ter as the action itself.

Both capital and labor are most unscientific in their treatment of

one another and in their attitude toward the other. Both capital and

labor are attempting to defy and suspend the most fundamental law of

nature, including, as it does, the law of conservation, the law of compen-

sation, the law of supply and demand and the law of reward and punish-

ment. Capital and labor foolishly look upon one another as competitors,

and each considers itself a natural enemy of the other. Moreover, this

fallacy is at the bottom of all of the conflict, but also a large ex-

planation of the high cost of living.

Normal Schools Should Give More

Thorough Training in History

FRANKLY concede that our best normal schools give teachers a more

effective professional training than our colleges. My criticisms are

therefore those of a modest admiring friend.

Most normal schools attempt too much in the history of education.

Ancient and medieval education has no meaning for normal school stu-

dents. THEY DO NOT KNOW ENOUGH HISTORY AND PHI-

LOSOPHY TO COMPREHEND IT, AND IT IS OF NO USE TO

THEM.

No normal school gives enough training in such subjects as American

history and geography. Elementary school teachers do not know enough

of the history of the United States to require a full daily

lesson for an entire year in each of these subjects.

Students should, however, not receive textbooks, but be taken over a

number of books, such as Parkman's "Pioneers and Explorers," and over books on

modern physical geography, meteorology, elementary astronomy and com-

mercial geography.
