**CLAIMS BOARDER TOOK MONEY**

Lively Chase Through Field, After Fightful Maid to Have \$24

According to stories told at police headquarters there was a lively chase in the section of the city from Madison Hill road to the vicinity of the Rahway water works between 8 and 9 o'clock yesterday morning. The gal was \$24, this amount being in the possession of Steve Palapinsky, a boarder at the home of Dmytro Nahrbecki, of Madison Hill road, and said to have been taken by him from a trunk of Theodore Gulka, another boarder at the Nahrbecki house. Palapinsky had a slight start of probably fifty yards when Gulka found his trunk broken open and the money missing. He told Mrs. Nahrbecki she rushed out of the house in pursuit of Palapinsky and she also took up the chase.

It is said that none of the champion sprinters could have made better time in covering the stretch and falls between the Madison Hill road and the Rahway water works than was made by Palapinsky, Gulka and Mrs. Nahrbecki were not easily shaken off and they continued the pursuit with determination. Palapinsky reached the river ahead of his pursuers and by the time they arrived had completely disappeared from view. It is believed that he crossed the river and made his way through the underbrush on the opposite bank before his pursuers reached the stream and that the brush and trees concealed his further movements and the direction he took after leaving the river. The police were notified after the chase was over, but it was then too late to apprehend the fugitive.

The men concerned in the affair are employed at the plant of the American Felt Company in Clark township.




## RALLY DAY AT SUNDAY SCHOOLS
