"Time of thousands" he has dedicated to the study of nature; tens of thousands he has taught to find in biology no mere catalogue of dead organisms, no dry series in fossil stones, but a "science of landscape," as well as an intelligent understanding of the rocky framework of the world."

The life of this man, whose cottage was a stone quarry, affords another indisputable proof, that the royal road to success and distinction in life may be trodden by those of obscure birth and humble means, without molestation; provided they are willing to face the struggle, make the necessary sacrifice, and never flinch in the battle; for "no one is defeated until he gives up."

Turn to the pages of history. When the despotism away of ancient Rome was succeeded by that of the "Holy Roman Empire," when "by an ambitious and unscrupulous pretender, who had enslaved the souls of her subjects, [Roman]... were... called throughout the world," when down trodden and oppressed humanity, after groping a thousand years, in the darkness and superstition, cast up a plaintive cry for release from the night of intellectual and religious darkness. See Martin Luther as he stands forth brave and resolute, "armed with the sword of the spirit, and the word of God," smites the powers of darkness, clear away the growth of ignorance and superstition, and sows the seeds of religious freedom, that were destined to blossom and bring forth fruit for all time. He planted the seed that became a great tree whose leaves are for the healing of the nations.

See his fiery soul burst into flame when warned not to go if there are as many devils there as tiles on the roof of the house." And go he did. He confronted the Emperor Charles the Fifth and the German princes in the most remarkable convention that ever assembled on earth. It was a whole "empire against one man." Listen to him as he dismisses the long struggle of bigotry with freedom. "Here I stand; I cannot do otherwise." "God help me. Amen." Wholly humanity had struggled during the long centuries, through seas of blood, for religious liberty. There in that assembly Luther ended the struggle when he grasped the temporal power of the Pope, by the throat, and hurled it back beyond the Alps, never more to return.



the leading "Financiers" in fact, nearly all in the van of the great moving procession along the avenues of life are there not because some one else put them there, but with few exceptions by reason of their own personal efforts they have made themselves.

There is a tide in the affairs of men, which takes at the flood, leads on to fortune. Consider all the range of their life is second in shallowness, and in misery.

The importance of the past confirms the truth of this statement. Think of the long array of heroic self-sacrificing men, in every phase of life, who by earnest and constant effort have literally lifted themselves, despite op-

posing circumstances, above their earlier environments. They did this because they took the tide when at its flood. The great trouble of today is not that there are no opportunities, but rather that young men do not take advantage of them when they are presented, and because they are not sufficiently prepared when the opportunity comes. How often do we hear men say "If I had only done so and so at such a time, I would be better off today." It is unpleasant and often annoying to arrive at a depot just in time to see the train that you wished to take, pull out, under full head of steam, as you stand breathlessly gazing after it. Such a misfortune can be overcome within a few hours, but to watch the opportunity of a life time go by, and realize that it can never come back is enough to make one sick at heart.

Let us look for a moment at a few of the men who have won conspicuous success in the world. Perhaps we may be able to ascertain the underlying causes of their success.

That greatest of all leaders and lawgivers, who undertook the seemingly hopeless task of leading the children of Israel out of their galling bondage in Egypt, was a humble shepherd. It was during those long hours and years of lonely vigil, that he was unconsciously preparing himself for the great work to which he was later called. Perhaps those forty long years spent in the monotonous routine of watching his father-in-law's flock, were not always inspiring and full of encouragement, for Moses. Yet, he patiently and faithfully performed his duty, and while thus engaged he came to the "burning bush," heard the voice of "The Great I Am," came to understand his relation to God, and to his people, and, with a soul fired with a courage from on high, he resolutely and fearlessly set about the great work of his life. He was no longer in doubt. He had been in the desert, by the lonely Mount of Horob. He had learned the secret of his life, while doing his duty.

Who is not familiar with the life of Julius Caesar, "the greatest name in history"? He took up the cause of the common people, though opposed by the better elements of Rome; yet he firmly and fearlessly maintained his course, without a misstep, until he attained the trumpet summit of human power. He held absolute sway over the once mighty Roman Republic. Besides his military achievements he stands almost without a rival in the literary realm. An everlasting example of what can be accomplished by industry, pluck and perseverance.

An example of how a man can find his way from obscurity to the stars, is furnished by that rugged old Scotch stone-mason, Hugh Miller. His father was a seaman and was drowned in 1807, when Hugh was but five years of age. At thirteen Hugh was an invincible truant. But even thus early he began to show signs of real literary genius. Later he was apprenticed as a stone-mason and worked for fifteen years at his trade.

During this period unfortunately the effects of hard work began to tell on him. Already the germs of disease that were destined to undermine his health were implanted within him. This combined with excessive mental labor caused him in life a mental derangement. But it was during this period of hard labor that he established his claim, to that title he justly merits, "one of the most remarkable self-taught men of the century."

It was right here that he differed from thousands of other young men. He not only worked patiently at his trade but he devoted his spare time to reading and study, and began to put his observations in writing using such clear and vigorous English, and showing such a breadth of intellect, that he attracted the attention of the leading scholars of his time. The stone-mason of Cromarty was looked upon as a wonder. And why? Thousands of men before and since, have worked in quarries without attracting special attention. He noticed the difference in the strata, collected various kinds of fossils, and specimens of rock. Where other men saw nothing, he noticed peculiarities, detected analogies, and discovered differences.

All this served to stimulate his mind, and give him a mental equipment such that after years of painstaking care, industries, application, and unwearied perseverance he gave to the world "The Old Red Sandstone." This work stamped him as a pioneer in the realm of scientific geology and won for him the esteem and friendship of such great men as

Levi, and Brewster, "Men Novices of the Creator," and "Romance of the Rocks," appeared in turn and gave additional luster to his already brilliant renown.

PROCLAMATIONS

President Wilson and Governor Fielder Call Upon the People to be Thankful

President Wilson's proclamation designating Nov. Thursday, Nov. 26, as Thanksgiving Day is as follows:

It has long been the custom of our people to turn to the fruitful outcome of the year in praise and thanksgiving to Almighty God for his many blessings and mercies to us and the nation. The year that has elapsed since we last observed our day of thanksgiving has been rich in blessings to us as a people, but the whole face of the world has been darkened by war. In the midst of our peace and happiness our thoughts dwell with painful disquiet upon the struggles and sufferings of the nations at war, and of the peoples upon whom war has brought disaster without choice or possibility of escape on their part. We cannot think of our own happiness without thinking of their pitiful distress.

Now, therefore, I, Woodrow Wilson, President of the United States of America, do appoint Thursday, the 26th of November, as a day of national thanksgiving and prayer, and urge and entreat the people to resort to their several places of worship on that day to render thanks to Almighty God for the blessings of peace and unbroken prosperity, which he has bestowed upon our beloved country in such amazing measure.

And I also urge and suggest our duty in this our day of peace and abundance to think in deep sympathy of the stricken peoples of the world upon whom the curse and terror of war has so pitilessly fallen, and to contribute out of our abundant means to the relief of their sufferings.

Our people could in no better way show their real attitude toward the present struggle of the nations than by contributing out of their abundance to the relief of the suffering which war has brought in its train.

In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed.

Done at the City of Washington, this

17th day of November, in the year of our Lord, 1916, and of the independence of the United States, the 141st.

WOODROW WILSON.

By the President, Robert Lansing, Secretary of State.

The proclamation issued by Governor James F. Fielder, of New Jersey, is as follows:

"Whereas, For the people of the United States of America the blessings of National peace and prosperity should at this time hold a peculiar and deep significance. While our brothers of other great nations are contending against the sacrifices, wastage and horrors of war, while devastation stalks through their lands, bringing privation, suffering and distress in its train, and the paralyzing hand of death is laid upon them, and fathers and mothers, widows and orphans mourn amid the ruins of their homes, our country is at peace, our people are employed, contented and happy and no homes are desolate because the specter of war casts its shadow upon them. For this fortunate condition in which the people of our State stand, as well as for other blessings the waning year has brought us, we should set aside a special day upon which to offer grateful acknowledgement.

"Therefore, I, James F. Fielder, Governor of the State of New Jersey, do designate Thursday, the thirteenth day of November, nineteen hundred and sixteen as a day to be observed by general thanksgiving and prayer, recommending that upon that day all business be laid aside and that our people in their homes, their churches and other fitting places, do make sincere acknowledgment to Almighty God for the benefits and blessings He has vouchsafed us; for that feeling of good will toward other nations, which breeds no coveting of territory or international strife; for our peaceful and prosperous land; for beautiful harbors; for busy factories and workshops; for improvement in our social and industrial processes and conditions; for the absence of general sorrow from the homes of our people and for manifold individual blessings we enjoy.
